To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Bishop and Clergy of the united Sees of Down and Connor, at the Bishops annual Visitation affembled.

May it pleafe your Majefty,

W E your Majefty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bifhop and Clergy of the united Sees of Down and Connor, b g Leave to teftify to your Majefty, our Abhorrence of the Indignity offered to your Majefty, in the Attempt from France to invade these your Dominions, in Fayour of the Pretender and the popish Religion, and in the War fince declared by the French King against your Majefty.

The Happiness we have experienc'd under your Majesty's just and gracious Government, your preferving inviolable our Conftitution in Church and State, your infeparable Attachment to the Interefts of your People, and your un-wearied Endeavours for our common Welfare, call upon us at all Times to acknowledge to your Majesty our most grateful Sense of these Bleffings: And now that we are threatned by the Enemies of your Majetty, with fuch Difturbances, as if not prevented, must deprive us of all our Liberties Civil and Religious, we fhould not be more wanting to your Majefty than to ourselves, if we were backward in declaring to your Majefty, and to the World, that we hold ourfelves bound, by the Duties of our Function, by the Oaths we have taken, and by all the Ties of Religion and Gratitude, to offer up to God our inceffant Prayers for your Majefty's Welfare and Prefervation, and not only to endeavour the animating all those who are committed to our Inftruction, to discharge as becomes them their Duty to your Majesty, but to be ourfelves ready and willing to encounter any Difficulties in Support of your Majefty, the Protestant Religion established amongst us, and the Succeffion of the Crown in your illustrious Houfe.

May it pleafe Almighty God to blefs and protect your most facred Majesty, to unite the Hearts of all your Subjects in the common Defence of your Majesty and your Kingdoms, to render your Arms every where prosperous, and to enable you to defeat the outragious Attempts of all your Enemies.

Rome, May 23, N.S. In Confequence of the late Alarm occasioned in this City by the Approach of the Detachment of Spanish Horse to surprize the Austrian Hussians at Monte Roy

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tondo and Ponte Molle, on the 17th arrived in this City, from Vellebri and Corneto, two Companies of the Pope's Cuiraffiers and Militia, to reinforce the Garrifon of this Caftle and the Gates of the City. The fame Day, the 17th, as the Pope's People were repairing the Bridge at Ponte Molle; a Party of 50 Sol-diers, out of the Company of the Queen of Hungary's Partifans, attended by 50 Huffars, prevented them, and demanded of the Pope's Officers the Key of a fmall Fort at the Foot of that Bridge, which being refuted, they broke open the Gate, and took Possession of it, where they keep a Guard. On this Notice, the Pope fummoned an extraordinary Congregation, and a Reinforcement of Soldiers was ordered at the Gates del Popolo and Angelica, and Orders were given to augment the regular Troops with 500 Men out of the Militia. Cardinal Alexander Albani is returned from Civita Castellana, where he had been to compliment Prince Lobkowitz. On the 18th General Coloredo had an Audience of the Pope. The Auftrian Army, in four Divisions, from the 18th to the 22d In-stant, has halted at Monte Rotondo, the Place of Rendezvous, where it will be joined by the Rear Guard, heavy Artillery, Baggage, &c. Prince Lobkowitz is also at Monte Rotondo. On the 21ft the Pope held a publick Confiftory, in which, with the usual Formalities, he gave the Hats to the Cardinals Orfini and Landi.

Florence, Alay 26. By Letters received this Morning of the 19th Inftant from Prince Lobkowitz's Army from Monte Rotondo, we have an Account, that the two first Columns were then arrived there; and, by Letters of the 23d, that the whole Army had paffed the Tyber, and was then affembled there; and that Prince Lobkowitz only waited the Arrival of the heavy Cannon, and fome few Hungarians and Licanians that were left in Lombardy, to march on towards Naples; That the Spaniards were marched back into that Kingdom, and made all possible Dispositions to dispute the Entrance on the Confines, particularly at Agnani and Frofinone: That their Camp at the former Place extends three Miles: That the King of Naples was expected there on the 22d : That the Duke d'Atrifco, with the Cavalry, is at Val Montone, whence he made Appearance as if he would advance to Zagarola, having ordered Ten Thou-fand Rations of Bread: That the Division among the principal Officers is fo great, that M. Caftropignano refused to obey the Orders of M. de Gages, and retired to Naples 3 and Count Colobrano on the fame Account was put into Arreft : That the Defertion from their Army begun to be very confiderable: That in the Retreat of the Detachment commanded by the Duke de Atrifco, the Rear Guard of 50 Miquelets came over to the Auftrians: That the next Day a Captain with his whole Company followed their Example ; and few Days patied, but force Hundreds arrived at the Auffrian Camp, notwithstanding the Examples that were made of many, infomuch,
