Constantinople, March 11.

WE have Reports here from Persia, that the Shaugh has again made Incursions on the Turkish Frontier, as far as Akelzik in Georgia, and laid Waste the adjacent Territory. Yeghen Bashaw, the new Turkish Generalissimo, is as yet advanced no farther than Kutayah. It is said he has already near 100,000 Men. There are Reports likewise of some Mutiny amongst the Turks at Cars. This War seems to be push'd more seriously this Year than ever. Ten thousand Tartars are continually expected to arrive; they come on Horseback, and each Cavalier has two spare Horses. We just now hear that the Tartars are passing over the Bosphorus into Asia.

Stockholm, March 29, O. S. His Swedish Majesty is still indisposed with his last Attack of the Gravel, but is much better since last Night that he rested pretty well. We have three Mails due from England, and two Posts from Holland.

Vienna, April 7, N. S. The Bavarians have abandoned Lauffen, Reichthal where they have their Salt-Pits, the Saltza and Burkhausen, and are all retired to the Upper Issyr. The Hessians too have abandoned Straubing. A great Quantity of Salt was found at Reichendal, and a Bavarian Regiment of Horse falling in with two Regiments of Hussars, in its Way to the projected Camp at Vils Biburg near Landshut, has, besides the Killed, which are in the greatest Number, and the Dispersed, lost 200 Prisoners, with several Officers, who are in the Hands of the Austrians. General de la Motte having undertaken, with 6000 Foot and 2000 Horse, to dislodge the Insurgents who are in Upper Silesia, to the Number of 15,000 Men, General Festetitz, at the Head of the Latter, went out against him, and led him back with a continual Skirmishing to the Gates of Ratibor. This Affair is said to have cost the Prussians 600 Men in their Retreat, and 300 the next Day by Desertion. It is not said what Loss the Hungarians have had, if any.

Vienna, April 12, N. S. By our last Advices from Italy, Prince Lobkowitz was retired behind the Panaro, where it is not doubted but that he may maintain himself, and receive the Reinforcements which are upon the Road from hence to join him. The Spanish and Neapolitan Armies together are reckoned at 22000 Men. Marshal Traun will set out for Bavaria next Tuesday, and in about ten Days Prince Charles will put himself at the Head of the Army in Silesia, which is already in Motion. We have Advice, that the greatest Part of Bavaria is in the Queen's Possession, and that the whole Country is in the utmost Confusion. Letters from Munich mention, that they are at a Loss there to know what is become of the Bavarian Army. The Hessians are endeavouring to reach Rain. The French are assembled near Donawerth, where they remain very quietly looking on without stirring, and General Bathiani, by this Time, we hope, may be in March towards that Place. The Hessian and Bavarian Prisoners are arrived here. The Officers of the former are permitted to go about the Town, and will shortly be sent to Gratz and Newstadt. The latter are to go into Hungary. There are above 80 of them in all.

Mentz, April 11. It is computed that the French Troops now assembling at Heidelberg will not make above 3500. The French have required of the Circle of Swabia to place Troops in Hailbron, but the Circle has reinforced their own Garrison there with a Design to refuse this Demand. The Prince of Conti is expected here in a few Days, to take the Command of the French Army, and M. Maillebois's Baggage is already sent away. M. de Loos, the Saxon Minister at Munich, is expected here in a little Time. The Austrian Troops having taken Possession of Landshut, were advanced within four German Miles of Munich, where every Thing was in the greatest Confusion; and there is Advice from thence, that the Elector of Bavaria intended to retire to Augsburgh on the 7th. The French have abandoned Kitzheim, and the Van-Guard of the Bavarian Army having shew'd itself between Landshut and Morbach, Major-

Major-General Trips, at the Head of the Queen's Troops, attacked them with so much Success, that they were entirely routed, three hundred Men of the Regiment of Taxis killed, and Froberg's Cuirassiers so roughly handled, that only 15 Officers and 200 Men remain'd of that Regiment, who were made Prisoners of War.

Mentz, April 14. We hear from Bavaria, that the Hessian General, discontented with Marshal Thoring's Dispositions, and enraged at the Loss of so many of his Troops at Vilshofen, had determined to save the rest by marching homewards; and that notwithstanding the Marshal had seized his Baggage in order to prevent that Separation, he had actually withdrawn his Troops towards the Frontier of Suabia. That M. de Segur was not better satisfied with M. Thoring than the Hessian General, and rather chose to defend himself separately than to join with the Bavarians, because the latter having lost the greatest Part of their Magazines, he should be obliged to feed them, and run the Hazard of not being able to subsist his own Troops. The Bavarian Infantry are said to want Arms, and their Cavalry Boots and other Necessaries. Part of the French Troops passed their Bridge in the Night, and this Morning at Ten o'Clock we saw a Regiment of Horse march the same Way from the Windows of the Palace.

Mentz, April 15, N. S. A Detachment of the French Army under the Command of Marshal de Maillebois, consisting of eight Battalions and nine Squadrons, began to repass the Rhine Yesterday upon the Bridge which they have set up at Biberick, a little below this City. 'Tis said this Body will be followed To-day by another Detachment, and that both of them will march into the Hunfruck, under the Command of M. de Chatelet, but upon what Design is a Secret. All our Advices from Bavaria confirm the Accounts already given of the Success of the Austrian Troops in that Electorate, and describe the ill State of the Bavarian Army, as well as the Dissentions that have arisen between the Bavarian, French, and Hessian Generals, since the taking of Vilshofen, in such Terms as seem to promise great Success to the Queen of Hungary's Arms in that Electorate.

Mentz, April 18, N. S. The Elector of Bavaria arrived the 15th Instant, N. S. at Augsbourgh, and it is said, that the Hessian Troops in the Service of Bavaria have passed by that Town. Baron Kesselstat and Baron Drost, Ministers of the Electors of Mentz and Cologne, came from Munich to Augsburgh the same Day, after having wrote to General Bathiani, at the Elector's Request, to desire that the Empress and his Grandmother the Electress of Bavaria might be permitted to stay in Safety at Munich. All the other foreign Ministers who resided at Munich, have followed the Elector to Augsbourgh. The French Troops which repassed the Rhine on the 14th and 15th, together with the Swiss Regiment of

Secdorf, consisting of three Battalions, which lay on the South Side of that River, were ordered to Bingen. In the mean-time we have Advice, that the Duke of Aremberg quitted Limpurg and Ober Lanstein on the 14th, upon which M. Maillebois immediately took Possession of the Lahne, and the Allied Army is at present encamped under the Cannon of Erenbreitstein, between Neuwied and Engers.

Berlin, April 13, N. S. Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Prussia and Prince Henry will go to the Army the 23d of this Month. The Marquis de Vallory is also invited to come to go thither, upon the first Notice he shall receive, and which he is now impatiently expecting, having made all the necessary Preparations for his Departure. The Boats which have lately gone off from hence, loaded partly with Provisions and warlike Stores, and partly with Recruit-Horses for the Regiments in Silesia, amount to 72 in Number; they debark at Audit, a Place situate on this Side the Territory of Lusatia, where Horses are ready to receive and transport the Cargoes. Recruits are daily going to Silesia: The three Regiments of Foot, and two Regiments of Dragoons of Roel and Stosch, as also four Companies of Grenadiers, and in short all the Garrison here, have received their last Orders for marching, and will be employed, with the Regiment of Foot of Leps, and that of Dragoons of Mullendorf, and some others, who are to return from Silesia, to form a Camp at Gethin near Magdebourg: This Corps will consist of 30 Squadrons and 12 Battalions, making about 12000 Men, whereof the reigning Prince of Dessau will have the Command.

Berlin, April 17, N. S. The twelve Battalions and 30 Squadrons, which are to form a Camp at Magdebourg, are beginning to file off that Way. Stosch's and Roel's Dragoons marched, the first Yesterday and the latter this Morning. It is said that the reigning Prince of Dessau having refused the Command of that Corps, his Prussian Majesty will confer it upon the Prince of Prussia. Several Cannons, from 18 to 24 Pounds, were taken out of the Arsenal this Morning, and embarked, in order to be transported to Magdebourg. Bredow's Regiment of Foot is to return into Garrison here upon the Departure of the present Garrison. We hear from Neiss, that his Prussian Majesty has dismissed Colonel Kalschaw, to whom he had lately given a Regiment, and the Prince of Anhalt Schaumbourgh a Captain. The old General Kleist is upon the Road in his Return from Silesia with all his Equipages, and Field Marshal Schwerin continues ill. They talk of his going to Aix la Chapelle, as soon as the Season and the State of his Health will permit him.

Augsbourgh, April 16, N. S. The Elector and his Ministers are arrived here. Yesterday the Austrians were very near Munich. They are supposed to be by this Time actually in Possession of it.

it. The Empress remains there with the Princesses her Daughters. The Bavarian Army is retiring towards Donawerth, pursued by the Enemy, and suffers incredibly by Desertion, occasioned by Want of Provisions, Forage and Money. The French were totally defeated Yesterday at Pfaffenhoven, and the Palatins made Prisoners of War. The Hessians do very little since their having lost three whole Regiments, who are Prisoners of War. Every Thing goes as ill as possible. The Bavarian Army will pass the Lech, and retire into Suabia.

Geiffensfeld, April 16, N. S. A Courier just arrived from the Austrian Head Quarters at Schrobenhausen, brings Word, that in the Battle which was fought Yesterday at Pfaffenhoven, Five Thousand French and Palatins were left dead upon the Spot, and that the Remainder, amounting to 4000, was entirely dispersed. He adds, that the Austrians lost some hundreds of Men in the Action.

Brussels, April 21, N. S. This Day his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here about twelve at Noon. Count Caunitz Ridberg, Minister Plenipotentiary for the Government General of these Countries, with Marshal Konigsegg, and Count Lanoy, Governor of this Place, went to meet his Royal Highness at Antwerp, and returned hither in the same Coach with him, which was preceded by a Detachment of his Majesty's Horse Grenadiers, and followed by two of his Royal Highness's Coaches empty, together with another Detachment of the said Guards. The Cannon upon the Ramparts were fired upon his Royal Highness's entering the Gate of this Town, and the Burghers, who had been order'd under Arms, attended there, and at several other Stations, where the Duke was to pass, particularly in the great Market, where the Town House stands, which was adorned as on State-Days, with Carpets and lighted Flambeaux all along the Front of it. From thence the Duke went on to the Hotel d' Egmond, which was prepared for him with the Furniture of the late Archdutchess and Prince Charles of Lorraine out of the Palace of Orange. The collateral Councils of Brabant, and the Magistracy of this Place, are order'd to compliment his Royal Highness upon his Arrival and Command.

Brussels, April 23; N. S. We have Advices here, that the French King was to set out as Yesterday from Paris, and that Part of the Household Troops are already entred this Country. The Marshal Count Saxe is at Maubeuge, and is in so bad a Way, that his Death is daily expected.

Ostend, April 25, N. S. The Garrison of Bruges and Ghent march this Day. Ponsonby's Regiment is this Morning marched to Bruges, there to wait farther Orders. Lord Harry Beauclerk's Regiment has Orders to be in Readiness for Wednesday. The French passed the

Scheld on Friday, and are encamped between Aeth and Vieux Condé. They began to invest Mons the same Night.
