Westminster, March 19.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting and continuing the Duties upon Salt, and upon Red and White Herrings, for the Term of six Years, and for declaring that the Duties on Salt which arise and are payable in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, shall be subject to the same Charges thereon, as the same Duties were liable to by the Act of the Fifth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First.

An Act for granting to his Majesty several additional Duties upon all Wines imported into Great Britain, and for raising a certain Sum of Money by Annuities and a Lottery in Manner therein mentioned, to be charged on the said additional Duties.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the speedy and effectual Recruiting of his Majesty's Regiments of Foot serving in Flanders, Minorca, Gibraltar, and the Plantations, and the Regiments of Marines.

An Act for indemnifying Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments within the Time limited by Law; and for allowing further Time for that Purpose.

An Act for repairing the High Road leading from Borough Bridge in the County of York, through North Allerton in the same County, to Crofts Bridge on the River Tees, and from thence through Darlington in the County of Durham to the City of Durham.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by several Acts of Parliament for repairing the Highways between Shepherds Shord and the Devizes, and the Top of Ashlington Hill and Rowd Ford in the County of Wilts.

An Act for repairing the Road leading from a Gate commonly called Sacred Gate, on the South East Side of the Town of Hedon in the East Riding of the County of York (through the said Town) to Hull North Bridge.

An Act for continuing and enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act made in the twelfth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty

King George the First, for repairing the Highway from Speenhamland, adjoining to Newbury in the County of Berks, to Marlborough in the County of Wilts.

An Act for more effectually cleansing, deepning, widening, and preserving a Creek called Beverley Beck, running into the River Hull; and for more effectually repairing the Staiths near the said Beck, and the Roads leading from the said River to the Town of Beverley, and for cleansing the Streets of the said Town, and for regulating the Carriages to and from the said Beck, and the River Hull.

And to Nine Private Bills.

Genoa, Feb. 27. We have Advice from Nice, that a Convoy was arrived there from Barcelona, consisting of Barks and Shebecks, but the Letters do not mention what Number: It is said they have brought a Reinforcement of about 3000 Men, with a large Quantity of Provisions and Ammunition. A Detachment of 300 Men immediately marched to join Marquis Castellar at Oneille. It is wrote from St. Remo, that the Mould of Villa Franca was full of small Imbarcations, and it is supposed they have a Design to imbark the Infantry, with the Cannon and heavy Baggage, and to land them at Porto Spezzia: The Cavalry is to march by Land through this State. This Republick continues her military Preparations with the greatest Vigour: She has now on Foot 14,450 Men of what they call Regular Troops, composed of Deferters from all Parts, and within these few Days they have given out Commissions for levying of Ten Companies more. They are daily sending Troops to Final and Savona. The Governor of St. Remo, with four Chiefs of that Place, are gone to Nice to wait on Don Philip. Last Week arrived a Convoy of 27 Mules laden with Money for M. de Gages's Army,

Copenhagen, March 9. The Princess Royal of Denmark, being now happily advanced about five Months in her Pregnancy, was publicly prayed for last Sunday upon that Account,

Berlin, March 16, N. S. The King of Prussia set out from hence Yesterday about Five o'Clock in the Morning, for the Army in Silesia, being to pass through Glogau and Breslau in his Way to Neiss. M. de Courten had, on Saturday last, his Audience of Leave, and was presented with his Prussian Majesty's Picture set with Diamonds, to the Value of 6000 Dollars. He will set out for France To-morrow, Count Bunau, who was heretofore the late Emperor's Envoy to the Circle of Lower Saxony, and lately at Hanover, arrived here on Saturday last.
