*St. Christopher's, July 20.*

**T**HE Deputy Governour of Anguilla, assisted by two Privateers from this Place, has driven the French out of their Half of the Island of St. Martin's, and is in Possession of it, and settling and providing for the Defence thereof. The French Inhabitants of St. Bartholomew's have surrendered that Island, and declared themselves to be henceforward his Britannick Majesty's Subjects.

*Constantinople, October 13.* An armed French Bark, of 26 Guns and 200 Men, sailed from Smyrna the 28th of last Month, to convoy a small Fleet of four Ships to Marseilles, and it is reported that they were to be joined somewhere by a Frigate of 50 Guns, and are to go to Malta, where they are to meet others. A French Privateer of 10 Guns and 70 Men, took very lately off Stanchio, a small English Vessel laden with Turks and their Effects, bound for Alexandria; however, they restored to the Turks all their Effects, and set them on Shore. The Captain Bashaw is expected soon back from the Archipelago with his small Fleet of three Frigates and two Gallies. He sailed from Smyrna the 29th past. The Porte has at length received some News from Kars, which they have notified to all the Foreign Ministers in Form, viz. That a Bash Choadar, dispatched by Achmet Bashaw their Generalissimo, was arrived with an Account, that he had repulsed the Shaugh's Army from before Kars, with considerable Loss to the Persians, who had made nine unsuccessful Assaults upon the Place, and that the Turks had made themselves Masters of a Battery of nine Pieces of Cannon which the Shaugh left behind him in his Retreat. They affirm that he is retired to some Distance, and that he is put out of a Capacity of attempting any thing further this Campaign; as well on account of the advanced Season, as by this Advantage gained over him. An Envoy from the Great Mogul is arrived here, and has had Audiences of the Sultan and Vicer. He came Post with about 15 Persons only. His Errand is supposed to relate to the War against the

Persians, against whom his Master is thought to have many Causes of Resentment.

*Stockholm, Nov. 2.* The Day before Yesterday General Lubras came to the King's Court, but as a Traveller and a private Gentleman: He was presented by the Chambellan in Waiting, and with none of the Ceremonies used at the first Audience of a foreign Minister. He paid afterwards his Respects to the Prince and Princess Royal in the same Manner; but it is expected that in a little Time this Gentleman will take a Character upon him as Minister from the Empress of Russia.

*Rome, Oct. 31, N. S.* On the 23d died Cardinal Firrau of a malignant Fever. On the 27th and 29th the military Stores and Magazines of the Austrians from this City, and the Remainder of the Invalids, &c. from the Hospital at St. Paul, were removed in 400 Waggonns to Civita Vecchia, where they were embarked on Board of the Transports, and at the Departure of the Letters, were ready to sail for Leghorn.

*Rome, Nov. 7, N. S.* Upon the first of this Month, three Hours before Day, the Austrian Army decamped from Faiollo, and marched to and encamped at the Half-way Tower, in the Middle of the Plain between Rome and Albano. The same Day the Spanish Army came and encamped at Albano, and in the Neighbourhood thereof, and the King of Naples lay at Albano. The next Day, the 2d, the Austrian Army marched before Day-break, passed under the Walls of Rome, and before Noon were got over the Tiber at Ponte Molle, a Quarter of an Hour before the advanced Guard of the Spaniards could arrive there in order to dispute the Passage with them. Prince Lobkowitz immediately caused a Battery to be erected, which prevented the Approach of the Spaniards, who thereupon encamped in the Suburbs of Rome on the Side of Ponte Molle. The Cannonading lasted all that Day and the next, the 3d, and the Spaniards lost about an hundred Men killed and wounded. In the Night of the 3d, the Austrian Army marched and encamped near Monte Roso, 15 Miles from Rome. The Spanish Army could not pass over the Bridge

and march in Pursuit of them till the 5th, at Nine in the Morning. This last is superior to the Austrian Army by about 4000 Men. The King of Naples, who arrived the 2d with the Army, lay without the City of Rome, in the Villa Patrici. Upon the 3d he made his Entry on Horseback into Rome, and paid a Visit to the Pope. Afterwards he made a small Tour round the City on Horseback, and at Ten o'Clock in the Morning went to St. Peter's Church. He was entertained at the Pope's Expence at Dinner at the Vatican, and at Two o'Clock in the Afternoon set out Post for Gaeta. We now hear, that the Austrian Army has entred Viterbo, and taken Quarters there.

*Florence, Nov. 3, N. S.* On the 29th a Party of Licanians and Esclavonians surpris'd a Post belonging to the Spaniards, called Monte Spino, near Monte Artemisio, and with very little Loss, conducted to Prince Lobkowitz's Camp, three whole Companies Prisoners, one of the Irish Regiment, another of the Regiment of the King, and a Third of that of the Queen. Several Barks with Spanish Troops arriv'd lately at Civita Vecchia, and one with a very considerable Sum of Money. The Number of Men the Spaniards have lately received by Sea, in small Parties, is said to amount to 1500.

*Extract of a Letter from Upper Silesia, Nov. 10.*

On the 6th Instant General Marwitz march'd from Troppau, together with the General Officers, Prince Dieterich of Anhalt Dessau, the Field Commissariat, the Post Office, the Apothecary's Office, the Officers belonging to the Hospital, the Regiments of young Schwerin, and the Hussars of Hallach and Malachowski, whereof five Squadrons, which had been in the County of Teschen, were immediately ordered back again. At Great Pitz they were joined by the Regiments of Borck, and Haut Charmory, and then proceeded to Jagerndorff; a strong Garrison however was left at Troppau under the Command of Lieutenant General Borck. On the 7th we march'd to Newstadt, where we halted a Day, after having left a Garrison at Jagerndorff. On the 9th we march'd to Neisse, and took the Grenadiers from Hertzberg along with us. In Neuffatt we left no Garrison. To Day being the 10th, we halt again, and Tomorrow we shall march to Otmachau. The Field Commissariat, and the military Chest, march in the first Column, having a Regiment of Hussars before, and a Regiment of Foot behind them.

*Vitna, Nov. 15, N. S.* The King of Prussia pass'd the Elbe at Kolin in the Night between the 8th and the 9th of this Month, but instead of marching to Koningsgratz, this Court has had Advice by a Courier, that after putting seven Battalions into Kolin, he remains incamp'd on the other Side of the Elbe, in a Posture to dispute the Passage of that River with the

Austrians: That General Trenk however was in Possession of the Suburbs of Kolin, whilst General Schulenberg was employ'd in throwing Bridges over the Elbe at Alt-Kolin; and that the Duke of Weissenfelds was march'd with the whole Body under his Command upon an Expedition against Pardubitz; at which Place is the most considerable Magazine that the King of Prussia has in all Bohemia, and into which he has thrown 7000 Men. It is thought that his Prussian Majesty's chief Design is to cover the Retreat of his Artillery and Baggage behind him from Brandeis. Of 8000 Men, which it is reported he has still at Prague, three Fourths are supposed to be sick; and for want of Cattle, the Cannon, which, as belonging to the Place, he had transported out of the Town, is still lying upon the Ground. One Week the Burghers were order'd to provide themselves with Provisions for six Months, and the next, the Prussian Magazines were offer'd to be sold to them. By Letters of the 10th from Prague we have an Account, that all the Prussian Baggage Wagons were kept ready to be sent off at a Moment's Warning; that the Oxen which the Prussians had brought into that Town, had been sold to the Inhabitants at seven Florins each, and a Sheep at 21 Krutzers, from which it was conjectured that the Town was soon to be evacuated; that after the Pillage and Plunder of the Houses had been all sent away, the King had express'd his Dissatisfaction thereat. It is also assur'd, that Velt Marshall Schwerin was arriv'd there on pretence of Sicknes, but it was thought he went away disgust'd from the Army. General Keil march'd lately with his Corps of about 5000 regular Infantry, and some Hussars, to attack Troppau in Upper Silesia, but having received Advice by two Prussian Hussars, Deserters, that Prince Anhalt Dessau the Elder was in March with a large Body of Troops, and that he had join'd Marwitz's Corps, General Keil determin'd to wait for the Hungarian Insurgents, 6000 of which, now on the Frontiers, are to move immediately to join him, as with 6000 more in a few Days, and the others successively as they arrive. Some of the Hungarian Officers were for waiting for the Completion of the whole Body of them, which is to amount to 30,000, before they march'd against the Enemy, but as that would occasion great Delay, it has been determin'd to send them off as they arrive. The Transilvanians, to the Number of 8000 Men, will be in March by the Month of February, General Bathiani covers the Saltza, and is between that and the Altza. General Seckendorff is near Oetting, M. St. Germain is with a Body towards Tirol, as is the Prince of Hilbourghausen with another Corps. General Bathiani had received the six Battalions from the Army, and the two from hence will have join'd him before this. Two Regiments of

of Horse, of which Lanthieri's is one, and Baronai's Regiment of Hussars, are also detached from the Combined Army to join him, and the Generals Fesfetitz and Thierimb are also ordered into Bavaria. The Emperor is still at Vilshofen, meditating a Surprize by Water of the Town and Castles of Passau. They attempted to engage the Circle of Suabia to incorporate Anterior Austria with their Circle, and to guard it with their own Troops, but that Proposal was rejected. Upon M. St. Germain's apparent Intention to seize upon the Town of Saltzbourg, the Canons of that Church have received by a formal Convention three Austrian Battalions into their Capital, who have taken an Oath to the Chapter. M. St. Germain sent a Trumpet to the Peasants of Tyrol, who are already assembled upon their Frontiers, and in 24 Hours Time can raise 12000 Men, to offer them a Neutrality. They received the Messenger very ill, and sent him away with a Refusal. The Peasants of Bregentz have so bravely defended themselves, that they have obliged the French to retire from before their Town with a considerable Loss. The Election of an Archbishop of Saltzburg is fixed for the 10th of January, the Contest it is thought will lye between the Bishop of Olmutz, Count Lichenstein, Cardinal Lamberg, Archbishop of Passau, and Count Leopold Stahremberg.

*From the Austrian Camp at Teinitz, Nov. 20, N. S.* Yesterday Morning the Combined Army forced its Passage over the Elbe, near Teltschitz, in full Day Light. The Lieutenant-General Count de Schulembourg was the first in crossing that River at the Head of the Austrian Grenadiers. The Courage and Spirit of our Troops upon this Occasion cannot be exceeded, and with Regard to the Count himself it may be truly said, that he led on his Men like a General, and fought himself like a Grenadier. The Saxons passed some hundred Paces higher, and rather later than we did. Though they met with no considerable Resistance, it must be own'd that they were well prepared to oppose any that might have been made. We had 158 Grenadiers killed or wounded, and some Officers amongst them. The Saxons lost only about 20 Men. At first the Enemy's Fire was extremely hot, and lasted so an Hour; but as soon as the Grenadiers had reached the other Side of the River, the Prussians went off in the greatest Confusion, though they might have disputed the Ground longer, by Means of some Battalions which they had at Teinitz and the neighbouring Parts. We are to march To-morrow in order to make all possible Advantage of this Event, which will in all Probability be followed by others of great Consequence. We have had no Rest since the 18th, Day nor Night.

*Ratisbon, Nov. 19, N. S.* An Imperial Colonel has been here some Time, and returned

two Days ago to the Camp at Vilshofen, having Yesterday sent down the Danube to the said Camp a large Number of Vessels with Anchors and other Materials necessary for forming a Bridge of Boats. The Emperor's Head Quarters are still at the said Place, where Marshal Belleisle arrived some Days ago. It is reported, that the Emperor has sent to the Chapter at Passau to declare to them, that he expected they would open their Gates to his Army, or otherwise the Town would run the Risk of being reduced to a Heap of Rubbish: The Chapter thereupon represented that it was not in their Power so to do, as they were not Masters of the Town, otherwise they would be ready, according to their Duty, to deliver up the Keys to his Imperial Majesty upon the first Order. A strong Detachment from the Imperial Army, pretended to amount to 15,000 Men, has been sent towards Saltzbourg, to penetrate that Way into Austria and Tyrol; but General Berenclau, with some Thousand Men, has prevented them, and possessed himself of the Passes in the Territories of Saltzbourg; and summoned at the same Time the Peasants of Tyrol, all noted Marks-men, who accordingly are said to have already assembled to the Number of 10,000. There is a very violent Sickness among the French Troops who are with the Imperial Army; and it is reported, that there is no great Harmony between the Imperial and French Commanders, and that they are in great Want of Forage and Provisions; to remedy which latter, it has been published by Beat of Drum at Landshut, Straubingen, and other Places, that all Persons, who would supply the Imperial Army with Necessaries, might depend upon absolute Safety and prompt Payment. Besides which, Wine and Forage are sending from Stadt-am-Hoff by the Magistrates, down the Danube to Vilshofen.

*Dresden, Nov. 20, N. S.* Advices from the Prussian Army near Pardubitz import, that their Left Wing was advanced to Konigin-Gratz, and was to continue its March from thence through Silesia, but that the main Army was to remain between Konigin-Gratz and Pardubitz; that the said Left Wing consisted almost entirely of Invalids, and the Sickness and Mortality still continued almost without Intermision; That as to the Prussian Army in General, they own themselves, that within two Months above 30000 Men have been lost, neither was the Mortality yet ceased, which occasioned such a Stench in the Camp, that the Regiments were necessitated to be constantly removing from one Place to another: That not one Third of the Cavalry is mounted, and the Infantry so reduced, that several Regiments have not above 300 Men left.

*Danzick, Nov. 21, N. S.* Two Days ago a Courier arrived here with Letters of the 7th from Moscow, by which we are informed, that the

the Empress had declared her Resolution to assist the King and Republick of Poland with her whole Force, against any Power whatsoever who shall attack them.

*Franckfort, Nov. 21, N. S.* Advices from Ulm, of the 15th Instant, mention, that the March of the French Corps from the Brisgau to the Lower Rhine, has been delayed, and the same is confirmed by an Account we now have of the Route intended those Troops, who are to pass the Rhine at Rhine-Zabern below Lauterbourg: By which it appears, that the first Division of Infantry, who are to march down on the other Side of the Rhine, cannot arrive there before the 22d, nor the last Division of Cavalry before the 29th. These last are to march on this Side of the Rhine; but as to the Bridge of Boats, which has been prepared here for the Passage of the said Cavalry, the Undertakers have received no Orders as yet to send it up the River. This Route, which is dated at Mannheim the 16th Instant, has been sent by the French Commissary there to the respective Members of the Empire, through whose Territories they are to pass, and the Manner in which those Princes are therein treated, is very remarkable, the Delivering of enormous Contributions being exacted by Way of Command, and no other Mention made as to Payment, but barely, that Receipts shall be delivered to them. The City of Worms has already had Intimation to prepare Winter Quarters for 4000 Men.

*Hague, Nov. 27, N. S.* Last Wednesday the Grefier gave in his Resignation, and the States, after having in vain pressed him to continue, have accepted it, at the same time desiring him to frequent their Assembly and assist them with his Counsels as long as his Health will allow him. The Vacancy will not be filled up till next Week.

*Hague, Dec. 1.* It is confidently reported here, that the Queen of Hungary has ordered M. Damnitz to defend the Castles of Fribourg to the last Extremity: That Hostilities recommenced on the 22d past, and that the greatest Part of the Town was already laid in Ruins. The Mortality, which has raged so terribly this last Autumn amongst the black Cattle in Flanders and France, begins to manifest itself in this Province, and publick Prayers are ordered to be put up in all Churches, to deprecate the farther Progress of this Calamity; and publick Rewards are offer'd for the Discovery of a Remedy against it.
