to the old Count of Nostitz and his Wife, and the Abbé Bastiani, to leave the Town of Breslau in twice 24 Hours, in order to repair hither, they arrived here 1sft Saturday, and the Day before Yesterday the Countess was presented to the Queen Mother.

Berlin, Feb. 13, N. S. The King of Pruffia arrived here on Wednesday last the 10th of this Month. The next Day he gave Audience to M. Courten, and returned in the Evening to Potzdam. It is expected that his Majesty will set out for Silesia upon the 27th by Crossen, where he proposes to make some Stay. The Marquis Valori, Minister from France, set out last Night for the Court of Dresden.

Bonn, Feb. 12. Count de Sade, who fome Time ago was the French King's Minister here, and had received his Recredentials from the Elector, was returning hither from France with the fame Character, which the Elector was no fooner informed of, than he difpatched a Courier to Versailles to defire he might be recalled, and to declare to that Court that he would not receive him. The Elector ordered the fame Declaration to be made to the Count upon the Road, who nevertheless sent his Valet de Chambre hither to negociate a more favourable Refolution, and in the mean Time came on within a Post or two of this Town, where he was feized by an Austrian Partisan, Capt. Bethune. Three Days ago we had Intelligence that the French had taken Post at Seyn, situated between Coblentz and Andernach; but last Night the Court received Advice that the French Troops were preparing to retire from the Lahne to the Naís: In the mean Time General Baronai will advance To-morrow towards Coblentz with Caroli's Regiment of Huffars. Bonn, Feb. 15. We have received Intelligence, that General Smiffaert began to pass the Rhine on the 12th, and was to be followed Yesterday by the Head of the Austrian Troops. General Baronai, with all the Huffars of Caroli's Regiment, croffed the Rhine near Cologne Yesterday, of which the French must have been very well apprifed, for he was no fooner on the other Side the River, than the Enemy began to shew themselves on this Side of it. Three Hundred of their Horse were seen. Yesterday Morning at Odendorff, about two Leagues and a half from hence, and two or three of their free Companies are come down the Rhine into the Neighbourhood of this Town. Their Defign was to refcue the Count de Sade, if they could have found him, or make Reprizals upon fuch Subjects as might fall in their Way. M. D'Agieu, Aide de Camp to the French King, who was fome Time ago his Minister at Brusfels, has been taken by a Party of Auftrian Huffare, and fent to the Duke of Aremberg. Count de Sade was surprized at Zinzig, a Village belonging to the Elector Palatin. Yesterday we received Advice here, that the French have marched three or four Thousand Men into Munich, Drums beating and Colours flying. Ghent, Feb. 13. According to Advices the French are come to a Resolution to demolifh all the Suburbs of Lifle, but the Orders were not given two Days ago. Count Saxe is expected at Lifle about the 24th or 25th Instant. The Swife and Irish who are in Garrison at Dunkirk are ordered to be relieved and march out, upon a Sufpicion that they had a Delign to have burnt the Town, which took Fire in eight feveral Places this Day was Sevennight. The Barrack Master is hanged on that Account. This is reported

and confirmed by Deferters for three Days past of the Swifs Regiment of Diesbach, who came through here, and all agree in the fame.
