HE following Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, having been transmitted to the Right Hon. the Marquess of Tweeddale, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to his Majesty: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very gracioufly.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in our National Affembly, take this first Opportunity of concurring with your Majesty's other faithful Subjects, in testifying our Abhorrence of the late intended Invasion of your Majesty's Kingdoms, in Favour of a Popilh Pretender, supported by a French

As the Church of Scotland, ever fince the Settlement of the British Crown in your Majesty's Illustrious House, have considered all their Interests, facred and givil, as inseparably connected with that happy Establishment, we should of all others be most unworthy of our invaluable Privileges, if, on this Occasion, we did not express the warmest Resentment of such an audicious Attempt.

Great Sir.

We reflect with particular Pleasure, that the Ministers and Members of this Church have always diffinguished themselves by their firm and zealous Adherence to the Protestant Succession in your Majesty's Royal Family ! And we can assure your Majesty, that, no less sensible of our prefent happy Situation, influenced by the fame loyal Principles, and equally concerned for the Security and the Referenced Religion, over that steadily pursue the laudable Example out Prede cellors have set us, and hope to thew, even in Times of the greatest Danger, that we count nothing too dear, in Support of your Majesty auspicious Government, the great Bulwark, un der Gode of our Religion, Laws and Libertiles.

"That our Gracious God, by whom Kings reigh, may continue to direct your Majesty Councils, and give Success to your Arms; may dispose all the Friends of Liberty and the Protestant Religion, to imitate your great Example in Desence of the Common Cause? Berlin, June 2. The King of Prussia is to fet out from Pyrmont on the 10th Instant, to return to Potzdam, or this Place. Count Tessin, the Swedish Minister, arrived here on Sunday last.

Bruffels, June 8, N. S. Menin surrendered to the Enemy the 4th Instant, which was the fourth Day from the Opening of the Trenches before it. The French King took Possession of the Place the same Night. We have different Reports now as to the Motions of the French fome affuring that their whole Army is marched towards Ypres, and others that they have fent a Detachment of 40,000 Men towards Tournay. We have Advice from Italy, that Prince Lobkowitz has passed the Tyber, so that we may soon expect to hear of his engaging the Neapolitan Army, which lies in the Neighbourhood of Tivoli.

Oftend, June 11, N. S. The Garrison of Menin marched by Bruges on Tuesday last with two Field Pieces, two Mortars, fix cover'd Waggons, Drums beating, and Colours flying. All Accounts agree, that they lost but four Men, and the Besiegers Forty. On Saturday the French invested Ypres, in which there is a Garrifon of 3000 Men.
