Spañith Troops. The Dutch Ambaffadors have lately given a Memorial to the Mediators, which they pretend to be in answer to awhar they not long fince received from them togething the demains of the fwo Kings, as well as the point of *bornain*. If he Mediators feem exceeding furprifed at this Paper, it being fo intricate and embroyled in every particular, that they have profeffed, at their communicating it to the feveral Ambaffadors, that they know not what to make of it, and that they fee plainly that the Dutch, inflead of promoting the Peace, daily bring new difficulties to retard it. The 22 inflant, Monfiert Olyke, one of the Dutch Ambaffadors/ parted hence for the Hague,

Amfterdam Nov. 24, Thei Admiralty of this place are fitting out two Men of War, thei one solled the Middle burgh, mounted with 44 Guns, and the other the Star of 22 Guns, which it is faid, are defined for the Weft Indies. In the Texel lye now two East India Ships ready to fail, and three more are fitting out, which will be likewife ready to put to Sca before Christmas.

Hague, Nov. 27. The States of Holland are parted till Wednesday next, having first ordered the Raeat Pennionary Fagei, with five others of their Body, to go for Htrechestand there confult with the States of that Province, concerning their future fecurity; and veilerday Monting carly the faid Deputies parted hence. The news we had of the French being about demolithing Grave , is not confirmed by our laft Letters from thole parts, onely fo ne Paffengers tell us, that the French do in leed flight fome of the Out-works y but without any intention of quitting that place. From Gertruydenbergh we have advice, that our Forces having Rendezvoused in Lang strass, broke up from thence yelterdiy, and Marched under the Command of Count Walderk towards Brabans, where it is faid, they are to joyn with some Spanish Troops. The Trumpeter which was lately fent with a Letter from these States, to His Majelty of Great Brittiin, is returned again with His Majetties Anfwer, though as yet we are kept ignorant of its contents. The Confederate Troops fince the taking of Bon , have not thought fit to attempt any thing farther ; whether hindred by the weather, or discouraged by the great Garrison the French have in Nuis, which they give out should be their next work to Attack, we know not; however, they continue still in the Neighborhood of Gologne, and still make us believe they will enterprise fomething confiderable.

Bruffels Nov. 29. Our lait Letters from the Rhyne tell us that General Montecuculi was returned for Vienna, leaving the Command of the Imperial Troops to the Duke of Bournonville, which are now difperfed up and down in the Electorate of Cologne and the Countrey of *Juliers*, and that the winter coming now on apace, it is thought they will not enter upon any farther action, but go into their winter Quarters. Lichnite hath furrendred to the Imperialist, the Garrifon that was there being retired to Nuk, where the French have at present a Garriton of near 3000 Men; The Imperialists have their head Quarters at Friesheim, the Prince of Grange his at Blaigheim , and the Spanith Troops theirs at Beur. We have advice here that the French, having fent out a party from Maestricht, have taken and plundered Tongres; Monfieur de Turennec intinues with the Forces under his Command, in the Territories of the Elector Palatine.

Falmouth, Nov. 17. This day came to Town feveral Dutch Prifonews, who were put alhoar Saturday laft as St. Ivt's, and reports that about eight days paft, they being in a Caper of 12 Guns, called the Old Stadilouje of Wilfing, met alout Lands end with an English Smirna Merchaniman, called the Golden Flacee, who it feems was fepar.ted from the relt of ther Company, and that they had a sharp dispute with her for feveral hours together, all which while the Merchant man behaved himielf very well, and had the good fortune to shoot down the Capers Boultfprit and Fore-top-mast; But in the mean time the Augustin Fregar came in, and par an end to the Combut, by taking the Caper, and having put the Men ashoar; the Fregar is fayled with her Prize up the Channel.

Rje, Nev, 18. On Sunday last a French man of War off of this place, gave Chace to a Dutch Caper, who coming way near the thore to fecure her felt, we Manned out two or three small Boats from hence, "Who work the faid Caper, and have brought her in, liere.

Do'ver, November 21 Il is Evening her Royal Highnefs, accompanied with the Dutchels of Modena 'her Marker, and fevera, other perfons of Quality, arrived here, and was received by his Royal Highnefs, who refolves to fl., where till Munday Morning next; and then to fet forward, to lodge the first night at Canterbury, the next night at Rachefter, and the third day to come with the lide from Gravefent to London.

the late Prorogation, to let all our Subjects (ce, that no care cin be greater then Our own, in the ef-fedual suppressing of Pop.ry; We were pleased the Fourteonth of this inflant November , in Council, to Direct and, Command the Lord Steward, and Lord Chamberlain of Our Hos (hold, to hinder all Papifts and Popifb Recufants, or reputed Papifts and Popifb Reculants, from having access to our Prefence, or to Our Pilace, or the place where our Court (hall be, from and after the 18 day of this inftant November, and did thealikewife Command the fudges of our Courts at Westminiter, to confider of the most effectual means of putting the Laws in Execution, for preventing the Grawth of Popery and speedily to Report the lame to Us: now for the more effictual Suppression of Pupery in all parts of Our Kingdom, and prefermation of the true Religion Eftablished, We do hereby Declare and PublifbOur firster Will and Pleafure, and a fosteriely Charge and Command all the fudges of our Courts at Weltminster, Justices of the Peace, Mayors, She-riffs, Bigliffs and other our Officers and Ministers f fuffice whatfoever, That they do fo thwith take eff dual care, for the Profestition of all Papi s, and Popifb Reci fints, according to t'e Laws and Statutes of this Realm; And for that parpofe, That they give the faid Laws in Charge at their respective Alfiles; Gaol-deliveries, and Quarter Seffions, and Hen and there take Order, that Juck Papifts and Popifth Recufints, or Perfons suspected to be fo, may be specially Prefented, Indicted and Convicted according to Law; and that due Proc Is be from t me to time iffued thereupon.

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
