WE your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, being deeply sensible of the invaluable Blessings we enjoy under your auspicious Reign, in the full and undisturb'd Possession of our Religion, Liberties, and whatever else can be dear to us, humbly beg Leave, with other your Majesty's most loyal Subjects, to express our great Concern at the perfidious and horrid Intentions, form'd by foreign and domestick Enemies, against your Majesty and these Kingdoms, in Favour of a popish Pretender; assuring your Majesty, that as we are firmly resolv'd to use our heartiest and most zealous Endeavours to frustrate, within the Verge of our Power, every Design we shall observe carrying on in pursuit of such villanous Purposes, so shall our Fidelity and Attachment to your sacred Person and your illustrious Family, sincere and uniform as they ever were, appear on this Occasion untainted and inviolable; not doubting, but that the joint Efforts of your Majesty's faithful People, when thus vigorous and steady, will either urge our Enemies to abandon their weak and wicked Counsels, already disprov'd by the seasonable Interposition of Providence; or that, through the further Blessing of Heaven upon your Majesty's just and provident Measures, they will be attended, in the Day of Trial, with Events not less remarkable and beneficial than those that lately graced the Fields of Dettingen.
