HIS Day the following Address of the Arch-Bifhop, Bifhops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation affembled, was prefented to his Majesty by his Grace the Arch-Bithop of Canterbury, being introduced by the Hon. Mr. Vice Chamberlain Finch.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Arch-Bishop, Bithops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation affembled.

Most gracious Sovereign, WE the Arch-Bilhop, Bilhops and Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation affembled, animated with unfeigned. and affectionate Loyalty, humbly beg Leave to declare, in the ftrongeft Manner, the just Indignation we feel on the Efforts made by France in Favour of a Popifh Pretender, folemnly renounced and abjur'd by this Nation. This wicked and daring Attempt, excites in

the Breaft of every true Englishman and Protestant, the utmost Detestation, and in the most fensible Manner affects all your Majesty's Clergy of the Church of England; who, should it prove fuccessful, must unquestionably fall an early Sacrifice to the implacable and certain, though occafionally diffembled, Rage of Popifh Superftition. It is big with every Evil which can undo a free People, fubvert the principal Bulwark of the Reformation, and thereby at length deftroy the whole Protestant Interest : And it is heinously aggravated by the intended Introduction of a French Army, first to ravage and lay waste our dear Country; and, having made England a Scene of Blood and Devastation, then to reduce it to the wretched Condition of a French Province. 2 4

Such an alarming Circumstance adds Horror to our Refentment, and places the faithlefs and ambitious Enemies of your Majefty's Crown and People in the most odious and detestable Light.

We earneftly pray, and asfuredly hope, that the fame good Providence, greatly propitious to the Protestant Religion and the Liberties of Europe, which very lately covered your facred Head in the Day of Battle, and bleffed your Majefty with a fignal and ever memorable Victory, will not fuffer any Weapon, formed against you, to profper, but will still preferve your Royal Perfon in Safety, Health and Glory; and long, very long continue to a loyal and thankful People, the many great and invaluable Bleffings of your Majesty's wife and happy Reign, and transmit the same in your August and Royal House, to our latest Posterity.
