Genoa, June 26, N. S.

**O**N the 21st Instant M. de Gages reinforced his advanced Guard with 1000 Foot, and the same Evening removed the Head Quarters of the Army to Langasco, (a Village about two Miles upon the Bochetto) and 400 Mules for the Train arrived in St. Pierre d'Arena from Don Philip's Army: The next Day he received another Reinforcement of 1200 Horse from the Infant's Army, and upon a false Alarm the whole Corps was collected together at Campo Marone; and Orders were given that five Pieces of heavy Cannon, with six Field Pieces, should be sent to the Army, which has since been placed near the Head Quarters. The same Evening Advice came, that Lieutenant General Schulemberg had been reinforced by 6000 Sardinian Militia, and had removed his Head Quarters to Novi. He has detached 2500 Infantry and Cavalry to Voltaggio, and taken Possession of the Provisions and Forage there, and in the Lomellino, that was designed for the Spaniards, and planted six Pieces of Cannon between Gavi and Carosio, having advanced the Picquets to the Mills, three Miles on this Side Voltaggio. On the 24th Instant, about 2000 Infantry arrived from Don Philip's Army, and continued their March for the Head Quarters at Langasco; 3000 more, and 800 Cavalry, are expected in a Day or two from Savona, besides the Troops that are coming from Naples, 1200 of which, and sixty Mules, are arrived at Leghorn. This Week six Vessels from Porto Fin, Villa-franca, and Savona, arrived with six Cannon of twenty-four Pounders, two Mortars, ten Cases of Granadoes, and a few Bombs, and were landed this Morning, and sent into St. Pierre d'Arena, with all their Carriages, &c. Letters from St. Remo of the 22d Instant ad-

vised, that about twenty Sail of Vessels from Villa-franca, with Cannon, &c. appearing in Sight of that Place, standing towards this Port, his Britannick Majesty's Ship Feversham immediately cut her Cables, and chased them, and it is reported here, has taken a Neapolitan and two French Tartans: The others are dispersed. The English Ships that are cruising on this Coast, detain all Vessels they meet with, that are laden with Corn, Wine, &c. bound to this Port, and send them to Leghorn. Don Philip's Army is marching to Savona; the Infant and Marshal Maillebois were expected to arrive there last Night; and it is said here, that the French Troops are to act jointly with those of Spain, and to march from thence to besiege Demonte and Coni, as soon as their Train arrived. This Republick continues their military Preparations with all possible Vigour; their Train of forty Pieces of heavy Cannon will be in Readiness to move next Week, and a Body of 6000 Men have received Orders to march in three Days Time; and it is not doubted but their Troops are to join M. de Gages's Army, in Consequence of a Treaty; which, it is said, has been concluded between them, France and Spain, and was signed this Week on their Behalf. It is also given out, that they have prepared a Manifesto, which will shortly be published, and that they will very soon declare openly against his Sardinian Majesty.

*Venice, July 2, N. S.* The Piemontese have destroyed a Magazine at Ventimiglia, and another at Albenga; and taken several Mules laden with Baggage belonging to Don Philip and Marshal Maillebois. It is reported here, that on Monday last the 23d, the Republick of Genoa was to publish a Manifesto, and that 10,000 of their Troops were to join the Spaniards the next Day, to which were to be added 3000 more that were in Garrison at Final.

Journal

*Journal of the Saxon Auxiliary Army in Bohemia, from the 2d to the 5th of July, N. S. dated from their Head Quarters at Johannisberg, near Konigingratz.*

The 2d of July we continued in our old Camp near Konigingratz. In the Afternoon the Prussians detached some Foot and Hussars to set Fire to a Farm near the Adler, from whence the Austrians for some Time past had daily carried off some of their Horses. The Croats who were in Possession of an Eminency near the Town, having discover'd the Corps of Prussians, and the Fire which was just breaking out, came down from their Post, and fell upon them with so much Fury, that, after having killed above 40, they drove them back to their Camp, notwithstanding the Fire of a Prussian Battery which had been erected to second their Attempt. The Croats lost only three Men, and had a few wounded. We had Intelligence that a Body of Prussians, consisting of Horse, Foot and Hussars, was again posted on the Side of Opoczna.

The 3d halted. We had several Accounts of General Nadafti's Hussars having taken some Part of the Convoys design'd for the Prussian Army, which were coming to them out of the County of Glatz. The Prussian Deserters informed us, that another very considerable Detachment had been lately sent from their Army into Silesia: We wait for the Confirmation of this News from other Hands. Forty Deserters together came in to Prince Charles's Quarters. The two Chiefs of the Combined Army went to view the Works which had been raised for the Defence of Konigingratz, and the Security of the Bridges, together with the Batteries erected in the Front of the Right Wing, in order to hinder the Enemies passing the River.

Upon the 4th halted. We had Advice from Colonel Bartoszewitz, who with his Pulk, and Lieutenant Colonel Desoffi with 600 Hussars, the Whole supported by 1000 German Horse, under the Command of Colonel Count Kollowrath, had been detached to pursue a large Body of Prussian Hussars, who were ranging up and down the Country, and exacting Contributions where-ever they passed, that they had not been able to come up with the Prussians, though by keeping close at their Heels they had obliged them to quit Bohemia; which they had accordingly done, and were retiring into Silesia by the Way of Messersdorff, which is situated in a Corner of Lusatia, and is the same Place through which Lieutenant General Einsiedel's Corps made their Escape last Year. The Duke went to reconnoitre the Position of the Prussian Army.

Upon the 5th halted. We had Advice that five Squadrons of Prussian Hussars had attempted to pass the River at Hohenbruck, but that having found our Men in Possession of this Post, they had thought proper to return. One

of our Parties took a Prussian Lieutenant Prisoner between Neustadt and Nachod, and 130 Horses laden with Provisions for the Enemy from the County of Glatz. Prince Lobcowitz, who arrived lately from Vienna, came to pay his Respects to the Duke of Weissenfels at his Quarters.

*Journal of the Saxon Auxiliary Army in Bohemia, from the 6th to the 9th of July, N. S. dated from their Head Quarters at Johannisberg near Konigingratz.*

The 6th of July we continued in our old Camp near Konigingratz. The Prussians also remain'd in their old Position. We had Advice from Albrechtieza, that the Prussians had attacked, near Przepich, a Village not far from Hohenbruck, a Patroll of Rudniski's Pulk of Tartars, who having retired to a Post possessed by 100 Austrian Hussars, the Prussians pursued and attacked them. In this Skirmish the Hussars lost an Officer and 12 Men, who were all made Prisoners. The Prussian Detachment amounted to 700 Horse and Foot and Hussars.

Upon the 7th halted. We had Advice that there had been a slight Skirmish between some Austrian Hussars and the Prussians, these last having attempted to carry off some Forage near Hohenbruck, which however they did not succeed in. One of our Parties carried off 200 Horses belonging to the Prussians. Count Khevenhuller, Grand Marshal of the Queen of Hungary's Court, passed by with his Lady in their Way to Dresden.

The 8th halted. Prince Lobcowitz came to the Duke's Head Quarters, and dined there. Colonel Wilczewski sent Advice from Plotistie, that his advanced Posts had been attacked by some Prussian Hussars, a Regiment whereof advanced towards him. He was of Opinion, that they were posted there in order to cover the Foragers, and we expect further Accounts from him.

Upon the 9th halted. Several Prussian Deserters were sent in by Lieutenant Colonel Desoffi from Prim. Several Spies, who were discovered in the Combined Army, were executed. Amongst whom was a Boy of eleven Years of Age, who was sent to an House of Correction. By our last Accounts from Upper Silesia, the Detachment sent from the Prussian Army in Silesia, which advanced through the County of Glatz, was reinforced to the Number of 10 or 12,000 Men. General Nassau, who commands the said Detachment, is marching to attack the Hungarian Insurgents, and the other Troops in Upper Silesia, under the Command of Field Marshal Count Esterhasi.

Upon the 9th we perceived that the Right Wing of the Prussians was weakened, and the Advice, which we had received from General Nadafti and our Tartars, that a great Detachment

ment of their Troops had been sent towards Opoczna, was confirmed; however, we could not find out their Design in this Motion.

The Prussian Deserters deposed, that Forage was very scarce in their Camp, and that there was a Mortality amongst the Horses.

Prince Charles came to the Duke's Head Quarters to confer with his Highness.

*Journal of the Army upon the Mayn, under the Command of the Marshals Traun and Bathiani, from the 5th to the 7th of July, N. S.*

On the 5th the Army moved from Gelnhausen, in order to encamp at Langenrebold, where they fixed their Head Quarters. They marched in very good Order, and took no Carriages with them but the Cannon and Ammunition Waggons. The Grand Duke of Tuscany arrived at the Army this Day. We perceived the Enemy also in March on the Side of Offenbach.

The 6th halted. The whole Army passed in Review before his most serene Highness.

General Baronai advanced towards Windecken with the Van Guard composed of 1000 Foot, 800 Horse, a Body of Austrians, and some irregular Troops. One Party of these posted themselves on the Right of the Mayn, in the Villages of Kahle, Oftheim, Archeim, &c. The Enemy were also in Motion on their Side, and every Occasion was taken on either Side of firing upon each other.

The 7th halted. His Serene Highness went to reconnoitre the Enemy's Camp as far as the Mayn, and on the Right as far as the Vanguard of General Baronai.

Orders were given to march the next Morning, and we received Advice, that the French had begun to throw a third Bridge over the River at Hoechst.

*Journal of the Army upon the Mayn, from the 8th to the 11th of July, N. S. dated from Peterweih.*

Upon the 8th the Army marched; the Left Wing was posted between Heldbergen and Windecken upon the Nidder, and the Right between Rendel and Carben. The Head Quarters were fixed at Windecken, General Baronai having the Avant Guard upon the Right, and General Trips with the Irregulars being posted on the Left. Notice was given in the Camp, that for the future his most Serene Highness the Grand Duke would give the Word and the Orders upon the Days of March at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, and upon other Days in the Morning, so that from henceforth the two Field Marshals in their Turns will receive their Orders and the Word from his Highness. We had Advice that the Enemy remained between Steinheim and Offenbach.

Upon the 9th halted. In the Afternoon the Grand Duke went to reconnoitre the Environs in Front.

Upon the 10th the Army marched and encamped the Right Wing at Nieder Eschbach, and the Left at Dortelweil towards the Nidder, the Generals Baronai and Trips having the Command of the advanced Guard. We had Advice in the Afternoon, and observed ourselves, that the Enemy were going down the Mayn towards Francfort. General Bernclau, who had been sent out to reconnoitre Hoechst, found that the Fortifications there were not extraordinary, and that there was no Cannon left.

Upon the 11th halted. We had repeated Advices that the Enemy were moving off on the Side of Sprenglingen and Gros Gerau, and that they had sent a Detachment of 2000 Men towards Aschaffenburg. Orders were given for our Army to march To-morrow towards Schwalbach, where the Head Quarters are to be fixed. We shall move in four Columns, and this March will determine the Fate of Hoechst.

*Vienna, July 7, N. S.* The Duke of Aremberg is setting out to serve under Prince Charles in Bohemia. The Detachment made by the King of Prussia, which, joined to the Garrison of Glatz, is said to be a Body of 10000 Men, has obliged the Insurgents to abandon all Lower Silesia. News is arrived here, that the Genoese have declared themselves Auxiliaries to France, and are to furnish 10000 Men, and a complete Train of large Artillery.

*Vienna, July 8, N. S.* This Morning died here his Excellency Count Staremburg, in an advanced Age, one of the Ministers of the Conference, and supreme Director of the Finances.

*Dresden, July 8, N. S.* We have Advice from Bohemia, that the King of Prussia received 600 Waggons laden with Provisions upon the 4th Instant.

*Dresden, July 11, N. S.* The Combined Army, by Letters from Bohemia of the 9th Instant, continue in their old Camp near Koniggratz. We have Advice, that Lieutenant General Nassau, whom the King of Prussia detached some Days since towards Silesia with about 8000 Men, has obliged the Generals Kehl and Bucco to abandon Patschau and Camentz. A Corps of 4000 Prussian Horse took Post the 9th at Opotschna.

*Berlin, July 10, N. S.* It is assured here, that the Detachment of the Magdebourg Corps, which was lately at Halle, is returned to Magdebourg, and that the whole Corps will be cantoned thereabouts till further Orders. A very considerable Detachment has been lately sent from the Army in Bohemia, under the Command of General Nassau, to oppose the Incursions of the Hun-

Hungarian Insurgents in Silesia, who have made themselves Masters of a great Part of that Country. They extend to Patchkaw, Wartha, and Franckensteyn. General Festetitz, with the Avant Guard, is advancing to Streelen, and he is followed by the Generals Caroli and Esterhasi, with a very considerable Body of Men.

*Berlin, July 13, N. S.* The King of Prussia has given the late Count Trusches's Regiment to General Polentz. The Magdebourg Corps continue in their Cantonments. We have frequent Advices from Bohemia, but they bring nothing of Moment. Skirmishes daily happen between the two Armies, without any considerable Losses on either Side.

*Hanover, July 11, N. S.* This Morning M. de Moesting, Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to the Prince Royal of Denmark, arrived at Herrnhausen, being sent from the said Prince express to his Majesty, with the joyful News of her Royal Highness the Princess of Denmark's having been safely delivered of a Prince on the 7th Instant.

*Grammont Camp, July 6, N. S.* The Day after we changed our Camp, the French came into the Plain of Lessines so thick, that the Hussars were forced to quit it before they could be sustained. The Day following the whole French Army advanced to within a short League of Grammont, and seemed as if they intended to attack us; whereupon some Battalions were sent into Grammont, with twelve Pieces of Cannon. The whole Army was under Arms till the French encamped, which they did about Three of the Clock in the Afternoon. This Morning about Four the whole French Army put itself in Motion, upon which our Army stood to their Arms; they marched and countermarched ten Hours, and at last encamped about the Town of Grammont on the other Side the River, about a League Distance every Way.

*From the Camp of the Allies at Meerbeck, July 11, N. S.*

Upon the 7th, at Eleven o'Clock at Night, we had Advice that the Enemy were under Arms, and in Motion to attack us; on which our whole Army was ordered out, and formed itself in Order of Battle with great Expedition and Alacrity. About One in the Morning the Enemy beat the General, and repeated it three Times, however they did not march till Noon, and continued marching and countermarching till Eight of the Clock at Night, when they were not a League and a half distant from us.

*Hague, July 16, N. S.* According to the freshest Advices from the Allied Army in the Netherlands, it was returned behind the Canal of Brussels, and the River Senne; and had on the

15th Instant its Head Quarters at Dieghem. The French King had his at Borst, a Village between Alost and Oudenarde; the Siege of which latter Place was thought to be begun. There are as yet no Accounts of the French having made themselves Masters of the Citadel of Ghent, or of the Town of Bruges. General Molcke, with the Squadrons he saved out of Ghent, is arrived at Sas de Gand. The great Inundation is formed at Dendermonde; and a Detachment of 2000 Men is sent from the Army to Antwerp. Sixty Dutch Cannoneers are gone to Brussels at the Request of Count Caunits; and the States have likewise sent Orders to the Governors of Sluys, Hulst, Lillo, and Bergen-op-zoom, to open their Great Sluices, as it is supposed has been done at Ostend. From the Mayn there is Advice of the 12th Instant, that the Great Duke was arrived at Francfort; and that Prince Conti was drawing his Army towards Gros-Gerau, and seemed to be preparing for a Repassage of the Rhine at Oppenheim. On the 7th Instant about Eleven o'Clock in the Forenoon, her Royal Highness the Princess of Denmark was most happily delivered of a Prince, who was the same Day baptized by the Name of Christian, and received the Order of the Elephant.

*Hague, July 20, N. S.* According to the freshest Advices from the Army in the Netherlands, the French had not yet begun the Siege of Oudenarde. The small Number of Troops that retired into the Citadel of Ghent when the French surprised the Town, having obliged them to bring heavy Artillery before it, and waited till they had raised a Battery, were forced to surrender themselves Prisoners of War. The Governor of Sluys in Flanders having received Orders to form the great Inundation by cutting a Dyke, sent out two Engineers and a Detachment of 25 Men to cover the Workmen; but the Peasants of the Neighbourhood hearing this, run to their Arms, fell upon this Detachment, killed the two Engineers, and carried off the Detachment to the French, to whom they at the same Time submitted themselves, and claimed their Protection. By exact Lists of the two Armies now on the Rhine, it appears, that the Great Duke's consists of 101 Squadrons, and 66 Battalions; and the French of 75 Battalions and 114 Squadrons; but the Strength of the Battalions and Squadrons in the first, makes more than Amends for the Exceedings in the Numbers of the last. The Great Duke had his Quarters on the 13th Instant at Hocheim. General Bernclau was advanced to Biberich, and General Trips had passed the Mayne at Hoehst, which Post the French, after having burnt their Bridges, abandoned at the Approach of that General.
