Journal of the Combined Army in Bohemia, from the 4th to the 7th of September, N.S. COlonel Franchini fent an Account, that having learnt that the Marquis de Vallory, the French Envoy, was lodged in the Suburbs of the Town of Jaromirz, he had laid a Scheme for carrying him off. For this Purpose he sent 150 Croats in Waggons, who were to advance to the faid Suburbs, and order'd an Officer with 60 Men, to enter into the Envoy's Lodging, and to feize him and his Papers. This Expedition succeeded partly so well, that the Men got into the Houfe through a Barn, and penetrated into his Afflichamber, where the Secretary of the Embally was; he was immediately feized, and fome Papers fecured, but the Envoy escaped. In the mean while the Alarm being fpread through the Town, the Pruffian Troops marched out in great Numbers, attacked our Men, and obliged them, with the Lofs of one Man killed and three wounded, to retire. However they brought off the Plate and divers other Effects belonging to the Envoy. The same Day Major General St. Andrée sent Advice, that the Pruffians at Neufladt remained very quiet, although they began to feel the Want of Provisions, occasioned by our Croats harrassing their Convoys, and carrying off great Quantities. Upon the 5th the Croats obliged Six Squadrons of Pruffians, who were marching 'to reinforce the Garrison of Neustadt, to return with great Precipitation. One of our Free Companies came up with a Convoy going to the Pruffian Army hear Braunau, made nine Men Prifoners, and brought off feveral Carriages. Upon the 6th, we had an Account from Lieutenant Colonel Palfi, that the Corps which he was ordered to conduct from Upper Silefia into Bohemia, árrived Yesterday Morning at Szoblitz near Gitlchin. We also learnt that Lieutenant Colonel Desoffij who had been ordered to follow a Pruffian Corps which marched upon the 5th from Reichenberg towards Friedland, had attacked the faid Corps feveral different times, and had not only greatly retarded their March for fome Hours, but had killed feveral Men, and wounded many more. 1 ᆞᆏ

the many Skirmishes which he had with them on different Occasions.

Upon the 9th, Prince Charles reviewed the fix Companies of Huffars of Haller's Regiment, lately raifed, as also the Battalion of Harrach, which fome Time fince had been taken Priforers of War by the French and was lately ranfomed. The fame Day Colonel Count Palfi fent Advice, that he was arrived at Tarnau with 1000 Horfe and fome Hundreds of Croats, and from thence proposed to march in Putsuit of General Gesler,

Upon the 10th we had an Account from General Nadasti, that the Prussians had the Day before fet Fire to the Suburbs of Neufladt. This Morning Niepperg's Battalion, formerly Part of the Garrison of Friebourg, and lately exchanged by the French, arrived at the Atmy. One of our Parties made 13 Huffars Prisoners, befides a Pruffian Courier, who was carrying Difpatches to General du Moulin.

Upon the 11th the Pruffians, to the Number of some Thousand Men, marched and attacked the little Fort built near Jassena upon the Mettad, which obliged our Troops which were posted -there, and which confifted only of 300 Men, to retire. Baron Trenk having fent Advice, that the Pruffians were fending a confiderable Destachment towards Neustadt, General Nadaffi immediately fent him a Reinforcement of 200 Horfe, which was followed upon the 12th by another Detachment of 300, upon the News being confirmed that the Pruffians were marching towards the faid Town. In Effect, they advanced, with General Winterfeld at their Head, and making a Shew as if they intended to attack. General St. Andrée. He, after having put his Men in a proper Posture to receive the Enemy, attacked them first, and charged them near Spiwiflow, above Wirgowina, fo opportunely, that he obliged them to retire, notwithstanding the great Fire of their Cannon and Small-arms and to abandon to him fome riling. Grounds, From thence they turned towards the Towny and fell upon a Post guarded by 200 Croated who upon Account of their Superiority were obliged to retire. At the fame Time the Pruffians retired into a Wood between Spiwillow and Wyfloka. They were fcarcely fettled in that Polition before they quitted it to fall upon Co-Ionel Trenk, and pointed their Artillery, confifting of several Haubitzers, and Cannon of 12 Pounders, against the Battery which he had erected. Colonel Trenk defended himself till his Ammunition began to fail, and then thought proper to post his Men upon the rising Grounds near the Town of Neuftadt. During these different Actions, which lasted from Ten o'Clock in the Morning till Five, in the Afternoon, we had 13 Men killed and wounded. The Prof. fians, by what we can judge, must have loss great Number, especially in the first Skinnish, wherein our Cannon, charged with Cartridge Shot, did great Execution; and their, Defeuen inform us, that they had fent some Hundreds of Wounded to Neufladt, Moreover, a Detachment of Prullian Hullan having met a small Troop of Col. Franchinis Horse near the Village of Schweinscherl, ender voured to furround them; but the Lieutenant Colonel found Means to fend a Reinforcement to his Men in Time, whereupon the Prussians retired, and left, behind them fix. Men killed and fomy wounded, A little while after, a Prussian Battalion appeared in the Village of Dobrawicfe, but they did not ftay there long, but took' the Road to Skaliz.

Upon the 7th we were informed by General Nadalti, that the Pruffians were detaching 6000 Men from General Moulin's Corps towards Neufladt, probably with a Defign to facilitate the Introduction of some Provisions for the Use of the Garrison. This was confirmed by Major'General St. Andree, with this Addition, that the faid Detachment, after having conveyed the Sick from Neufladt; together with fome Baggage, and pillaged feveral Houses in the Town, were returning with the Croats at their Heels, who were continually allarming and harraffing them.

Journal of the Combined Army In Bobemia, from the 8th to the 15th of September, N.S. TIPON the 8th we had Advice from Lieutenant Colone! Defoffi, that the Pruffians, under the Command of General Geller, had, upon the 6th Instant, taken the Road to Ditterfbach, from whence they marched the next Day. by Winfendorff to Lauban if Lufatia. Upon the 13th, contrary to all Expectation, the Prullians marched out of Neultadr. Whereupon Simblichen's Corps, enter'd, into the Town and took Poffeilion of it. This Day we had Advice 'from' Lieutenant Colonel Desoffi, that he having learnt the Day before that the Right Wing of the Pruffians would come to Forage hear Hortitz, had attacked the Foragers upon, their Return on the Side of Zerfowiz, routed the Eloort, obliged the greatest Part of the Fofagers to leave their Truffes behind them, taken 29 Prisoners, and brought off 22 Horfes, without any other Lois on his Part than that of two Men killed and four wounded, as well as three Horles. Lieutenant General, Count Koniglegg being to march to Jaffene with fix Battalions, and 'all' the Carabineers, and Horfe Grenadiers, in order to take Possession of the Camp lately marked out there, Orders were given upon the 14th to all the Companies of Foot Grenadiers to march into the Wood near Plefs, and to post themselves there; and Count, Holieffembs, General of Horse, was ordered upon the 13th to march to Kralowalotha, with lix Regiments of Foot and four of Horle, in bider to encamp in that Neighbourhood. This Morning Prince Charles, with four Companies of Grenadiers, and 300 Officers, went to Slawatin, to reconnoitre the Prullian Camp. a. " Erlang, Sept. 21, The Queen, of Hungary arrived on the 19th in the Evening at Nuremberg, and was received with universal Demonftrations of Joy and Satisfaction both by the Magiftrates and the People. The Queon, after a thort Repose, came into the Antichamber, where the Ladies and Gentlemen were admitted to kils her Hand. Her Majesty set out the next Morning for Wurtzburgh, and was received at Emskerkin by the Margrave of Bareith, with the Princels Royal, and a great Part of their Court ; from whence, after Breakfast she purflied her Journey towards Francfort, and the Margrave his to Erlang, to receive the Duke of Wirtemberg, who arrived there Yelferday, attended by two Ministers and some Gentlemen of his Gourt. Vienna, Sept. 22. We have Advice here, that General Hagenbach having marched on the 13th with 15 Companies of Grenadiers and 12WQ. Cannons, and being follow'd the next Day by General Hoenem5s, with four Regiments of Horse and two Brigades of Foot, to fulfail all which, the whole Auftrian Army had Orders to hold itself in Readiness, his Prullian Majesty had, upon these Appearances, recalled the Body at Pless, under the Command of General Winterfelt, and was, according to the laft Advices of the 18th Instant, retiring by Way of Fraulettati filto Silefia. Berlin, Sept. 25, N. S. His Prussian Majetty is faid to be at Landshut. The Corps under General Gesler, confisting of five Regiments of Horse and Foot, was flopt at Kopenick for want of Horles for the Baggage, and was at last obliged to make use of those, which were kept in Readiness for the Artillery. It is however at prefent in March to the Camp of Prince Anhalt Deffau near Halle. The faid Corps will be immediately followed by feven Battalions of Grenadiers, under the Command of General Bonin, and when joined, the whole Army, with the Garrison that is to be left at Magdeburgh, will amount to 32 Battalions, feven Squadrons, and nine Companies of Grenadiers.

We have no other Accounts from Silefia, than that the Roads are very dangerous on account of the continual Incuffions of the Inforgents. A Corps of Troops under General Polentz, at Croffen, marched fome Time ago-towards the Frontiers of Poland, in order, as was given out, to difperfe the Heydamacks. They flay'd there fome Days, and were to move from thence upon the 19th Inftant; but it is not yet known what Route they were to take.
