THIS Day the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of London, waited on His Majesty with the following Address.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, having heard, that Attempts are forming by the common Disturbers of the Peace and Tranquility of Europe, in Favour of a Popish Pretender, to interrupt that Happiness we thankfully enjoy under your Majesty's Government, humbly beg Leave to take this earliest Opportunity, to express our greatest Concern for, and Abhorrence of this Indignity intended against your Majesty and these Kingdoms.

We have no Reason to doubt, but that, by the Blessing of God on your Majesty's Arms, our Enemies will be disappointed in their Expectations, (as your Majesty's Subjects must be too sensible of the Blessings of Liberty, Property, and the free Exercise of their Religion, which they enjoy under your most auspicious Reign, to exchange them for a Certain, Arbitrary, and Tyrannical Government; so the Loyalty and Unanimity of your faithful Subjects, will greatly tend to discourage these desperate Endeavours to destroy and subvert our excellent Constitution.) We therefore beg Leave most humbly to assure your Majesty, of our firm and sincerest Attachment to your sacred Person and Government, and our present happy Establishment in Church and State; and that no Endeavours of Ours shall, (even at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes,) be wanting to frustrate these Attempts, to the Prejudice of both, and to secure the Laws and Liberties of this Country, and the Protestant Succession in your Majesty's most Illustrious House, to latest Generations.

To which His Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

I Take very kindly this seasonable Mark of your Duty and Affection to me. The City of London may always depend upon my Protection and Favour; and I have the firmest Confidence, That you will exert your Authority upon this Occasion for the Security of the City and the Preservation of the publick Peace, and for the Support of my Government.

They were received very graciously, and all had the Honour to kiss his Majesty's Hand; And his Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on the Right Honourable Robert Westley, Esq; Lord Mayor, Mr. Serjeant Simon Urlin, Recorder, Mr. Alderman Daniel Lambert, Mr. Alderman Robert Willmott, Mr. Sheriff Robert Ladbroke, and Mr. Sheriff William Calvert.

Petersbourg, Jan. 21. On the 17th Instant arrived here from Stockholm Count Barck, who is to succeed General During, as his Swedish Majesty's Minister at this Court. The next Day M. Holsten came hither with the Character of Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Denmark. Yesterday in the Afternoon the Great Duke set out for Moscow: On Account of his Health his Imperial Highness is to travel slow, and be eight or ten Days upon the Road. This Morning the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, still remaining here, went to pay their Compliments, and with the Empress a good Journey. At Noon her Imperial Majesty set out, proposing to arrive at Moscow on the 24th Instant in the Evening, or early the next Morning. During the Absence of Field Marshal Lacy, who is gone from Riga to Moscow, to assist at the Festivals which the Empress intends to celebrate there, Lieutenant General Prince Repnin remains as Vice-Governor at Petersbourg; and his Brother, who is a Major General, is appointed Governor of that Part of Finland which her Imperial Majesty acquired by the late Treaty of Peace with Sweden, and resides at Wyburg.

Stockholm, Jan. 24, O. S. Yesterday the King of Sweden removed from hence to Griselham, where he proposes to spend a few Days in hunting the Bear. Amongst other Persons of Distinction, his Swedish Majesty is accompanied by General Keith, Commander in Chief of the Empress of Russia's Troops in Sweden. To-morrow the Prince Royal is likewise to leave this Capital, on a Progress to Upsal, and other Northern Parts of this Kingdom. Senator Count Charles Gyllenbourg, being Chancellor of the University of Upsal, set out Yesterday for that Place, in order to receive his Royal Highness, with the Ceremonies due to the Successor to the Crown.

Stockholm, Jan. 31, O. S. His Swedish Majesty is still taking the Diversion of Bear Hunting; but we are informed he designs to be in Town on Thursday or Friday next. Yesterday Six Dalecarlians, viz: Gustavus Schedin, Schinner Per Anderson, Holberts Anders Ericson, Schmeed Anders Matzon, Gillair Eric Hanson, Carl Olofson Beronius, who were the Chief and Ring-leaders in the Rebellion which happened last Summer, were beheaded at the usual Place.

Naples, January 28. In the last Week a Council was held before the King, in Consequence of the Dispatches this Court had received from that of Madrid and M. de Gages, but nothing could be learned of what was resolved therein. The Military Dispositions are however continued with great Diligence; and Orders have been sent to the four Provinces of Abruzzo, Terri di Lavoro, Apulia, and Calabria, to provide 500 Horses for remounting of the King's Cavalry.

Florence, Feb. 4. The latest Letters from Lombardy inform us, that the Possession of Placentia and the adjacent Cessions in Favour of the King of Sardinia, was suspended, on Account of some Disagreement in the Execution thereof, between his Commissaries and those of the Queen of Hungary; on which Account farther Instructions were expected from the Court of Vienna. The Armies in the Romagna continue in their former Situation, notwithstanding the Motions which of late have been observed amongst them. On the 28th and 31st past, the second and third Battalion of Pallavicini's Regiment of Foot, passed by Bologna to join Prince Lobcowitz's Army. M. de Gages, on the Approach of the English Ships of War to the Coasts of Pesaro, Fano, Sinigaglia, &c. which Places they have in a Manner blocked up, has caused a Battery of four large Cannons to be placed to command the Road of Pesaro, and another of five Pieces on the Mole of Fano, in order to secure his Provisions by Sea, those Ships suffering no Vessel to pass, and having taken of late several with Provisions for the Spaniards. In the last Week, an Officer belonging to the Garrison of Orbitello arrived at Florence, with a Letter from the Governor to Prince Craon, complaining, on the Part of the King of the Two Sicilies, of the 950 German Recruits which the Regency had suffered to be sent from Tuscany to Prince Lobcowitz's Army, and of the large Quantity of Provisions, &c. which are getting together at Arezzo and Cortona, as if designed for an Encampment, as contrary to the Neutrality. This Letter was on the 30th past considered in Council, and a general Answer was by the Regency returned to the Governor of Orbitello. At the Request of M. de Gages, the Regency, for the Security of the Passage of the Spanish Couriers through Tuscany, have offer'd, that a Detachment of the Great Duke's Cuirassiers shall escort the said Couriers to the Confines of Tuscany.

Hague, Feb. 25, N. S. Baron Boetzelaer, one of the Nobles of the Province of Holland, and Commissioner of the Admiralty in the College of Amsterdam, is appointed by their High Mightinesses to go as Minister Extraordinary of the Republick to the British Court: And that Gentleman is making the necessary Preparations for his Journey thither. The Duke of Aremberg is soon expected here in his Way to England: His Journey has been delayed upon Account of the Death of his Mother.

Portsmouth, February 15.

Yesterday at Noon the Right Honourable Sir John Norris made a Signal for Weighing with

his Squadron from St. Helens. Half an Hour afterwards, Mr. Hughes, the Commissioner of the Navy at Portsmouth, received an Express, and immediately sent his Boat with it after Sir John Norris, which reached him at three Quarters past Three o'Clock, almost three Leagues without Bembridge Ledge.

The Coxswain of the Boat, at his Return on Shore, told the Commissioner, that several Ships appeared in the South East, to which Sir John Norris gave Chace.

Sir John Norris arrived Yesterday, at Two o'Clock in the Afternoon, in the Downs, with his Majesty's Squadron under his Command.
