From Tuesday November 13. to Saturday November 17. 1744.

From the Head Quarters of the Saxon Army at Cziffow, upon the Confines of the Circle of Czaflau in Bohemia, November 4, at Night.

UPON the 31st of October, the Auxiliary Saxon Army encamped near Dibischau.

The Troops marched in two Columns, and the Baggages followed in two others. Ten Companies of Grenadiers marched at the Head of the Infantry. The three Austrian Regiments of Horse, St. Ignon, Birckenfeld, and Wurtemberg, together with the three Pulcks of Tartars, marched along the Side of the Zafawa. All the Picquets and the Grand Guards composed the Rear, and the Equipages were escorted by the Guards of the old Camp.

Trzebetiz, which is three Hours from Conopischt, was the Place which the Duke of Weisensfeld chose for his Head Quarters.

The Corps of 1800 Pandours, under the Command of the Colonel Baron Trenk, filed off before his Serene Highness. They appeared with the Grenadiers Caps, Sabres, and other Arms which they had taken from Creutz's Regiment of Fusileers at Budeweis, as also with the 10 Pair of Colours, which followed the Horse's Tail, which is the ordinary Standard of these People, and were preceded by their Music after the Manner of the Janissaries. They were well equipped, marched in fine Order, and with a very good Countenance; 400 of them had Horses.

The Duke was informed that the Prussians having made an Attack upon the Town of Koenigsaal, had been repulsed by the Austrian Garrison which is there.

Advice came from Lieutenant General Baron Festetitz, that the Prussian Army having decamped from Pischeli the Day before, a great Part of them were directing their March towards the Elbe.

This Day Prince Charles passed the Zafawa, and encamped about Janowitz, on the other Side of the River.

By Advice from General Ghylani, dated from Kuttenberg the 31st, we learnt, that a Flying Corps of four Regiments of Foot, and as many Horse, under the Command of Major General Nassau, having advanced towards Kolin, the Austrian Detachment, under Colonel Baron Schwaben, had thought proper to retire to Kuttenberg.

Upon the 1st of November our Auxiliary Army quitted their Camp at Trzebetiz. All the Troops, as well Horse as Foot, marched in one Column, the Park of Artillery with the Baggages in another, towards the Zafawa.

We passed that River upon two Bridges, one at Sternberg for the Troops, the other at Belischau for the Equipages.

Ten Companies of Grenadiers made the Rear of the Infantry.

Two Pulcks of Tartars composed the Guard of the whole Column, whilst the Third flank'd it, the Picquets and the Guards of the Camp serving by Way of Escort to the Equipages.

A Camp was marked out in the Neighbourhood of Rattai, in the Circle of Caurzim, on the Right of the Zafawa, the Right Wing being extended to the Village of Smilowitza, and the Left to the Town of Rattai, where the Duke fixed his Head Quarters, and lodged in the Castle belonging to Count Kinski.

As soon as his Highness arrived, he learnt by Advice from Lieutenant General Count Nadasti, dated the 31st from Teinitz, that the Prussians, after having decamped from Dnespeck near Pischeli, had reinforced their Garrison at Prague to the Number of 18 Battalions.

A Letter from Prince Charles of the 1st of November informed the Duke, that the Prussian Camp, which had been removed to Kosteletz, extended the Day before from Swrabow to Dobreput; and that it was confirmed, that Major General Nassau had taken Quarters at Kolin.

Lieutenant General Baron Festetitz acquainted his Serene Highness from Steirn, of the same Date,

Dase, that the Prussians had marched the 30th in three Columns, one of which had turned towards Prague, and had taken Post at Stirzim, and that the two others were gone from Pischeli to Sehwartz Koftelez.

Upon the 2d of November the Letters from Prince Charles gave an Account, that the King of Prussia in Person was at Swoyfchitz: That the Feldt Marshal Count Schwerin was posted near Zasmuck: That the Corps under Major General Nassau had passed the Elbe at Kolin: That the Prussian Army was in March towards Bohemisch-Brod, and made a Shew as if they intended afterwards to direct it towards Podiebrad.

One of the King of Prussia's Aides du Camp was taken Prisoner upon the Road to Prague, as also one of his Maitres d'Hotel, and afterwards a Courier.

Towards the Evening Lieutenant General Festetitz acquainted the Duke from Kammerberg, that the Column, which had marched upon the 1st of this Month from Stirzim, was commanded by Prince Leopold of Anhalt Dessau, and that it had pushed its March at Noon as far as Ritschan, which is in the Road to Nimbourg towards the Elbe.

Some Prussian Deserters gave an Account, that upon the Departure of the Army upon the 30th of October, eight Regiments had been sent towards Prague, from one of which they had deserted upon the Road: That at that Time the Report was, that the Horse would march on the Side of Silesia, and that the six Regiments in Garrison at Berlin, would take Winter Quarters at Prague: That as to the rest they were in great Want of Provisions, which was the Occasion of the frequent Desertions, which still continued.

The Duke went to Janowitz in the Morning to pay a Visit to Prince Charles.

His Serene Highness reviewed the Austrian Army, which he found in exceeding good Condition; and after having made the Dispositions for the following March, and concerted every Thing that was necessary for the projected Design of Advancing to the Enemy, who, we learnt, were posted on this Side the Elbe, returned before Dinner to the Head Quarters.

Upon the 3d it was judged proper that the Combined Army should remain in their Camp, as well in order to wait for the Arrival of the Equipages, which, upon Account of the bad Roads, could not get up to us, as to give so much the more Time to the Troops to prepare for their March upon the next Day.

Prince Charles, accompanied by the General Officers of the highest Rank in his Army, came to dine at our Head Quarters. The Duke caused the Army to pass in Review before him; one Line before Dinner, and the other upon his Return; and the two Chiefs were equally satisfied to find the Troops in such Order and good Condition, notwithstanding the many Fatigues they had undergone, as well from the Hardness of the Season, as the Stops and Incum-

brances of the bad Roads, which they were obliged to travel through in the Mountains and almost unpassable Marshes. However, we have as yet but a very small Number of Sick, and they are taken Care of at Rattai.

The Pulcks of Tartars also filed off before them, as also the ten Companies of Grenadiers commanded by Colonel Pirch, and contributed to the Satisfaction which their Highnesses received from the Beauty of the different Corps of Troops, of which our Auxiliary Army consists.

This Day the Duke received Advice from General Festetitz, dated the 2d Instant from Kammersberg, that at Ten o'Clock that Morning the Prussians were still posted near Bohemisch-Brod; that the King was lodged in the Town; that his Army was encamped between two Marshes, extending from Sinnenfch quite to Liblitz, Part of his Horse being posted at Stelmirtz, and his Hussars at Klutschow. He added, that since the 1st 20 Prussian Deserters had come over to him.

The Duke received Information from Prince Charles, that the advanced Posts of the Prussians were within a small Distance of Zasmuck, and towards Klein Betschwartz, and that they had a Detachment encamped between Caurzim and Chotzemitz, which seemed to be posted there, in order to cover their Retreat towards Kolin. Upon the 4th the Combined Army quitted their Camp in the Morning, in order to advance towards Zasmuck, two Miles from Kutenburg.

Our Troops (including 21 Squadrons of Austrian Horse, making in the Whole 3000, under the Command of Lieutenant General Count Bernes, and Major General Bechini, and eight Battalions of their Foot, viz. one of Schulenburg, one of Glatz, two of Hallen, and four of Esterhali, making together 5600 Men, under the Command of Lieutenant General Prince Piccolomini and Major General Hoyenau) marched in two Columns, and the Equipages in two others, by the same Route. Ten Companies of Grenadiers marched at the Head of the Equipages, and three Pulcks of Tartars kept by the Side of the two Columns. The Picquets and the Guards of the old Camp brought up the Rear.

The Duke fixed his Head Quarters at Zeifsowa, and Prince Charles his at Widgetz, which is Half an Hour from Zasmuck. Some Prussian Deserters brought Advice, that Lieutenant General Nassau had taken Post, the 31st of last Month, with his flying Corps of four Regiments of Foot, four of Horse, and one of Hussars, who have the Name of Ulans, at an Hour and Half's Distance from the Elbe near Kolin, from whence the Deserters fled the said Day. Others, who had deserted the 1st of this Month from Bohemisch-Brod, from the King's own Column, declared, That that Column, computed to amount to 20,000 Men, it was believed, was to go towards Pardubitz and Koniggratz: That the two others had taken the

Road to Prague: That there were great Numbers of Sick in their Army, and that the Dyſentery particularly was very riſe amongſt them, and increaſed every Day more and more: That for four Days their Soldiers had not had any Bread, and that the laſt Meal had been diſtributed to them into their Hats, all their Proviſions being either intercepted or carried off by the Auſtrian Huffars.

According to Advices from Bavaria, the Imperialiſts found Means, upon the 29th of laſt Month, to get Poſſeſſion of the Poſt of Mull-dorff; but in attempting to ſeiſe the Bridges, which the Auſtrians had there, they were repulſed with the Loſs of 200 Men, the Auſtrians looſing only 17. General Bathiani, after having quitted his Poſts between the Iſer and the Inn, had placed himſelf between the Inn and the Achza, and drawn a Line from Paſſau quite to the Frontiers of Tyrol, in ſuch Manner, that there are in Paſſau 1350 Men, three Battalions at Oettingen, as many at Kraibourg, 150 Men at Jettenpach, 1700 Men and 400 Horſe at Waſſerberg, and 2000 Croats, beſides 400 Foot Soldiers, at Roſenheim.

Boston in New-England, Oct. 3. The Guard-Ship, which our Governor ſent to convoy the Third Company of Soldiers raiſed here for the Reinforcement of his Maſtey's Garrifon at Annapolis Royal, being returned, brings the following Account of the Siege of that Place.

M. Duvivier, who commanded at the Taking of Canſo, and who had been ſent from Louisbourg, with a Detachment of about Seventy Regular Troops, to winter in the Neighbourhood of Annapolis Royal, in order to bring the Inhabitants there, who have ſworn Allegiance to his Maſtey, to revolt, and take up Arms againſt the Garrifon, upon his Arrival reaſſembled the Cape Sables, St. John's, and other Indians, to the Number of about 6 or 700, with ſome few Inhabitants of Menis, and appeared with his Standard before the Garrifon, within Reach of their great Artillery, which ſoon drove him from making his Appearance there again in the Day-time: But he with his Indians inceſſantly every Night approached within Muſket-ſhot of the Garrifon for about a Month, and kept a continual Firing at their Parapets, whereby the Garrifon was, during that Time, much harralſed with perpetual Alarms. In the mean Time, the Inhabitants of Menis and Annapolis River, from whom the Garrifon were before ſupplied with freſh Proviſions, and Intelligence, were laid under Contributions, and all Communication was cut off between them and the Garrifon; and about a Month ago, M. Duvivier having prepared a conſiderable Number of Scaling Ladders, and laid a Scheme for a general Aſſault, to induce the Indians to begin it, offered them 400 Livres a Man, for every one who ſhould mount the Ladders, beſides Scalp Money for every Man they ſhould kill in the Garrifon: But finding that the Indians could not be en-

gaged in ſo deſperate an Attempt, and his own Troops being too few to attempt it, he ſent a Flag of Truce with a Letter to Major Mafcareene, the Commanding Officer of the Garrifon; wherein he magnified the Number of his own Troops then actually with him; and aſſured him he was to be aſſiſted with three Men of War, which were lately arrived at Louiſbourg for a Convoy to Six French Eaſt-India Ships now there, and a Transport Veſſel bringing 250 more Troops, and all neceſſary Stores for attacking the Garrifon by Sea and Land, all which he daily expected; and thereupon propoſed to him, that the Garrifon ſhould capitulate to ſurrender upon the Arrival of theſe Ships and Forces, promiſing honourable Terms. To this Major Mafcareene returned at firſt, for Anſwer, That it would be Time enough to think of Capitulating, when the Ships arrived. But the Garrifon was ſo harralſed and wrought upon, that on the 6th of September Major Mafcareene held a Council of all the Officers, who, together with himſelf, unaniſmouſly agreed to enter into a Treaty with M. Duvivier about ſuch a Surrender, which laſted three or four Days, and wherein the Preliminary Articles were agreed to: But at laſt M. Duvivier not being ſure of the Arrival of his Fleet, drew back and ſaid, he had granted too much; on which the Treaty broke off, and Hoſtilities began again. Nine Days after this, the third Reinforcement of Indian Rangers, which went from hence under the Command of Captain Gorham, arrived at the Garrifon, with one of the Province Guard-ſhips, which gave ſuch a Turn to the Affairs of the Garrifon, as well as to their Spirits, that upon the Arrival of them M. Duvivier retired with his Troops, and all his Indians, except 150, (whom he left behind him for a Day or two as a Blind, and to cover his Retreat) to Menis: And the Communication is ſince opened between the Inhabitants of Annapolis River and the Garrifon; the former of which has ſent Deputies to the latter, to aſſure them of their Fidelity, and with Promiſes of a Supply of freſh Proviſions.
