

from his most Christian Majesty, to make a step home, in order to his being present at the Assembly of the States of *Bretagne*, of which Province he is Governor, but so as to leave his Equipage here, and to be back again in a month or six weeks at farthest. The Dutch continue to insist to have the Duke of *Lorraine* admitted as a Principal into the Treaty, and on all occasions deport themselves with a great deal of height and insolence.

Paris, Octob. 3. From *Tournay* they write, that the Prince of *Conde* having been troubled with several fits of the Gout, was returning to that place, leaving his Army Encamped near *Leuze*, between *Aeth* and *Tournay*; that he had sent out a party of 4000 Horse, under the Command of the *Mareschal d'Humieres*, who, after having joyned with another Body of Horse, to be sent by the Duke of *Luxemburgh*, were ordered to march towards *Liege*, to observe the motions of the Prince of *Orange*. It is said that the Prince of *Conde* will come and pass the winter here, and that in that case, the *Mareschal Bellefonds* will Command the Kings Forces in *Flanders*; and that the *Mareschal de Crequi* is to Command a Body of an Army on the Frontiers of *Catalonia*.

Paris, Nov. 7. From *Provence* they write, that the Governor of the Castle of *Orange* having refused to receive his Majesties Orders, the *Sieur Routh* Intendant of Justice in that Province, had assembled the Militia of the Countrey, and besieged the said Castle, of which a German Colonel was some time since put in by the Prince of *Orange* to be Governor. From *St. Quentin* they tell us, that 500 Spanish Horse which came out of *Cambray*, were advanced very near to that place, and had burnt and plundered several Villages; and that the Prince of *Conde* upon notice thereof has sent out 1000 Horse, Commanded by the Count *de Braglio*, to fall upon them, or to force them to retreat; of which we expect an account.

Amsterdam, November 6. Several Capers are sayd out of the *Texel*, and it is said, more are fitting out to follow them. There are indeed a great many Capers now at Sea, though they meet with so little purchase, that they begin to be very much discouraged. All the news we have here is, that the French have slighted *Woerden*, *Bommel*, and *Cro-weceur*, and that they are about doing the like at *Swol*, *Campen*, and *Thiel* in *Over-Issel*, intending to compose a considerable Body of Men, of the Troops that shall be drawn out of those places. The East-land Ships which were missing, are now all safely arrived in the *Texel*.

Hague, Nov. 7. It is reported here very confidently, that the French are about quitting several of their Conquests in *Utrecht* and *Over-Issel*, in order to the reinforcing their Armies with the Troops they shall draw out from thence; and we have Letters from *Amsterdam* which say, that they had already quitted *Woerden*, and that two of our Regiments from *Newerbrug* had entred the place, and taken possession of it, but this is not certain. From the Prince of *Oranges* Camp we have Letters of the second instant which say; That the Army was come to *Grach*, on the other side of *Bon*; That a party of Imperialists under the Command of the *Marquis de Grana*, were come to *Lintz* (where they had put a Garrison) and *Andermach*, and that at the coming away of these Letters, they were but five Leagues asunder, but that General *Montecuculi* with the gros of the Army was still in the neighborhood of *Coblentz*. All Military Officers are Commanded by a publick Placaet, forthwith to repair to their several Commands.

Brussels Nov. 8 The 6 instant Monsieur Van *Benningen*, who was sent hither by the States-General to

concert the most effectual means for the hindring all Communication and Commerce with the Subjects of His most Christian Majesty, having concluded that affair, returned again on his way home. Our Letters from the *Rhine* tell us, that the Vanguard of the Imperial Army was come to *Lintz* and *Andermach*, in which places they had put Garrisons; That the Dutch and Spanish Troops, under the Command of the Prince of *Orange*, were pass'd by *Bonne*; and that the fourth instant was to be the intended Conjunction. From *Liege* they write of the 5 instant, that the *Mareschal d'Humieres* was decamp'd with the Cavalry under his Command, out of the neighborhood of *Mactricht*; That the third instant came up to him three Squadrons of Horse more, drawn out of the French Conquests in *Utrecht*, and Commanded by the Count *de Choiseul*; That night the said Mareschal having now about 10000 men with him, Encamp'd at *Gulpen*, and the next day at *Rolduc*, taking their way, as is generally believed towards *Nuis*.

Ghent, Novemb. 9. Not any Action pass'd in these Countries; the Contributions are setled on both sides, which we are forced to pay to the very Walls of this Town, to keep our selves from being plundered and burnt by the French, though our Governor the Count *de Monterey* has Commanded privately to contract with the French for three Months. The French have lately with a Convoy of 4000 Men, brought near 700 Waggones, laden with Provisions and all other Necessaries, into *Charleroy* and *Mactricht*, so that those places will be sufficiently provided for this Winter. By assassengers come from *Bisette*, and those other places, we have advice, that the French are now demolishing *Lo-mel* and *Crovecum*. From *Zealand* our Letters tell us, that their Capers bring in very little purchase, which very much disheartens those people, who have their chief subsistence from thence; That four of their Capers were lost in the late bad weather, and that two or three more have been taken by the English. From the *Rhine* they write, of the third instant, that General *Montecuculi* was come down with 10000 Imperialists to *Andermach*, and that the Prince of *Orange* was marching with his Army that way, to joyn them, which being done, it is said; his Highness will return with the Forces under his Command into these parts, and leave the Imperialists on the *Rhine*. From *Liege* we hear, that the *Mareschal d'Humieres* was pass'd by that place, with a Body of 8 or 9000 Men under his Command, towards the Electorate of *Cologne*, and that he expected to be followed by several thousand more; which were to be drawn out of the Conquered places in the Province of *Utrecht*. The Count *de Monterey* has forbidden the importation of all French Manufactures into these Countries.
