Naples, December 22.

N the 11th Instant a Te Deum was fung at the Chapel of the Royal Palace, for the Surrender of Fribourg to the French, with a triple Discharge of the Artillery of the Castles. On the 12th at Night died suddenly, General Mariani, who was taken Prisoner in the late Surprise at Velletri, by the Austrians, and released on his Parole. M. Russo, Duke of Baranello, has, by Order of the King, been confined to Castel Nuovo, on Suspicion of having killed an Officer of the Farm of the Tobacco at his Fief in Calabria.

Rome, Dec. 26. The Spanish Army receives daily confiderable Reinforcements. In the last Week four Shebecks with Troops from Spain arrived at Civita Vecchia. The Pope, to support the extraordinary Expences which the Armies occasion in the Ecclesiastical State, proposes to renew the Contribution of 8 and 12 per Cent. which the last Year, on that Account, he had caused to be laid upon the Ecclesiastical Benefices, Pensions and Revenues enjoyed by any Persons in his Dominions. Cardinal Aldrovandi, Legat of Ferrara, in Consequence of the Contributions which Prince Lobcowitz has demanded of the Legations, has agreed, it is said, without the Consent of the Pope, to contribute, on the Part of his Legation, 30000 Crowns per Month. Several Colonels of the Spanish and Neapolitan Troops are departed for Naples to recruit and compleat their Regiments, and to receive such Soldiers as the respective Communities of the Kingdom of Naples are to furnish them with, in order to exercise them against the Spring. On the 12th passed near the Walls of this City from Gaeta, a Company of 100 Gunners, on their March to the Spanish and Neapolitan Camp. M. de Callignac, in Consequence of the Directions which he lately received from his Court, has follicited and obtain'd from the Pope a Bull for the Marriage of the Dauphin of France with the Infanta of Spain.
