Riga, Nov. 21. This Day arrived here in his Way to Petersbourg, the Right Honourable the Earl of Hyndford, his Britannick Majesty's Minister to the Court of Russia, and proposes

to pursue his Journey on the 23d Instant.

Stockholm, Nov. 23, O. S. His Swedish Majesty has voided a few small Stones, and is much easier as to his Gravel; but another Disorder has succeeded, which is a Looseness accompanied with a little Fever. His Swedish Majesty rested very ill last Night. Yesterday Evening M. Laumary, the French Ambassador, gave a grand Entertainment and an Illumination, on Occasion of the Princess Royal's Arrival here.

Stockholm, Nov. 27, Ó. S. By the last Post we had an Account of the Death of the Princess of Hesse, which has very much grieved his Swedish Majesty, who is persectly recovered of his late Indisposition of a severe Fit of the Gravel, and appears again in Publick. Some Days ago died here Major General Count Dohna, by which the Regiment of Horse Guards, of which

he was Colonel, is become vacant.

Faro, Nov. 24. His Britannick Majesty's Ships the Rupert and Guernsey were off of this Port the 21st Instant. They are come from the Mediterranean, appointed by Admiral Rowley to serve on the Gibraltar Station, and with the Frigats and Sloops that were on the same Station before, are to form a small Squadron to cruize in these Seas; where the Rupert, Captain Ambrose, who is the Commodore, has already taken several Prizes of Value, as also sunk a French Privateer from Cadiz, of 14 Guns, and 80 Men, 55 of whom were saved, and the rest drowned.

Vienna, Dec. 10 N.S. A Courier is just arrived from Prince Charles, with Advice that the Combined Army marched on the 26th past, in order of Battle, but that upon the Appearance of the Avant-Guard, the Prussians went off to Neustadt, from whence it was supposed that they would separate into two Bodies, the one to go into Silesia by Braunau, the other into the County of Glatz. The Combined Army intended to follow on the 28th. A Courier is likewise arrived from General Bernclau, with Advice, that he had dislodged the Bavarians from the Heights on this Side of the Saltza,

having killed about 200 of their Men, and thrown fome Bombs into the Town of Burkhausen, to punish the Burghers for their late

Treachery.

Vienna, Dec. 5, N. S. General Bretlach, who lest Prince Charles upon the 5th Instant, ia arrived here, and brings Advice, That the Pruffians, separated into five Bodies, were retired out of Bohemia by Tratenau and Brandau into Silelia, towards their great Magazine at Schweidnitz; that 4000 had been fent, with the greatest Expedition, to guard the Bridge of Glogaw for Fear of the Infurgents; that the Retreat was a real Rout; that their Rear Guard suffered a great deal from the Hussars; that 15 Field Pieces have been taken, and all Sorts of Baggage; that there had been 9000 Deferters fince the Passage of the Elbe; that the Queen had 8200 Prisoners in all upon her Hands; that amongst the Deserters 5000 at least, Subjects of Silesia, Moravia and Bohemia, have offered themselves voluntarily for Recruits; that, in a Word, all the Prisoners and Deserters agree, that the King of Prussia must find a Diminution in his Army of 40,000 Men, exclusively of those who went out of Prague, and of whom a good Account is expected daily from the Chevalier de Saxe, who was detached upon the 28th of November from the Combined Army, with 1000 Uhlans, 1000 Dragoons, 1000 Grenadiers, and 2000 Foot, to intercept them; that by the faid Flight of the five separate Bodies above-mentioned, the County of Glatz was left destitute of Men, excepting three Battallions that were in the Castle of the Town of that Name, so that some of the Austrians had already entered into that County, whilst the Adjutant Buckow was actually arrived at Joannesberg with 1500 Men on the other Side of Glatz, and is to be followed by three Corps successively, and as fast as can be done conveniently through such Desilés, the last of which Corps is to be commanded by the Prince himself. This Liberty of entring upon the Prussian Estates has made the Troops less defirous of Winter Quarters in Bohemia, and the Duke of Weissensles has taken upon himself to form a Cantonnement from Jaromitz, directly up to Lusatia, and Prince Charles's is to extend from Konigsgratz, through the Mountains in and round Glatz into Silesia, and be there joined by the Infurgents. The Castle of Glatz is thought by the Inhabitants to be upon the Point of being and bandoned by the three Battalions that are in Garrison there. This Opinion arises not only from certain Motions observ'd in the Castle, but from the Incident of their Magazine of Meal being entirely corrupted, of which the Burghers have brought

Samples to Prince Charles, which are quite black. One Thousand sour hundred Deserters more are come into Prague, so that the Body which went out of that Town on the 26th past is diminished by 3000 Men. General Keil advances on this Side of the Oder towards Troppaw and Jagendorff, whilft the Hungarian Insurgents operate on the other Side of that River. Four Regiments of Horse and seven of Foot, under Lieutenant General Thungen, are marched to Bavaria and the Upper Palatinate. Amongst those who have deferted from the Prussian Army, are feveral Brandenburghers, who have been 20 Years Soldiers in the Prussian Service. It is reported here, that Marshal Schwerin is dismissed from the King of Prussia's Service, and that Prince Leopold of Anhalt has retired under Pretence of being greatly afflicted with the Gout. The Dalmatians, in purfuing the Garrison of Prague, have recovered the fine Copper Pontoons which the Prussians had taken along with them, and taken two Pieces of Cannon, with feveral Waggons of Baggage; and 21 Pieces of Cannon have been found out, which were hidden in that Town. From Bavaria we have no News; the Enemy seem to be retired into Winter Quarters in the flat Country on the other Side of the Inn, and the Austrians in Bavaria on this Side of that River and the Saltza. The Campaign ended with General Bernclau's cutting four Companies of the Enemy's Grenadiers in Pieces near Burckhausen, and burning that Town with Bombs and red-hot Bullets for the Perfidy of the Burghers in betraying the Austrian Garrison. The Empress Dowager who has been for a long while in a very bad State of Health, was this Morning fo ill that she received all the Sacraments. The Queen is in fuch Affliction as suspends all Business for the present.

Copenhagen, Dec. 5, N. S. The King and Queen of Denmark, together with the two Danish Princesses, returned hither from the Country on the 2d Instant, and are now settled for the Winter in the Palace of Christiansburg. The Prince and Princes Royal arrived likewise at Charlottenburg Yesterday in the Asternoon, all in perfect Health. Letters from Stockholm bring Advice, that the Prussian Minister there, who acts as Plenipotentiary for the Francfort Allies, had at last met with a Refusal upon his Instances to obtain the Accession of that Crown to the Treaty of Union, a Majority of the Se-

nate having declared against it.

On the 10th instant four new Ships were launched here, two of 70 Guns by the Architects of the Royal Fleet, one by the East-India Company, and another by a private Builder. One of the 70 Gun Ships, and that belonging to the East-India Company, were named after the Princess Royal. The King, together with the Prince, affilted at the Ceremony, but the Weather being very cold, the Queen and Princess did not appear. His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Dover being now repaired and rigged again, will be getting out of this Port To morrow or hext Day, in order to full down to Elfenore with the first fair Wind.

Berlin, Dec. 15, N.S. The King of Prusfia arrived here Yesterday at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, accompanied by the Prince of Pruf-11 fia, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, and the Margrave Charles. His Majesty will go to Potzdam To-morrow or the Day after. reigning Prince of Dessau set out from hence upon the 7th, to take upon himself the Command of the Prussian Army in Silesia. The Prince Royal, Henry, arrived here upon the 8th at Night. His Highness had been very dangerously ill of a Fever and Bloody Flux, but is at present pretty well recovered.

Hamburgh, Dec. 15. It is reckoned here, that by Sickness, Desertion, and those killed in the different Skirmishes, that the King of Prusfia has loft one half of his Army with which he last invaded Bohemia. His Prussian Majesty was expected as To-day, at Berlin, from whence the Prince Anhalt Deslau set out last Week, to take upon him the Command of the Prussian Army in Silesia. The Marshal Belleisle is likewife expected at Berlin. We hear that the Empress of Russia has lately declared to the Prussian Minister at her Court, and in most strong Terms, that the Intrigues of M. Wallenrodt at Grodno. had been highly displeasing to her, and that her Imperial Majesty had at the same time repeated to M. Mardefeldt, the fame Affurances which Count Bestuches was ordered to give at Grodno. of her being refolved to support, and to adhere to her Engagements with the King, and the Republick of Poland.

Hamburgh, Dec. 18. The King of Prussia is faid to have arrived on the 14th in the Afternoon

Hague, Nov. 15, N. S. Our freshest News from Bohemia is of the 2d Instant. The Prusfians continued retiring towards Glatz with great Precipitation, and Loss by Desertion, Sickness, Fatigue and Skirmlines. Prince Charles's Avant Guard had possessed itself of the Towns of Neustat and Nachod, and the Chevalier de Saxe was leading a Detachment of light armed Troops. in Pursuit of the Garrison of Prague. It is confidently written hither by credible Persons, that the Works of Menin were begun to be blown, up by the French the Beginning of last Week. Count Maurice of Nassau sets out To-morrow for England, being recovered in his Health beyond Expectation.

Hague, Dec. 18, N. S. The last Letters from Bohemia mention the King of Prussia's having entirely evacuated Bohemia, and Prince Charles's beginning to canton his Troops in good Part upon the Territory of the County of Glatz. Letters from Dresden of the 12th Instant, bring Advice of the Garrison of Prague's being arrived at Gabel on the Frontier of Lusatia, where it is faid to have been joined by another small Corps of the fame Nation; that they had demanded the Passage of the Court of Dresden, and that the same had been granted them, on Condition of their laying down their Arms, which were at the same Time promised to be faithfully sent after them; that the Prussians had refused these Conditions; that two more Saxon Regiments had been fent into Lulace to reinforce the Corps actually a-head of them there, and that the Chevalier de Saxe, with his Detachment from the Combined Army, was arrived within four

Leagues .

Leagues behind them, so that we are very impal tient here to learn the Issue of this Affair. The Archdutchess, Governante of the Low Countries died on the 16th Inftant, much regretted;
