**H**IS Swedish Majesty is at present recovered of his late Attack of the Gravel, and appeared Yesterday in Publick. On Friday last his Swedish Majesty was pleased to confer on Colonel Ungern, the Marshal of the last Diet, the Command of the Regiment of Horse, which was late Lieutenant-General Count Spence's. Yesterday the Prince Successor and the Princess his Consort removed from hence to Ulricksthal, where their Royal Highnesses propose to perform their Easter Devotions.

*Naples, March 16.* The King's Frigate is fitting out, in order, as is said, to cruize on the Adriatick Sea, together with one of the two large Row Boats, which are to be launched on the 23d Instant. Four Transport Vessels have been sent from this Port, two to the Presidii, and two to Gaeta, to bring over hither Ammunition and Military Stores. The Train of Artillery for the Spanish Army, it is thought, will be embarked on the Transports by the latter End of this Week; each Transport is to receive three Pieces of Cannon with their Carriages, Ammunition and Stores belonging to them.

*Naples, March 23.* On the 17th the Commission of the Diffidents held their Court, when Sentence was read against the Duke of Verzino, Francis Salazar, and four other Persons. They were condemned to Death as Rebels, being convicted of an Attachment to the Enemy's Party, and their Estates, Goods, &c. confiscated. The same Day three other suspected Persons were imprisoned by Order of the said Commission, whereof two were Dominican Fryers from Calabria. The Spanish Officers, sent hither by M. de Gages, are constantly assisting at this Arsenal, in getting ready a large Train of Artillery for the Spanish Army.

*Rome, March 20.* The City of Nocera having continued their Representations to the Pope, setting forth the Damages which that Republick had received in the late Surprize, which a large Detachment of Spaniards attempted on Count Soro and his Party, the Pope has granted to them a Deduction of 2000 Crowns per Annum, out of the Revenues which they pay to the Ecclesiastical Chamber. On the 14th Instant Cardinal Acquaviva received a Courier from M. de Gages, with Directions to send all the Spanish Officers and Soldiers that are in Rome to join his Army. On the 18th the last Division of the Neapolitan Horse and Foot passed by Monte Rotondo, on their March to join M. de Gages.

*Rome, March 27.* The Pope has sent his Credentials and Instructions to M. Stoppani, as his Nuncio Extraordinary to the Diet, for the Election of a new Emperor. On the 23d the

Pope ordered the Dismission of the Guard at the Gates of this City, and caused the Gates of St. Panerazio, St. Sebastiano, St. Lorenzo, &c. to be opened as usual.

*Turin, March 27.* Commodore Osborne, on board his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Essex, is arrived at Vado, and has taken the Command of the Squadron on the Genoese Coast, which consists of six 70 Gun Ships, four of 50, and three of 40. He proposed to go on a Cruize to the Westward, as soon as the Ships had taken in their Wood and Water. The King of Sardinia and his whole Court are under the greatest Affliction; for the Loss of the Duke d'Acste his Sardinian Majesty's Second Son, who died the Night before last of a lingering Illness, proceeding from the Scurvey. He was about five Years old, but seemed to be a very promising Prince.

*Turin, April 3.* By our last Letters from the Romagna we are informed, that M. de Gages was come forward as far as Fano and Pesaro, and that an advanced Party of his Cavalry had appeared at La Catolica, where there had been a Skirmish between them and some Austrian Hussars, to the Disadvantage of the latter, Part of them having been taken Prisoners of War. Prince Lobcowitz has moved forwards from Imola as far as Cesena; with a Design, as is given out, to make a Stand at Forlimpopoli.

*Florence, March 30.* On the 22d the Avant Guard of the Spanish Army arrived at Fano, where the Whole now is, except some Piquets of their Miquelets, who are extended to Pesaro, between whom and the Austrian Hussars Skirmishes frequently happen. The Spaniards seem to wait the Arrival of the rest of the Neapolitan Troops, which were to be 15 Battalions and nine Squadrons. Both among these latter and the Spaniards the Desertion has been very considerable during their March, and many daily arrive here. Prince Lobcowitz had given Orders for all his Troops to be ready to march, and has removed his Head Quarters to Cesena; to be at Hand to observe the Motions of the Enemy. The Austrian General detached, in Time, a large Party of Hussars to Fossombrone, Pesaro, Fano, &c. where, and particularly at the first of these Places, he had great Magazines; but, as it was impossible to transport the Hay and Straw, they set Fire to them, and removed by Water the Grain of all Sorts and the Flower, so that the Spaniards will find great Difficulty to get Subsistence, except what they receive by the Adriatick, either from the Roman Coasts, or the Kingdom of Naples. At the latter Place a great Number of large Cannon, Bombs and military Stores were embarking on Tartans and small Vessels for the Use of the Spanish Army, which were to proceed to some Port in the Adriatick. From Lombardy we are informed, that a Notification has been published at Milan, whereby

whereby the Queen of Hungary joins to that Government the States of Mantua, Parma, and the remaining Part of that of Placentia.

*Bern, March 31, N. S.* M. de la Ravoye, the French Governor of Constance, has now carried off almost all the Artillery and Ammunition belonging to the Arsenal of that City, and sent it to Huningue through the Forrest Towns. He has since asked and obtained Leave of the Canton of Schaffhausen to transport through their Territory by Water all the superfluous Provisions he had amassed of Corn, Flower, &c. The French Troops that have had their Winter Quarters, and still remain in Suabia and the Dutchy of Wirtemberg, are preparing to retire from thence. In the mean Time they exact what Contributions are in Arrear with the utmost Severity; and there are some Villages in the County of Nellenbourg, where the poor Parishoners have been obliged to pawn their Church Bells to, make up the Sums imposed upon them. The City of Ulm continues under great Apprehensions on Account of the Neighbourhood of the French Troops; and the Duke of Wirtemberg is actually raising in his Dutchy, with the utmost Expedition, a new Regiment for the Service of the Circle. The Prussian Envoy at Stutgard has left that Court on a sudden, and is set out for Ulm with new Proposals to the Circle from the King his Master.

*Bern, April 7.* Some Recruits for the Dutch Service, with their Officers, who had long waited at Schaffhausen for a Passage to their Regiments in Holland, have taken Advantage of a Motion which the French Troops in Suabia have made within these few Days, and have passed unmolested.

*Genoa, April 3.* The Spanish Army under the Command of the Marquis Castellar, is expected to be in Motion every Day. They have just received a large Reinforcement, by the Arrival at Villa Franca of 34 Sail of Barks and Shebecks full of Troops. The Cavalry which were in Savoy are in March to join them; and it is apprehended they have a Design to begin the Campaign very soon. Last Week arrived a Caravan of 53 Mules from Spain, loaden with 300,000 Dollars, which was delivered to the Spanish Post-master. And this Morning arrived another Caravan from Spain with 250,000 Dollars. This Republick continues her military Preparations with extraordinary Vigour, and is daily increasing the Fortifications towards the Sea, and they now talk of forming a Camp about Novi. They have made a Contract for 1000 Carriage Mules, conditionally that they shall be at their Disposal till the Month of June; and if they do not make Use of them in that Time, the Contract expires, and the Republick loses 26000 Livres. These Contractors have also undertaken to supply the Spanish Army at Onelle, Nice, and Villa Franca. This Republick expects, it is said, 2000 Grisons, who have agreed to enter into their Service. Two Days ago Orders were given to levy six Companies of Grenadiers, and six Noblemen were nominated to be Captains of them. They are to have the Motto upon their Caps *pro Patria*. Four Days ago arrived Lieutenant General Cecill, a Flanderkin, formerly in the Spanish Service; he is to have the Command in Chief of the Republick's Troops, with an Allowance of 30000 Livres a Year, during the War, and afterwards they are to allow him 10000 Livres a Year for Life.

*Extract of a Letter from the Body of Insurgents in Silesia, April 9.*

The Commanding General Count Joseph Esterhafi having on the 6th Instant ordered General Carosi to observe the Enemy, and the latter having heard that they were in Rosenberg, he attacked them with the Insurgents on the 8th with so much Bravery, that the Prussians were obliged to abandon the Suburbs, and retire into the Town; upon which the said General caused two Companies of his Troops to dismount, and obliged the Enemy to quit the Town also, and to retire into an inclosed Garden, where they capitulated. The Officers to march out with their Baggage and Arms, but the rest without any Signs of Honour, and to be obliged not to serve against the Queen for a whole Year. Just as the Capitulation was going to be signed, a Lieutenant Colonel came up with a Succour, but they were so vigorously attacked by the Insurgents, that they were obliged to ask for Quarter, and to give themselves up Prisoners of War. The first who capitulated consisted in three Companies of Infantry, and two Squadrons of Hussars, with two Pieces of Cannon; the latter in 200 Men, partly Infantry, and partly Hussars, with one Cannon. The Prussians, in setting Fire to the Magazine, set the whole Town on Fire.

*Vienna, April 14, N. S.* Amongst the Prisoners taken at Issyreck are as many Hessians, as, with those taken at Vilshofen and elsewhere, amounts to the Number of three Regiments. A pretty good Magazine was found at Issyreck, a much more considerable one at Straubing, but the greatest of all fell into Count Bathiani's Hands at Landshut.

*Berlin, April 20, N. S.* We hear from Silesia, that a Corps of Insurgents has surprised and cut to Pieces a Prussian Detachment of four Companies of Foot, and a Squadron of Hussars at Rosenberg, on the other Side the Oder, and burnt the Suburbs of that Town. The Artillery which was embarked on Saturday last, consists of 28 Pieces of Cannon, to which a like Number will be added at Magdebourg. They are making here 4000 Cannon Balls from 6 to 18 and 24 Pounds, and there are 28 Carriages besides laden with warlike Stores. The Regiments of Foot will march from hence upon the 23d of this Month: One of those which are to form the Camp at Magdebourg, viz. the Prince of Darmstadt's, consists of three Battalions, of which the Garrison of this Town is at present composed, so that upon their Departure there will be only one Battalion of Kroscher's, and one of Bredow's Regiment to garrison both this Place and Stettin. Baron Gersdorff, the late Saxon Minister in Russia, arrived here on Saturday last in his Way from Petersburg to Dresden.

*Copenhagen, March 20, N. S.* This Court seems to be already upon the Point of removing into the Country, in order to enjoy as much as possible of the fine Season, before the Princess's Lying-in obliges them to return to Town. As the Duke and Dutchess of Wirtemberg-Oels are going into Germany to take Possession of the Succession of Bernstadt, the Queen of Denmark has presented the Dutchess with a magnificent Suit, Cloth of Silver flower'd with Pearls, to wear at her Appearance there in State. His Danish Majesty has also given Lands in the County of Oldenburg, about the Value of 20000 Rix-dollars, to M. Von det. Osten, Privy Counsellor.

lor, Comptroller of the Sound Duties, and President of the Chamber of Finances.

*Mentz, April 22.* The French in this Neighbourhood have continued to repass the Rhine; to the Amount of six Thousand Men, and Duke d'Artemberg continues his March towards Neuwied. The French extend themselves from the Mouth of the Lahne to Königstein, and even to Aschaffenburg, and have sent 800 Men into the Principality of Fulde, where they have required 350,000 Rations from the Abbot of the People of that Country. They have also demanded 60,000 Rations in the County of Hanau. M. Maillebois is set out for Italy; and General Loewendahl for Flanders. The Prince of Conti will arrive To-Day or To-morrow at Francfort, accompanied by the Marquis de Fénelon, who is to serve in this Army at the Prince's Request. The French have assembled all their Force which they have in the Circle of Swabia, and extend themselves upon the Neckar, from the Neighbourhood of Heidelberg beyond Hailbron, where they would willingly have taken Post; but the Garrison is reinforced, and the Circle has refused them Entrance into that Fortress. The French pretend, that this Corps consists of 15,000 Men; but by other Accounts they do not amount to more than 8 or 9000. By Letters from Augsburgh and Munich we learn with Certainty, that the French and Palatin Troops in Bavaria, commanded by M. de Segur, were entirely defeated and dispersed, on the 15th Instant, by General Bathiani, at Pfaffenhoven, a few Leagues from Ingoldstadt.

*Hague, April 27, N. S.* The News of the Victory gained by the Austrians over the French and Palatins near Pfaffenhoven on the 15th Instant, is confirmed from several Quarters. As yet indeed no particular nor minute Relation of that Advantage has reached this Place; but to judge by the Enemy's Loss of all their Artillery and Baggage, M. de Segur the French General's being made Prisoner, M. de Rupelmonde killed, and M. Zastrow, the Palatin General, wounded, it must have been a very bloody and decisive Action. A Courier just arrived from Bonn, has brought us the important News, of the Conclusion of the Accommodation between the Queen of Hungary and the Elector of Bavaria; but the Conditions of this Accommodation are yet unknown here. There is a flying Report of the Austrians having come up with and entirely routed the Remnant of the French and Palatin Corps on the 16th or 17th, in the Neighbourhood of Donawert.
