Naples, June 15, N. S.

ON the 13th their Majesties, attended by their respective Courts, came to this City for their Devotion, and in the Evening returned to Portici.

Rome, June 19, N. S. The Pope has caused the Militia-Quitassiers of Assisi and Città di Castello, to be dismissed and sent to their respective Countries, as no longer necessary. On the 14th M. de Calignac set out from hence to Civita Vecchia, to attend the landing there from Provence of the new French Ambassador to the Pope, who arrived in Rome on the 17th. On the 15th the Pope, attended by his Court, returned to Rome from Castle Candolfo, to assist at the Functions of the Feast of Corpus Domini, as did many Cardinals from their Country Seats on the same Occasion.

Florence, June 22, N. S. On the 21st the Marquis Silva received back from Genoa, the Courier which he had last Week dispatched to M. de Gages, concerning his Negotiation with the Regency about the Passage of the Spanish and Neapolitan Troops through Tuscany; and in Consequence thereof, dispatched a Courier to Viterbo, that Evening; notwithstanding which, as he has not made any farther Application to the Regency on that Head, it is looked upon that the Passage of the said Troops is for the present laid aside.

Lisbon, July 3. On the 11th past, N. S. Vice-Admiral Rowley appear'd with his Britannick Majesty's Ships off Fato. The Toulon Squadron was not returned to the Bay of Cadiz the 5th Instant. Three Register Ships, which were expected from Vera Cruz, are got into the Bay of Cadiz. They called at the Havanna, and came all from thence, with two more which have not yet appeared. The Money brought by these three Ships is only 70,000 Pieces of

Eight, for the Payment of their respective Crews. All the rest, which they had on Board in Register, was taken out at the Havanna, and the same is now done to all the Register Ships that come from Vera Cruz, or any other Part of America, and touch at the Havanna. A Register Ship, called the El Postilion de Alicante, which came from the Havanna, is taken by one of his Britannick Majesty's Ships, and carried into Gibraltar.

Admiralty-Office, July 8.

Captain Douglas, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Greyhound of 20 Guns, in his Passage from Cork to Lisbon, on the 15th of April last, at Sun Rising, saw two Sail in the Latitude of 45 : 58 N°. to which he gave chase, and about Nine got up with the Sternmost, and after exchanging a few Shot, she struck. He then made Sail after the other, and came up with her at Two, when she struck without firing a Gun. The one proved to be the Benjamin, Captain Daniel Suire, a Ship of 20 Guns and 57 Men; the other the Neptune, Captain Larroque Furgeau, a Ship of 18 Guns and 47 Men, both from St. Domingo, but last from Havanna. Their Lading is Indigo, Sugar, and about 1500 Dollars. He has carried them into Lisbon.
