terrible Fire from fo many Batteries of Cannon, your Majesty's British, and other auxiliary Troops, animated by your Prefence, and encouraged by your great Example of Firmness and Intrepidity in the Midst of Danger, (always fo confpicuous in your illustrious House) overcame all Difficulties, and which must therefore render fuch a Victory the more Glorious in the Eyes of all Men.

We praife the Almighty for preferving your Majefty in the Day of Battle, as also his Royal Highness the Duke, (and for the Recovery of the Wound he then receiv'd) whole Gallant Behaviour was fo eminently manifested on this important Occafion.

We also prefume to express the Joy of our Hearts on the farther Increase of the Royal Family, by the Birth of another Son to their Royal Highneffes the Prince and Princess of Wales; as well as of the Marriage of the Princess Louisa to the Prince of Denmark, (another Demonstration of your Majefty's constant Care to cement and improve the Protestant Interest in Europe.)

Our Duty, Loyalty and common Intereft, call upon us at this Time, to declare the utmost Abhorrence of the late Perfidy of the French King, and to affure your Majefty of our unshaken Zeal and Attachment to your Royal Perfon and Family; and when we reflect that no Motives could produce fuch rafh Attempts, as the Invation of this Kingdom, and a Declaration of War against your Majesty, but the most infamous, as well as strong Resentment, af the Check which hath been given to ambitious Defigns and Endeavours at universal Monarchy, contrary to the most folemn Trea-ties, from the distinguish'd Valour, good Faith, and Honour of your Majesty, (supported by a Parliament truly British) we must continue to think, and if poffible, to be more and more confirm'd in Opinion, that when-ever our Lives and Fortunes are ready, at all Hazards (as they now most chearfully and truly are) for the Prefervation and Support of your Majefty, it must be at the fame Time for our own. And unworthy fhould we indeed be of the Name of Britons, or of that Fulness of Liberty we rightfully enjoy under your Maje-fty's most auspicious Reign, tamely to submit to a popish Pretender, or his Son, bred up in the Superstition of the Romith Church, with all its Attendants of Cruelty, Perfecution, Want of Charity, and Principles of arbitrary and defpotick Power; and befides this, to have him impos'd upon us by that of France, from whence only he can have a further Dependance or Hopes of Affiftance.

May your Majesty's Reign be long, happy and glorious, over a loyal and free People | And may the British Crown continue in your Royal Family till Time shall be no more ! These are the constant and most ardent Wishes of,

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Helfton, in the County of Cornwall, beg leave to congratulate your Majefty on the unfuccessful Attempts your Enemies have made to fettle the Son of a Popifh Pretender on the Throne of these Kingdoms, and to express our fincerest Joy at that Satisfaction your Majesty must reap in knowing now (what before you had the jufteft Reafon to expect,) how firmly attached to your Ma-jefty's facred Perfon your Subjects are, who know no Language but that of the Heart.

We, with the reft of your Majefty's Subjects, do express the utmost Abhorrence to the faithless Authors of fuch pernicious Enterprifes; and hope, that the unanimous and hearty Addreffes, which your Majefty has received from fo many of your Subjects, will convince your Enemies, that your Majefty's aufpicious Government is too firmly established to be shaken by their Intentions, or overthrown by their utmost Efforts.

We are not only truly fenfible of the Bleffings we enjoy from your Majefty's Reign in the uninterrupted Prefervation of our Religion and Liberties, which alone are able to support your Royal Throne, but we, as all-Chriftian Subjects ought, pay the greatest Regard to our Oaths of Allegiance, which, whatever Notions our Enemies may have of us, we think of too binding a Nature to be wantonly diffolved.
