Genouz, Offeber 28. • E have not yet any acvice of the arrival of our Envoy, Signior Dura 70 at the Court of France, whither he is gone to endeavor finally to compose the misunder flandings between us and that Crown,

though the Spaniards have not been wanting on their fide to labor the contrary, and to keep us from giving his most Christian Majesty fatisfaction in the points now in difference between us. From Rome we hear, that the Pope is often indiposed, chiefly occasioned by his great age, but that he still overcomes it, to the great joy of his Relations. Sir John Finch, designed Ambassador from His Majesty of Great Brittain, to the Port, is at prefent at Leghorn, where he is Treated by the Grand Duke, and the Ministers of that Court, with great Honours and Respect, as well in regard of his Character, as the great effect they have of his perfon. We are much taken up with discourses of a War between the Crowns of France and Spain.

Vienna, Oct. 29. Our lait Letters from the Court at Gratz tell us, that their Imperial Majesties had deferred their departure from thence, till the fifth of the next Month, and would then come to Newstadt, whither the Empicis Dowager will go to visit their Imperial Majefties; in the mean time we begin to make preparations here, for the folemn reception of their Majefties, but it feems the Emperor will not have it, an has finite acquaint the Magistrates of this place, that, he will not have them put themfelves to that charge. The Regiment that was lately Commanded by Colonel Zeys Deceased, is given to the Duke of Cur Letters from Hungary tell us, Bournonville. that though the firength of the Rebels is much decreafed, the Imperial Troops having of late routed them in feveral Rencounters, yet they continue to get together in fmall Bodies and very much to diffurb the Peace of those Conuties; A Party of them lately at-tacked a like number of the Imperialis, Commanded by the Brother of General Barcozzi, and had the good fortune to rout them, taking fevetal of them, together with their chief Officer Prifoners, which the faid General having notice of, went immediately in purfuit of them, overtook them, and redeemed the Priloners.

Hambrough, Nov. 3. The Emperor has fent his Mandates throughout all Germany, to recall all those that are Subjects of the Empire, out of the fervice of any Forreign Prince, though we do not learn, that they have had any great effect. The Swedes go on with their Building of the Town, called Carolftadt, below Bremen, and have advanced it very much this Summer, but the winter coming on, it is faid, they will give over the Work till Spring. The Swedish Troops in these parts begin to move, and give their Neighbors fome jealousite. The bad weather has done us great harm, dmongst other Ships lost, we hear of one, that had Ioo new raised Men on board for the Dutch, who were all drowned.

Laxemburgh, Nov. 5. The French in Treves, are very basy about fortifying that place, and in the interim Monfieur de Turenne, who lies with his Armybefween Spirc and Wormes, is difpoing himfelf to march towards that place, having reintoreed himfelf with the Troops that were Commanded by the Marquis de Vanbiun, as likewife with a Body of Horfe which we are told, the Elector Palatine had fent him. The firft inftant General Montecuculi paffed with his Infantry by Coblentz, towards Bon. and the next day the Cavalry marched through that place, and took likewife their way down the Khyne.

Amsterdam, Nov. 10. We had news here that the French had demolished Campun, but it proves not true ; the 18 inflant the French Garrifon marched out of swoll; The Dutch we hear had a defign to furprize the Town of Elburg on the South Sea near Campen, to which purpose Colonel Stockheim was ordered to march out of Naerden with 2000 Men, which he did, but the French having notice thereof, put themfelves into a posture to receive the Enemy, who thereupon thought not fit to put their intended defign in execution. From Utrecht we have advice, That the Duke of Luxemburg is bringing an Army together with all poffible diligence, to march with it towards Cologne to relieve Eon; and that Colonel Par, late Governor of Naerden had received his Sentence, viz. to be uncapable of ever ferving his Majelty again, and be confined to a perpetual prison. Three of the East-India Companies Ships are failed out of the Texel for the Indics.

Strasbourg, Nov. 4. The Imperial Army is marched down the Rhyne, and as we fuppole, arrived by this time at Goblens?. The 30 paft Monsteur de Turenne having passed the Rhyne over a Bridge of Boats which he had caused to be brought from Phillipsbourg came and Encamped under the Cannon of Spire 3 and receiveing advice of the narch of the Imperialist, broke up immediately from thence, and advanced with his Army in Battaile through Aumiller, Rotalben, Newsfadt 4 and KeyserLutem, and fo into the Electorate of Treves, in order to the preventing any defign which the Imperialists might have there. The Marquis de Vaubrun having joyned his Troops to those Commanded by Munficur de Turenne, is gone for Alfatia, where it is faid, he is to Command a Body of 6000 Horse for the fecurity of that Province.

Nuis, Nov, 7. The Vantguard of the Imperial Army Commanded by the Marquis de Grana, having joyned the Dutch and Spanish Troops, Commanded by the Prince of Orange, it was refolved to Bessiege Bon, though we know that the place is provided with a very good Garrison, and all other things necessary for its defence. The Dutch before this Siege, made themfelves Masters of a small Town called Rheinbachs about three Leagues from Bon, putting all to the fword they found in Arms, which were about 300. as well Soldiers as Burgers, because they refused to furrender upon the Princes Summons. The Elector of Cologne continues shill in that Town.

Liege, Nov. 12. The Affembly of the States of this Countrey, is now finished; they bying notwithftanding
