

der the Conduct of Major General Wilster, were to arrive this Day at Milin.

Upon the 24th the Troops fixed their Camp here. The same Day the Duke of Weissenfelds received Advice, that the whole Prussian Army made a Shew as if they intended to attack the Left Wing of the Combined Army, which was composed of Saxon Troops: Thereupon his Serene Highness having demanded a Reinforcement of Prince Charles, who sent him immediately 35 Squadrons, under the Command of Lieutenant Feldt Marshal Bernes, and six Battalions of Hungarian Infantry, under the Command of Feldt Marshal Lieutenant Prince Piccolomini, as also the Corps of Hussars under General Nadafti, the Saxons drew up in Order of Battle, and remained the greatest Part of the Night of the 25th under Arms, in Expectation of being attacked by the Prussians; the Day after; but the Prussians having seen the good Dispositions which had been made to receive them, made a Motion to the Left, and retired to their old Camp.

Whereas it has been represented to his Majesty, That on Thursday the 20th Day of September, last, Twenty Sheep, the Property of Benjamin Banks the Elder, of Kensington, Butcher, which were at Grass in a Field near Kensington Gravel Pits, were found killed, and the Fat taken out of them: And whereas on Tuesday the 9th Day of this Instant October, about Seven o'Clock in the Morning, Twenty-two Ewe Sheep, most of them in Lamb, belonging to George Gadby, of the Parish of Long Strawley in the County of Bucks, Grazier, were found, in a Field at Coppo's Farm, in the Parish of Fryon Barnet, in the County of Middlesex, with their Throats cut, their Bodies opened, and all their Fat taken out, and carried away: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the Crimes aforesaid, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas Information upon Oath has been given to the Hon. the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs, That James Lobb, of Ashington in the County of Sussex, Miller, Stephen Parsons of the same, Labourer, Edward Parson, of Chilmington, William Mills, William Bodger, and James Blondell, all notorious Smugglers together with divers other evil disposed Persons,

at present unknown, do ride in and about Ashington and the Parts thereto adjacent in the County of Sussex, armed with Fire Arms, Hangers, and other dangerous Weapons, to the great Terror of many of his Majesty's Subjects in that Part of the Country, several of whom have been assaulted, beaten and wounded in a most cruel and barbarous Manner, so that the Lives of some of the Persons so assaulted and beaten are despaired of, and the Lives of others are threaten'd; the Houses of the several Persons so attacked have been broke into, and by most violent Outrages committed therein, and Attempts have been made to set Fire to the same, under Suspicion that they are aiding and assisting in discovering the illicit Practices of the said Offenders, and in protecting the Persons of such as do. The said Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs, in order to bring such Offenders to Justice, and the more effectually to put a Stop to such outrageous and violent Proceedings, do hereby promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend the said Offenders, or any or either of them, so that they may be dealt with according to Law: To be paid by the Receiver General of his Majesty's Customs, on Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders,
