THE Dyet has been opened here by the Election (without any Debate) of M. Oginsky to be Marshal of the Assembly of the Deputies. We hear that the Empress of Russia was to leave Kiow, upon her Return to Moscow, the 22d past.

Vienna, October 10, N. S. By Letters of the 6th, we have certain Advice, that the King of Prussia's whole Army was at Theyn, and that 30,000 of his Troops had passed the Moldaw, and were advanced to Protivin, and that the rest were preparing to follow. It is thought he designs to attack Prince Charles, who is extended from Mirotitz to Semiz, before the Junction of the Saxons, which cannot be completed before the 14th. General Nadafti passed the Moldaw lately with 6000 Hussars at Klinkenberg, met five Squadrons of Prussian Hussars and Horse, which he attacked, cut the greatest Part of them to Pieces, and sent 93, with a Captain, Prisoners to the Camp. As the main Body of the two Armies are not two Marches distant, an Action seems to be inevitable; we imagine it may have happened about the 9th, if the King of Prussia advanced. Three Thousand Prussians, with some Cannon, are advanced to Fulneck in Moravia; but it is thought they will not venture much farther. The Duke of Saxe Weissenfelds was expected upon the 7th or 8th at the Prince's Army. The Earl of Holderness left this Place Yesterday in his Way to Venice.

Hambourg, Oct. 25, N. S. Count Clermont is, as we hear by Letters from those Parts, gone to lay Siege to Constance, with eight Pieces of Cannon, six Battalions, and 44 Squadrons, and the Marshal de Belleisle is sent to Bavaria. According to the Route which we have received from the Head Quarters of the Duke of Saxe Weissenfelds at Avé, a Village at about an Hour's Distance from Egra, the Saxon Troops were to march from thence the 8th Instant for Konigwarth, the 9th they were to be at Plana, were to halt the 10th, would reach Mies the 12th, and Pilsen on the 13th. Letters from Francfort mention, that the

Bishop of Spire has acceded to the Treaty of Union. An Express arrived at Francfort upon the 12th Instant, with an Account of a Battle between the King of Sardinia and the Allied Armies of France and Spain, near Coni, on the 30th past. The French make the Loss of the Enemy to amount to 5000 Men, five Pieces of Cannon, three Standards, and 400 Prisoners, without reckoning the Deferters which hourly arrive in their Camp; and this effectuated by a Loss on the Side of the Allies of 800 Men only, with double that Number wounded. Coni was not taken; but the French flattered themselves that the Surrender of that Place would soon follow.

Hague, October 20. By some Letters received from Turin of the 2d Instant, it appears, that his Sardinian Majesty's Loss has been very considerable, tho' not so superior to that of the Allies, as the first French Accounts represented it. That the Non-Success of the Enterprize was attributed to the Attack's having been begun sooner than his Sardinian Majesty, whose Dispositions the Enemy themselves cannot sufficiently admire, had projected it: That the Piedmontese continued the Engagement till Night, and then retired without Confusion, Loss, or Molestation, to the Ground they had occupied the Day before the Battle. There are other Accounts which add, that some Detachments of his Sardinian Majesty's Army have succeeded in repossessing themselves of the Barricades, and other small Posts in the Mountains; and that the Garrison of Coni took Advantage of the Action to make a Sally, and destroy most of the Works of the Besiegers. What is certain is, that the Letters of the 16th Instant from Paris, make no Mention of the Reduction of that Place. Fribourg is said to be hard prest, and Constance to have surrendered without waiting for the Arrival of Cannon. By the freshest and most credible Accounts from Bohemia, Prince Charles had been joined by General Balthiani, and was posted on both Sides the Moldaw in the Neighbourhood of Krasnahora, whilst the King of Prussia is reported to have repassed that River, and to be drawing towards the Frontier

Frontier of Moravia, as if he intended to be joined by General Marwitz's Corps. The Duke of Weiffenfelds was not expected at Pilsen till the 14th Instant.

Hague, Oct. 23. Orders have been dispatched to the Commanders of the Dutch Auxiliary Ships, to victual themselves for the Winter, and to remain in his Britannick Majesty's Service. Advices from before Coni, of the 10th Instant, by the Way of Paris, represent the Approaches of that Place to advance but very heavily, and the Success of the Siege as beginning to be depaired-of, notwithstanding the pretended great Advantage in the Action of the 30th past. Our last Advices from before Fribourg are also very favourable, the Garrison, in a Sally, being said to have nailed up no less than four entire Batteries of the Besiegers; whilst the River has been so swelled with the late Rainy Season, as to have broken down the Dam the French had made to turn it out of its Channel; overflowed all their Trenches, and greatly disordered their whole Attack.
