The following Address of the High Sheriff, Juffices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Hereford, has been prefented to his Majesty by Thomas Foley, Efq; one of the Representatives of the faid County, accompanied by the Right Hon. the Earl of Oxford, and feveral other Gentlemen of the faid County, who were in-troduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Rochford.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Juffices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Hereford, met at the Affizes held at the City of Hereford the 10th of March 1743.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

YOUR Majesty having been pleased, by a most gracious Message, to acquaint the Parliament, that Defigns are carrying on by France to invade your Majesty's Dominions in Favour of a popilh Pretender. We your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly beg Leave to express our great Concern for, and Abhorrence of fuch a wicked Attempt, which offers fo great an Indignity to your Majefty's Perfon and Royal Family, fo high an Infult to the whole Kingdom, and which tends to deprive us of our Laws, Liberties and Religion.

And we most humbly beg Leave to affure your Majesty of our most firm Attachment to your facred Perfon and Royal Family, and our happy Establishment in Church and State; and that our utmost Endeavours shall be exerted to fupport and defend your Majesty's Title to the Crown, and the Protestant Succession in your Royal Family, in Opposition to France, the Pretender and his Adherents.

And we doubt not but this great Good will arife from this perfidious Attempt, that the Enemies of your Majefty and of this Nation, will be convinced, that the Loyalty of your Ma-jefty's British Subjects is fo unanimous, that by the Bleffing of God upon it, all Endeavours to diffurb the Peace of your Majesty's Reign, or undermine our excellent Conftitution, will be fruitlefs.

That your Majesty may long enjoy a happy Reign over a free, loyal, prosperous and united People, is the fincere Prayer of,

May it pleafe your Majesty, Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

The following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the City of Hereford, has been prefented to his Majefty by Thomas Winford, Efq; one of the Representatives for the faid City; being introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Rochford.

To the King's most Excellent Majefty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen and Citizens of the City of Hereford, in Common Council affembled:

W E your Majesty's loyal Subjects, having seen your Royal Proclamation, whereby it appears, that your Majefty hath received undoubted Intelligence of the Arrival of the Pretender's eldeft Son in France, and that Preparations are making there to invade this Kingdom, beg Leave to unite, with the reft of your Majefty's true and faithful Subjects, in giving our utmost Assurances, that we deteil and abhor this infolent Attempt, calculated to introduce a popifh and arbitrary Government, and to fubvert our Conffitution both in Church and State.

Our Religion, our Laws, our Liberties, our Properties, and all that is valuable to us, most juftly, on this Emergency, call upon every Englifhman, upon every Protestant, to declare their Principles, to exert their Zeal and Loyalty in Defence of our Constitution, and to frustrate the Schemes of France, whole Friendship hath ever been as fallacious, as her Ambition infatiable.

And as this ancient City hath ever been eminently diffinguished for its Loyalty to their Sovereign, fo we, the prefent Members of it, will endeavour to fupport that Honour, and preferve that Character, by using our best Endeavours in Defence of your Majesty's Royal Person, of our Religion and Laws, and of the Protestant Succeffion as by Law eftablished.

We beg Leave to fubjoin our hearty Wilhes, that your Majefty's Forces may be fuccefsful both by Sea and Land; and that, under your Majefty's aufpicious Government, we may be a free and happy People.

In Testimony whereof, we have hereunto put our common Seal, the Sixteenth Day of March 1743.
