*Journal of the Saxon Army in Bohemia, from the 29th of November, to the 9th of December, N. S.*

**U**PON the 29th of November the Auxillary Army decamped from Schmirnitz, and marched in two Columns to Jaromirz, in the Neighbourhood of which Town the Troops encamped.

The Duke fix'd his Head Quarters in the Town. Prince Charles having ordered the Austrians to advance, removed his Camp the same Day from Kohliggratz to Czernilow, a League from Jaromirz.

As the Evacuation of the Town of Prague by the Prussians was confirmed by several Accounts, the Duke thought proper to detach the Major Generals Durfeldt and Franckenberg, with two Squadrons of Carabineers, four of Saxe's Dragoons, two Pulcks of Tartars, besides two Troops of Austrian Carabineers, and one Troop of their Horse Grenadiers, together with five Battalions of our Grenadiers with eight Pieces of Cannon, in order not only to harass those of the Enemy's Troops which had left that Town in their Retreat, but also to prevent the Junction of a Corps, which, we learnt, had been detached from their Army, and was in March on the Side of Hohen-Elb towards the Circle of Bunzlau, to join them.

On the other Side Count Nadasti sent the Pandours and Croats towards Konigshoff, with Orders to watch the Motions which the Prussians might attempt to make in those Parts, and to bring off the Baggage, a great Part of which having stuck in the Mire, occasioned great Disorder in their Retreat.

This Day above 100 Deserters with Arms and Horses came in. They declared, that several Regiments had lost between 200 and 300 Men by Desertion each, and that the Number of Sick was increased to 50 in some Companies.

Making mention of our late Passage over the Elbe on the 19th, they agreed, that the two Prussian Battalions under the Lieutenant Colonels Wedel and Bodenbrougg, had been so

roughly handled, that besides 145 killed upon the Spot, half the others came in wounded, the greatest Part in their Thighs and Legs.

As to the Retreat of their Army into Silesia; they added, that since the 27th the King had his Quarters at Nachod; that the Horse had marched first in order to enter into the County of Glatz, and that the Equipages were dispersed all over the Road, not being any longer in Condition to follow; that their March continued to be made in several Columns, one having taken the Road to Neustadt, another to Nachod, and a third towards Trautenau, not reckoning the many Corps detached upon different Routes.

Towards Evening Major General Durfeldt sent an Account from Miletin, that 1300 Prussians had passed by Neu-Packa, marching to Arnau; whereupon he had detached some Troops of Tartars to harass them.

Upon the 30th the same Account was confirmed from Count Nadasti, who on his Side had detached the Pandours to meet them.

They sent word, that the Prussian Detachment above-mentioned made a Shew as if it intended to join a Corps of 6000 Men, which, it was reported, was in March by Turnau and Lomnitz to Trautenau. The same Account was sent by Major General Durfeldt from Neu-Packa, adding, that this whole Corps together amounted to 9000 Men, including the Garrison of Leutmeritz.

The Duke detached another Body of two Squadrons and five Battalions of our Troops, who were to follow the same Road on the Right, which the Troops had taken the Day before towards Melnick. The Chevalier Saxe set out at the same Time to take the Command of this whole Corps.

This Day his Serene Highness ordered our Troops to canton on the two Sides of the Elbe, as well to relieve them from the Fatigues they had undergone by painful Marches, as to give Time for the rest of the Baggages that had remained behind to come up.

Certain Advice came that the Prussians, before they evacuated Prague on the 25th Instant, had blown up Mount St. Laurent, and that they had

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had intended the same Fate for the Wischerad, but that the Matches had been removed in Time.

The Artillery which they found in the Town, when they last took it, was abandoned, together with 16 of their Cannon, mark'd the seven Electors, of 24 Pounds, 16 Cannon of 12 Pounds, and 18 Mortars. Upon the Evacuation 1500 of their Soldiers deserted.

Near 80 Deserters, who arrived at our Head Quarters, declared, that a great Number of their Men and Horses had sunk in the Marshes, and could not extricate themselves; that the King of Prussia, to shew how well satisfied he was with the Conduct of Lieutenant General Nassau, and the good Disposition whereby the Reunion of the Corps lately under his Command with the main Body of the Army, was effected, had honoured him with the Order of the Black Eagle. Upon the 1st of December, the Tartars, who had been detached with the Hussars, brought in 400 Prisoners, and a considerable Number of Carriages and Horses, taken from the Prussians.

This Day 94 Deserters came in. They gave an Account, that the Pandours having fallen upon the Rear of the Column which Prince Leopold of Anhalt Dessau was conducting to Glatz, the Prussians, after having had 200 of their Men killed or wounded, had retired in great Disorder, having first set Fire to their Baggages.

Upon Advice that some Prussian Troops remained in the Town of Neustadt, a Detachment was sent to dislodge them; upon the Approach of which the Prussians immediately abandoned the Place with such Precipitation, that the Detachment took Possession of it without striking a Stroke.

Lieutenant General Ghylani sent Word, that from the 27th to the 29th past, he had granted 121 Passports to Deserters.

The Chevalier Saxe advised from Lipnitz, that the Prussian Corps which he was observing, was advancing from Arnau towards Freyheil and Matschendorff, and that he thought that the Garrison of Prague would retire on the other Side the Iser.

On the 2d Prince Charles removed his Quarters to Opotchno; the Duke's remained at Jaromirz, and the Cantonments in the same Distributions that had been settled upon the 30th. We learn'd that the Town of Nachod had been abandoned Yesterday in the Evening by the Prussians, after having plundered it; thereupon our Tartars took Possession of it.

Forty-two Deserters came in towards Noon. Upon the 3d of December we remained at Jaromirz, as did Prince Charles in his Quarters at Opotchno.

By Advice from Colonel Buccow we learn'd, that the Prussians had been dislodged by him the Day before from Mittelwalde, a Place of Importance in the County of Glatz, on account of the Passage it opens into Silesia. Upon this Occasion a great Number of Prisoners was taken, and a greater Number of Horses carried off, besides other Booty. According to him,

the Army of the King of Prussia continues filing off towards Silesia.

Upon the 4th, Lieutenant General Ghylani sent Word, that the Prussians having quitted the little Town of Reinerz Yesterday, he had sent a Detachment to take Possession of it.

By Advice from the Chevalier Saxe we learn'd, that the Garrison of Prague having taken the Road from Leutmeritz to Bohemisch-Leippa, that General had directed his March by Turnau towards Bohemisch Aicha, having at the same time ordered Lieutenant General Birckholtz to march towards Nowenska.

*Dec. 5.* Within these three Days threescore Prussian Deserters have come into our Head Quarters. Prince Charles came this Day to dine at the Duke's Head Quarters, and returned in the Evening to Opotchna, after having agreed upon the necessary Measures, and settled the Regulations concerning the Repartition of the Troops.

Upon the 6th Advice came, that Lieutenant Colonel Schwaben had Yesterday taken Possession of the Town of Haberswert, which the Prussians had evacuated at Four in the Afternoon.

The Town of Johansberg, in the Principality of Grotkaw, which the Prussians had also abandoned, was taken Possession of by Colonel Buccow, to whom a Reinforcement was sent.

According to Advice from General Ghylani, the Prussians have also retired from Wanschelberg, and the Town of Glatz is reported to be in Want of Provisions, so that in order to prevent its being block'd up, it was believed the Prussians would soon quit it, though they had begun to pallisado it without.

*Dec. 7.* Some Deserters from Glatz gave an Account, that the Garrison of that Fortres consisted only of the King's Regiment, that of Mitzeval, in which they had served, having been ordered to march to Breslau; that as to the rest, they had learn'd that the King was at Schweidnitz, and that his Rear Guard was entering into Silesia by Braunau.

Upon the 8th, the Duke ordered the Regiments that are to form the Line along the Frontiers of Silesia to the Confines of Lusatia, to march to the Posts assigned them.

His Serene Highness also ordered the Austrian Troops who were under his Command, to repair to the Places of their Destination, and declared to the Commanders of them, that for the future they were to receive their Orders from Prince Charles.

This Day his Serene Highness went to Opotchno to confer with Prince Charles, and to settle the Particulars of the Separation of the Troops, which are in Motion in all Parts, in order to proceed to their different Quarters, or Posts towards Silesia, the Upper Palatinate, and Bavaria. Since Yesterday Six Hundred Deserters have come in to Prince Charles. Upon the 9th the Duke received Advice from the Chevalier Saxe, dated Yesterday from Bohemisch Aiche, that the Tartars who had been sent out to discover the Prussians, had fallen

fallen upon their Avant Guard at Reichstadtel, and that in this Rencontre they had taken one Major, one Captain, and 15 Hussars Prisoners, and brought off some Baggages. The Tartars had eight of their Officers killed and wounded, and several Horses.

The Number of this Corps of Prussians amounted to 11 Battalions, five Squarons of Dragoons, and 250 Hussars, with 20 Pieces of Cannon.

His Serene Highness received certain Advices, that Colonel Buccow had made himself Master of the Town of Patzka in Silesia.

Count Nadasti sent Word at the same time, that the Prussians had abandoned the Town of Braunau, situate upon the Confines of Bohemia, and that he had ordered Colonel Festeitz to take Possession of it with 200 Horse and 500 Pandours.

*Florence, December 1.* The Austrian Army is supposed to be arrived at Fano. A few Hours after Prince Lobcowitz went from Perugia, the Spaniards arrived there, where at present a Body of 10,000 Men remain under the Command of M. de Seve, a Lieutenant-General; the rest of the Army with M. de Gages and the Duke of Modena, is at Assisi, a small Distance from Perugia. The Desertion from the Austrian Army has been very considerable, the great Fatigue the Troops undergo by forced Marches through excessive bad Roads, have probably contributed a good deal to it; but the Reward of seven Zecchini which M. de Gages has promised to every Deserter, is a sufficient Inducement. That Army daily increases likewise by the Arrival of Troops from the Kingdom of Naples, and by Recruits in the Pope's State. On the 25th past General Andreasi arrived here from Pisa, on his Way to the Romagna, where the Invalids under his Directions, consisting of about 2000, chiefly dismounted Dragoons, proceeded also from Pisa by Prato, Barberino, Scarperia, and Marradi, to join Prince Lobcowitz's Army. On the 26th about 30 Mules, loaden with Ammunition, &c. were sent from these Castles to the Tuscan Troops at Arezzo. The same Day General Braitwitz, attended by General du Chatelet, Colonel Sallin, and other Officers, set out from hence for Arezzo, to take upon him the Command of the Great Duke's Troops posted on the Confines, on Notice that a large Detachment out of the Spanish Army was approached within the Distance of about two Miles from the Borders of Tuscany, in Pursuit of the Baggage, Artillery, &c. of the Austrians. On the 26th the Austrian Artillery, consisting of eight large Cannon, and 40 covered Waggon, arrived from Perugia at the Gates of Arezzo, with about 300 Sick, the whole escorted by 300 Men. A few Days ago a Party of Spaniards entered into this State, and seized a Part of the Austrian Chancellery, on which General Braitwitz sent an Officer to the Spanish General to complain of it, Excuses were made that they

did not know that the Place where it happened was within the Confines of Tuscany; but the Effects were not returned. On the 29th, the second Battalion of the Italian Regiment of Foot Guards, with a Company of Corsicans, and some Partitants, arrived here from Leghorn, and this Day proceeded on their March to Arezzo, to join the rest of their Regiment and Tuscan Troops, and a Battalion of the Militia Regiment of Pandolfini began their March to-day from hence, to replace that of the Italian Foot Guards at Leghorn. From Lombardy we are informed, that on the 19th past, the Savoy Regiment from Piedmont arrived at Placentia, and was to be followed by others. That of Sicily from Placentia was ordered to march to Modena. The Estates of the respective Subjects of the Duchy of Placentia in the Spanish Service, who had not presented themselves within the Time prescribed in the last publick Notification, have, by Orders from the King of Sardinia, been confiscated. The same Forfeitures have attended the Subjects of the States of Parma in the like Case, from the Edict caused to be published as above by the Queen of Hungary.

*Zittau, Dec. 14, N. S.* The Prussians decamped this Morning about Two o'Clock, and about Four appeared near Marckersdorff, in order to pass over the Extremity of the Saxon Territory. Colonel Vizthum, who commanded there, having caused Representations thereupon to be made, General Rothenbourg promised him positively, that the Troops should not set Foot upon Saxon Ground, Lieutenant General D'Arnim arrived a little before Six at Marckersdorff, and Time enough to hinder the Prussians from pursuing their March. After having placed some Infantry in the Entrance which leads to Marckersdorff, and which is about 100 Paces from that Village, he took Post with the Regiment of Routowski and three Battalions, upon a neighbouring Eminence, and ordered three Pieces of Cannon to be pointed against the Prussian Column, because they were advanced about 3 or 400 Paces upon the Saxon Territory. At the same Time he sent Captain Brandenstein to Lieutenant General Einsiedel to give him Notice, that his Avant Guard was upon the Frontiers of Saxony, and desired him to order them to retire, or that he should consider that Step as an Hostility against a Neutral Country, and should attack them, if he did not immediately put a Stop to it. General Einsiedel sent back a Major, and after him Major General Wallrave, to make Excuses for the Mistake, which he said was the Fault of the Guides, and very much against his Inclination. But at the same Time he order'd them to make strong Instances for Leave to continue his March only a Thousand Paces upon the Saxon Territory, which would bring him again into Bohemia. This General Arnim persisted to refuse, tho' General Einsiedel came himself at last to speak to him about it. Thereupon the Prussian General

neral order'd the Troops to turn to the Right, in order to re-enter Bohemia, across the Country, and through rugged Ways, which retarded their March very much, and gave Time to the Uhlans of the Auxiliary Army to come up with them. They lost almost all their Equipages and five or six Pieces of Cannon. General Arnim kept close behind them, till they turn'd to the Right towards Fridland, where they would probably arrive about Four o'Clock, having marched very Light, without Baggage or Incumbrance, and being pursued by the Uhlans only, the Chevalier Saxe having retired with all his Troops to Reichenberg, to watch the Prussian Forces, who were assembling upon the Frontier of Silesia, and being greatly superior to his in Number, without this Precaution, might have intercepted him.

*Ratisbon, Dec. 14, N. S.* After we had been a good while without any News from General Bernclau, he unexpectedly appeared in the Upper Palatinate, and issued Orders, dated Vichtach, Dec. 9, to the Bavarian Bailiffs and Magistrates, for preparing Winter Quarters for the Austrian Forces which are to enter the said Province. One of those Letters, which was delivered two Days since to the Magistrates of Stadt-am-Hoff, contains the following List of the several Austrian Regiments, viz. Bernes, Diemar, Lichtenstein, and Charles St. Ignon, *Cuirassiers*: Saxe Gotha, *Dragoons*: Charles of Lorraine, Neuperg, Leopold Daun, Harrach, Waldeck, and Giulay, *Infantry*: Kalnocky, *Hussars*. The other Regiments under the Command of the said General Bernclau, are also therein specified, viz. Lanthieri, and Portugal, *Cavalry*: Hildburghausen, Young Konigegg, and Vivari, *Infantry*: Baroniay, and Bartoloni, *Hussars*: Besides all the Theyssians, 3000 Warassins, 2500 Carlstadians, and 700 Slavonians. The Magistrates of Stadt-am-Hoff are thereby enjoined to send without Delay, Deputies to Vichtach, to make the Repartition of Quarters for all those Troops, in Failure whereof, the Town is threatned to be reduced to Ashes. The Inhabitants being in the utmost Consternation, carried the said Order to the French Commandant, Marquis de Cruffol, who gave them to understand, that they ought not to pay any Regard to them, since he was able to protect them; but this has been so far from abating their Consternation, that they are preparing to bring their best Effects into this City for Security. The French have indeed been reinforced with one Company of Grenadiers, but in all Appearance they are preparing to march off. Some Hundreds of Austrian irregular Troops entered last Week the Town of Deckendorf, during a Fair for Cattle, and carried off 270 Oxen, some of which belonging to the Butchers of Freisingen (an Episcopal City, of which the Prince of Liege, the Emperor's Bro-

ther, is Bishop) were given up again by them. The abovesaid Austrian Regiments designed for the Upper Palatinate, having actually begun their March out of Bohemia on the 6th Instant, it will soon appear, whether the 15000 French and Bavarians will continue their intended March to Amberg. Our last Letters from Bohemia are of the 5th Instant from Opatchno.
