THIS Day the following Addresses were presented to the King, which his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

WE the Provost, Dean of Guild, Bailiffs, Treasurer, and Commons of your Majesty's ancient City of St. Andrews in Common Council assembled, most humbly beg Leave to express our Joy on your Majesty's safe Return to your British Dominions, after so many Dangers to which your Royal Person was exposed in the common Cause of Europe: And to congratulate your Majesty upon the Success of your Endeavours to restore the Peace of Europe, so often interrupted by the busy Intigues, the interested and ambitious Designs of France, so very dangerous to the Freedom and Independency of every State in it.

It is most apparent to us, that the House of Austria (which in these later Ages has, in Conjunction with other Powers, so often check'd the Progress of the House of Bourbon towards universal Empire) would have been utterly ruined, had it not been, through your Majesty's great Wisdom, supported by its ancient and natural Allies of Great Britain and the States General. The Cause is common; our own Freedom and Independency, as well as theirs, depends upon the reciprocal Aid and Assistance of one another, in all such Times of common Danger; and are only to be secured by such a Peace as may restore and preserve a just Equilibrium of Power in Europe; such a Balance of Power, as may oblige the House of Bourbon to rest satisfied with the large and extensive Dominions which it now possesses, and effectually to restrain it from thus wantonly waisting the Blood and Treasures of its own Subjects, as well as of other Nations, in making Conquests and Encroachments upon other States, on every plausible Occasion of Success.

We likewise beg Leave to lay hold of this Opportunity to congratulate your Majesty upon the Increase of your Royal Family by the Birth of another Prince to his Royal Highness; and also on the Marriage of your Royal Daughter to the Prince Royal of Denmark, which will prove a further Strength and Security to the Protestant Interest in Europe.

That your Majesty's Reign may be long and prosperous; and that there may never be wanting one of your Royal House to sway the Scepter over us, is the fervent Prayer of,

May it please your Majesty,

and faithful Subjects and Servants.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Provost, Bailiffs, Deacons of Crafts and Remanent Members of the Council of the Burgh of Forfar in Common Council assembled.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Arrival in Britain, and the Success of the Army in Germany under your Royal Command; the Preservation of your Majesty's sacred Person, is a Blessing not to be forgot; as we hope it tends not only to restore our decay'd Trade, but settling the Tranquility, and restoring the Balance of Power in Europe.

We beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the Birth of a young Prince; an additional Pledge of our future Happiness; and of the Princess Louisa's Marriage with the Prince Royal of Denmark, another happy Event for strengthening the Protestant Succession in your illustrious House.

Cumberland, in Port Royal Harbour, Jamaica,
November 7.

On the 28th of September arrived his Majesty's Ship the Adventure from her Cruize off St. Jago, and brought in with her two Sloops, the one an English Sloop retaken, the other Spanish with some Cocoa on-board, but both Vessels were deserted by the Spaniards, who got a-shore. Likewise the same Day the Cumberland Man of War's Tender came in with a Spanish Scooner, which she had taken off of Cape Cruse, of considerable Value; as did also his Majesty's Ship the Experiment, which had seen Captain Stevens in the Ludlow Castle with his Convoy clear of Crooked Island. And on the 25th arrived the Sea Horse from cruising in the Windward Passage, and brought in with her a Spanish Scooner, which she had taken off of
Cape

Cape Nichola with Hides, but the Spaniards made their Escape a-shore.

Cumberland, in Port-Royal Harbour, Jamaica, November 8.

This Day arrived here from off of Porto Rico, his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Litchfield, Capt. Burnaby Commander, with two Privateer Sloops taken in her Cruise, the one called the St. Raphael, whose Men all left her and went a-shore, and scuttled her, endeavouring to sink her: She has Ports for 14 Guns. The other called the St. Antonio de las Animas, with eight Carriage and 14 Swivel Guns, and 42 Men: Besides which, she sunk and destroyed two more Privateers, the one off the East End of Hispaniola, and the other off the West End of Porto Rico, and burnt another Sloop in Aguada Bay, and destroyed a Battery a-shore, which she had got under, of four Guns, and landing some Men, with an Officer, dismounted the said Guns, knock'd off the Trunnions, spik'd them up, burnt the Carriages and Guard-Houses, and brought off the Colours in the Presence of a Multitude of Spaniards, of whom they are suppos'd to have killed near 200, and with the Loss of but one Man.

Petersbourg, Dec. 17. The Czarina has put off her Journey to Moscow till the latter End of February or the Beginning of March, on account of the Great Duke's Indisposition, and her Majesty has declared her Intention of staying a Year at Moscow when she goes next to that Place.

Florence, Jan. 7, N. S. On the 1st Instant a Battalion arrived here from Leghorn, consisting of about 950 Men, lately raised in Tuscany, mostly of German Deserters; and on the 3d, escorted by Detachments of the Lorraine Regiment, Foot Guards and Cuirassiers Militia, was set in March without Arms to Bologne, to be received on the Confines by others from Prince Lobcowitz, and by them to be conducted to join the Austrian Army, in Consequence of an Agreement between the Queen of Hungary and the Great Duke, reciprocally to restore the Deserters of each State. As these Soldiers were going out of the Gates of Florence, some Disorder arose on their declining to march to the said Army, but M. de Braitwitz went to them at some Distance out of the Town, and induced them to proceed on their March. The same Day a Battalion of the Lorraine Regiment Foot Guards from Leghorn arrived at Florence, to join their Regiment. The same Day, the 1st, an equal Number of Troops out of Mess. Capponi and Pandolfini's Regiments Militia, from Prato, Pistoia, Pescia, &c. were ordered to Leghorn to replace those marched to join Prince Lobcowitz. On the 3d the Regiment of Militia Cuirassiers was also ordered to march to Leghorn. Dispositions are making all over Tuscany to compleat the old Militia, and for raising new Corps. We do not hear any fresh Particulars with regard to the Armies in the Romagna;

both of them remain in their former Situations. On the 26th past the Duke of Modena, attended by Marquess Gherardini, Count Tabatini, and some few of his Domesticks, set out from Fano for Venice, having left the Spanish Army on account of the Disagreements between him, M. de Gages, and the Spanish Generals. This Day, the 7th of January, being the Day fixed for the Nuptials at Vienna of Prince Charles of Lorraine and the Archdutchess Marianne, the Members of the Regency received the Compliments of the foreign Ministers, Nobility, and military Officers in their rich Habits; on which Occasion a Quantity of Bread and Wine was, by Order of the Government, distributed to the Poor; and in the Evening there are to be artificial Fireworks at the old Palace. The Cannon of the Castles is to be fired, and a great Illumination to be made in the Theatre.

Berlin, Jan. 14. Prince William of Hesse left this Place on the 11th Instant, and his Prussian Majesty goes to Potsdam in a few Days; after which he returns here again, and is not to set out for Silesia till the Month of March, towards the Time of the Fair of Breslaw.

Liege, Jan. 17. A few Days ago Count Figuerola, Minister from the Queen of Hungary, arrived here to take Care of the Interests of that Princess at the ensuing Election of a Bishop and Prince of Liege. M. Burrish has also presented new Credentials to the Chapter on the Part of his Britannick Majesty, and was complimented the next Day in the Name of the Chapter by their Ecolatre, or Orator, M. Clerx. Yesterday Count Virmundt, Grand Judge of Wetzlar, arrived here in Quality of Imperial Commissary to preside at the ensuing Election.

Whereas the Post-Boy carrying the North Mail from Huntington to Stilton, was Yesterday, the 11th Instant, about Six in the Evening, attacked on the Highway at a Place called Stangate Hole, by a single Highwayman, who presented a Pistol to the Post-Boy's Breast, and carried off the following Bags, viz. Durham, Hull, Bolton, Falkingham, Lincoln, Horncastle, Louth, Spalding, Stamford, Bourn, and Peterborough.

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The Person who committed this Robbery is a lusty Man, and had on a large dark Frock over his Coat, his Face was covered with Black, and he rode on a dark Sorrel Horse with a White Face, and made off for the Bigg Swade Road.

This therefore is to give Notice, That whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether Accomplices in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make a Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
