Rome, January 23.

ON the 17th the Austrian Invalids were transported by the Tyber to Fiumicino, escorted by a Detachment of the Pope's Cuirassiers, in order to be embarked for Leghorn.

Turin, Jan. 26, N. S. The last Advices we have from Genoa and the Riviera inform us, that the Spaniards were not yet advanced any farther than Oneille and Lovan, where they seemed to be settling themselves for some Time, probably in Expectation of their Horse, and the rest of their Infantry from Savoy.

Florence, Jan. 26. We have no Advices this Post either from the Austrian or Spanish and Neapolitan Armies in the Pope's State. Recruits and Provisions are frequently brought to the Spaniards from Naples, and to the Austrians from Lombardy. It is said, that a Party of about 800 Licanians and Sclavonians from Cesena, had proceeded towards Argenta, with a Determination not to serve any longer, but that after some Persuasion from their Officers, they were returned to their Duty.
