To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council affembled, having heard, that Attempts are forming by the common Difturbers of the Peace and Franquility of Europe, in Favour of a Popish Pretender, to interrupt that Happines we thankfully enjoy under your Majefty's Government, humbly beg Leave to take this earlieft Opportunity, to express our greatest Concern for, and Abhorrence of this Indignity intended against your Majesty and these Kingdoms.

We have no Reason to doubt, but that, by the Bleffing of God on your Majefty's Arms, our Enemies will be difappointed in their Expectations, (as your Majesty's Subjects must be too fenfible of the Bleffings of Liberty, Property, and the free Exercife of their Religion, which they enjoy under your most auspicious Reign, to exchange them for a Certain, Arbitrary, and Tyrannical Government; fo the Loyalty and Unanimity of your faithful Subjects, will greatly tend to discourage these desperate Endeavours to deftroy and fubvert our excellent Conftitution,) We therefore beg Leave most humbly to affure your Majesty, of our firm and fincerest Attachment to your facred Perfon and Government, and our prefent happy Establishment in Church and State; and that no Endeavours of Ours shall, (even at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes,) be wanting to frustrate these Attempts, to the Prejudice of both, and to fecure the Laws and Liberties of this Country, and the Prote-ftant Succeffion in your Majefty's most Illustrious House, to latest Generations.

To which His Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

I Take very kindly this feasonable Mark of ing; but we are informed he defigns to be in your Duty and Affection to me. The City Town on Thursday or Friday next. Petersbourg, Jan. 21. On the 17th Inftant arrived here from Stockholm Count Barck, who is to fucceed General During, as his Swedifh Majesty's Minister at this Court. The next Day M. Holften came hither with the Character of Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Denmark. Yesterday in the Asternoon the Great Duke set out for Mostow : On Account of his Health his Imperial Highness is to travel flow, and be eight or ten Days upon the Road. This Morning the Foreign Ministers, and other Perfons of Diflinction, still remaining here, went to pay their Compliments, and wifh the Em-prefs a good Journey. At Noon her Imperial Majefty fet out, propofing to arrive at Mofcow on the 24th Instant in the Evening, or early the next Morning. During the Abfence of Field Marfhal Lacy, who is gone from Riga to Mofcow, to affift at the Feftivals which the Empress intends to celebrate there, Lieutenant General Prince Repnin remains as Vice-Governor at Petersbourg; and his Brother, who is a Major General, is appointed Governor of that Part of Finland which her Imperial Majefty acquired by the late Treaty of Peace with Sweden,

and refides at Wyburg. Stockholm, Jan. 24, O.S. Yesterday the King of Sweden removed from hence to Grifelham, where he proposes to spend a few Days in hunting the Bear. Amongst other Perfons of Diftinction, his Swediffr Majefty is accompanied by General Keith, Commander in Chief of the Empress of Russia's Troops in Sweden. To-morrow the Prince Royal is likewile to leave this Capital, on a Progress to Upfal, and other Northern Parts of this Kingdom. Senator Count Charles Gyllenbourg, being Chancellor of the University of Upsal, fet out Yesterday for that Place, in order to receive his Royal Highnes, with the Ceremonies due to the Successor to the Crown.

Stockbolm, Jan. 31, O. S. His Swedish Ma-jesty is still taking the Diversion of Bear Hunt-Six Dalecarlians, viz> Guftavus Schedin, Schin-net Per Anderson, Holberts Anders Ericson, Schmeed Anders Matzon, Gislair Eric Hanson, Carl Olofson Beronius, who were the Chiefe and Ring-leaders in the Rebellion which happen ed last Summer, were beheaded at the usua Place

Place of Execution, without the South Gate of this Town. The first, viz. Gustavus Schedin had his Right Hand cut off, before he was beheaded, and his Body was afterwards cut into four Quarters, and laid on Wheels near the Gallows.

Naples, January 28. In the last Week a Council was held before the King, in Confequence of the Dispatches this Court had received from that of Madrid and M. de Gages, but nothing could be learned of what was refolved therein. The Military Difpolitions are however continued with great Diligence; and Orders have been fent to the four Provinces of Abruzzo, Terri di Lavoro, Apuglia, and Calabria, to provide 500 Horses for remounting of the King's Cavalry.

Florence, Feb. 4. The lateft Letters from Lombardy inform us, that the Poffeffion of Placentia and the adjacent Ceffions in Favour of the King of Sardinia, was fulpended, on Account of fome Difagreement in the Execution thereof, between his Commiffaries and those of the Queen of Hungary; on which Account far-ther Instructions were expected from the Court of Vienna. The Armies in the Romagna continue in their former Situation, notwithstanding the Motions which of late have been observed amongst them. On the 28th and 31st past, the fecond and third Battalion of Pallavicini's Regiment of Foot, palled by Bologna to join Prince Lobcowitz's Army. M. de Gages, on the Approach of the English Ships of War to the Coafts of Pefaro, Fano, Sinigaglia, &c. which Places they have in a Manner blocked up, has caufed a Battery of four large Cannons to be placed to command the Road of Pelaro, and another of five Pieces on the Mole of Fano, in order to fecure his Provisions by Sea, those Ships fuffering no Veffel to pafs, and having taken of late feveral with Provisions for the Spaniards. In the last Week, an Officer belonging to the Garrifon of Orbitello arrived at Florence, with a Letter from the Governor to Prince Craon, complaining, on the Part of the King of the Two Sicilies, of the 950 German Recruits which the Regency had fuffered to be fent from Tufcany to Prince Lobcowitz's Army, and of the large Quantity of Provisions, &c. which are getting together at Arezzo and Cortona, as if defigned for an Encampment, as contrary to the Neutrality. This Letter was on the 30th past confidered in Council, and a general Anfwer was by the Regency returned to the Governor of Orbitello. At the Request of M. de Gages, the Regency, for the Security of the Passage of the Spanish Couriers through Tuscany, have offer'd, that a Detachment of the Great Duke's Cuiraffiers shall effort the faid Couriers to the Confines of Tuícany.

Hague, Feb. 25, N.S. Baron Boetzelaer, one of the Nobles of the Province of Holland, and Commissioner of the Admiralty in the College of Amsterdam, is appointed by their High Mightinefles to go as Minister Extraordinary of the Republick to the British Court: And that Gen-tleman is making the necessary Preparations for The Duke of Aremberg his Tourney thither. is foon expected here in his Way to England : His Journey has been delayed upon Account of the Death of his Mother.

Portsmouth, February 15.

Yesterday at Noon the Right Honourable Sir John Norris made a Signal for Weighing with his Squadron from St. Helens. Half an Hour afterwards, Mr. Hughes, the Commissioner of the Navy at Portfmouth, received an Express, and immediately fent his Boat with it after Sir John Norris, which reached him at three Quarters paft Three o'Clock, almost three Leagues without Bembridge Ledge.

The Coxfwain of the Boat, at his Return on Shore, told the Commiffioner, that feveral Ships appeared in the South East, to which Sir John Norris gave Chace.
