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*Stockholm, March 22.*

A Few Days ago died, at his Estate in the Country, Senator Baron Cederstrom.

*Pfarkirken, March 25, N. S.* The Austrian Troops passed the Inn upon the 21st, in three Columns of about 4000 Men each. One Column marched out of Passaw under General Bernklau, another out of Scharding under General Bathiani, and the third from Braunau under General Brown, whose Column consisted of six Battalions, two Regiments of Dragoons, and one of Trips's Hussars. After they had passed the Inn, General Brown ordered out several small Parties towards Marckl and Tann, in order to give the Enemy the Alarm, as some small Corps of their Troops were there, whilst he took towards the Right to Malching, and from thence to Aspach, where the Troops were obliged to rest a Day in order to make a Bridge over the little River called the Rot, which was very much swelled on account of the melting of the Snow and the continual Rains. In the mean time General Brown detached some of his Hussars from Minster to the other Side of the Rot, and Bernklau's were also detached from FirsENZELE, with an Intention that they should join at this Place in two forced Marches with some few Hungarian Foot and Croats. The Hussars under Brown swam over the River, which the Enemy perceiving, and that Bernklau's were also advancing and surrounding them, they marched out of the Town in order to secure a Retreat to Eggenfelden, or to throw themselves into the Woods; upon which General Trips, with all the Hussars and some Foot, attacked them, killed 200, and between wounded and Prisoners the Enemy lost 400. The famous Partisan Geschrey saved himself by getting off of his Horse and running into the Woods; those of the Enemy who saved themselves in this Rencounter gave the Alarm at Eggenfelden, from whence the General who commanded there retired towards Landshut. The Hussars are pursuing them, and have taken a great deal

of Plunder. We made 120 Men Prisoners of War at Griesbach.

*Vienna, March 27, N. S.* Ten thousand five hundred Men have been raised in Bohemia and Moravia, so that the Horse is compleated, each Regiment to 1094, and the Foot to 2300. Our Army in Silesia has received the most Part of their Recruits, and will consist in all in 58 Battalions, which may be reckoned at 600 Men, and the 16 Regiments of Horse compleated, with five Regiments of Hussars at 1300 each, with about 20000 Croats and Insurgents; of these latter 13000 are actually there. In Bavaria they will have 50000 Men compleat. At present we operate there with about 25000, exclusive of Garrisons. We have good Intelligence that the King of Prussia is arrived, with General Schwering, in Silesia, and that his Army will consist of above 60000 effective Men, 30000 of which are to encamp at Neiss, 15000 in Glatz, and 15000 about Cossel. The Saxons are drawing nearer the Frontiers of Silesia towards Braunau. Leopold Palfy's Regiment of Foot, consisting of 3000 Men, is marching from Sclavonia into Italy, and about 4000 Recruits from hence are on the Road, besides those which have been raised nearer at Hand. Velt Marshal Count Traun is appointed Commander in chief of the Forces in Bavaria.

*From the Austrian Head Quarters at Vilshofen, March 30, N. S.* The Day before Yesterday General Bathiani summoned the Governor of Vilshofen in Form to surrender, which he having refused to comply with, Orders were immediately given for the Cannon, which we had ready upon our Batteries, to play upon the Town, and at the same Time it was assaulted on two Sides, on the Right by General Brown, whose Avant Guard was composed of the Croats of the Bannat, and on the Left by General Bernklau, whose Avant Guard consisted of Warasdins, and General Schmertzling made a third Attack on the other Side of the Vils. The Assault began at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, and the whole was so well conducted by the wise and vigorous Conduct of the said three
