Journal of the Combined Army in Bohemia, from the 16th to the 18th of September, N. S.
16. THE Account we had received of the considerable Loss sustained by the Prussians upon the 12th was confirmed; amongst the killed was a Lieutenant Colonel called Blumenau. By an intercepted Letter we found, that the Prussians had set Fire to the Suburbs of Neustadt by the express Order of the King. Lieutenant Colonel Trenk sent Advice, that by the Reports of several Deserters which came in the Day before, the Prussian Army was preparing to enter into the Camp lately occupied by the Corps under Winterfeldt, who was advancing towards Braunau. We had also Accounts from several Quarters, that one of the two Prussian Battalions posted at Schurfz was retired from that Place. Lieutenant Colonel Franchini sent Word, that Orders had been given in the Prussian Army to pack up the Baggage, and to hold themselves in Readiness to march; by which, and the Preparations which he had observed, he judged

judged they would very soon decamp, and that they had just received a Supply of all Sorts of Provisions. The reciprocal Exchange of Prisoners having been settled, 80 Prussian Officers, with 1500 Non-commission'd Officers and private Men, set out for Neu Bufow, in order to be exchanged for an equal Number of Austrians and Saxons. The Commissaries at the same Time agreed upon the Time for the Ransom of the other Prisoners not included in the Number above-mentioned.

Upon the 17th our advanced Parties sent Advice, that they perceived a Quantity of Artillery and Baggage belonging to the Prussians, filing off above Jaromirz, and that some of the Tents in their Camp were struck. As the same Things were observed from our Head Quarters at Aujest, Orders were sent to Major General Hagenbach to take Possession of Pless with the Grenadiers under his Command, as soon as that Place should be abandoned by the Enemy. About Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, Lieutenant Colonel Prince Lobkowitz, Son of the Field Marshal, arrived at the Army, with News of the Grand Duke of Tuscany's being elected King of the Romans upon the 13th, at Frankfurt; whereupon Prince Charles ordered, that the Sunday following should be set apart for returning Thanks to the Almighty; that Te Deum should be sung under a triple Discharge of all the Artillery and Small-arms, as well of the Army in general, as the Corps under Hohenemb, Koenigsfegg, and Nadasti, who were inform'd thereof; as well as the Governors of the Towns of Konigingratz and Pardubitz. At the same Time Major General St. Andre gave an Account of his having taken Post upon the 15th in the Neighbourhood of Nachod. He added, that the Prussians had countermanded building any more Ovens at Nachod; from which he was of Opinion, that they had resolved upon abandoning the Kingdom in a little Time. Lieutenant Colonel Desoffi wrote Word from Miletin, that the Prussians had the Day before made a general Forage near Policfan, and that the Foragers had been so well covered, and the Number of their Forces so superior to those under him, that he could not possibly interrupt them.

Upon the 18th, Prince Charles was informed by General Koenigsfegg, that besides having taken Possession of Neustadt, which had been evacuated by the Prussians, Count Nadasti had passed the Mettau, and was encamped between Bohuslawiz and Krzyn.

Accounts came from Lieutenant Colonel Franchini, who was then posted on the Side of Gwalkowiz, that the Prussian Garrison of Schurz was retired from thence to Jaromirz; that on the other Side, the Prussians had thrown several Bridges over the Elbe between Jaromirz and Hermanitz; that he had besides observed a Column of their Troops taking the Road to-

wards Gwalkowiz; that he did not know whether with Design to forage, or to return to Trautenau; however that there was a Report that they intended to post a Corps at Trautenau. Our Spies as well as the Deserters agreed, that the Prussian Army had not only sent away the greatest Part of the Baggage, but that all the Troops also held themselves in Readiness to quit their Camp that Day. Their Accounts proved true, for we had Advice, that at Three in the Morning the Prussians had abandoned Schmirfchitz, and that after the Signal given by firing a Cannon, their Army having decamped, was marching towards Skaliz, having first abandoned the Post of Pless, and even quitted the Town of Jaromirz: Whereupon our Troops had taken Possession of both these Places, and Detachments had been sent out in Pursuit of the Enemy: For this Purpose also Lieutenant Colonel Desoffi had Orders to pass the Elbe, and to concert with Lieutenant Colonel Franchini the proper Measures for falling upon their Rear, for cutting off their Communication with the Country thereabouts, and for intercepting their Convoys. The like Instructions were sent to Major General St. Andre and Colonel Trenk. At the same Time the whole Army prepared to march, in order to second the said different Corps of light Troops, to harrass the Enemy in their Retreat, and to drive them entirely out of Bohemia.

The following Speech was made by his Grace the Archbishop of York to the Nobility, Gentry and Clergy, who met at York upon this Occasion.

My Lords, Gentlemen, my Reverend Brethren of the Clergy,

I Am desired by the Lords Lieutenants of the Ridings, to open to you the Reasons of our present Assembling; and as the Advertisement, which has called us together, is in every Body's Hands, and the Fact now speaks itself too plainly, a few Words will be sufficient on the Occasion. It was some Time before it was believed, I would to God it had gain'd Credit sooner, but now every Child in the Kingdom knows it, That the Son of the Pretender is in Scotland, has set up his Standard there; has gather'd and disciplined an Army of great Force; receives daily Increase of Numbers, is in Possession of the Capital City there, has defeated a small Part of the King's Forces, and is advancing with hasty Steps towards England:—What will be the Issue of this rapid Progress, must be left to the Providence of God; however, what is incumbent upon us to do, is to make the best Provision we can against it; and every Gentleman, I dare say every Man in England, will think it his Wisdom and his Interest to guard against the mischievous Attempts of these wild and desperate Ruffians. But the great Mischief to be fear'd, which ought to alarm us exceedingly, and put us immediately on our Defence is, the certain Evidence, which every Day opens more and more, that these Commotions in the North are but Part of a great Plan concerted for our Ruin:—They have begun under the Countenance, and will be supported by the Forces of France and Spain, our old and inveterate, and late Experience calls upon me to add, our savage and Blood-thirsty Enemies:—A Circumstance that should fire the Indignation of every honest Englishman.—If these Designs should succeed, and Popery and Arbitrary Power come in upon us, under the Influence and Direction of these two tyrannical and corrupted Courts, I leave you to reflect, what would become of every Thing that is valuable to us.—We are now bless'd under the mild Administration of a Just and Protestant King, who is of so strict an Adherence to the Laws of our Country, that not an Instance can be pointed out, during his whole Reign, wherein he made the least Attempt

tempt upon the Liberty, or Property or Religion of a single Person :— But if the Ambition and Pride of France and Spain is to dictate to us, we must submit to a Man to govern us under their hated and accursed Influence, who brings his Religion, from Rome, and the Rules and Maxims of his Government from Paris and Madrid.—For God's Sake, Gentlemen, let us consider this Matter as becomes us, and let no Time be lost to guard against this prodigious Ruin.—To your immortal Honour be it spoken, you have consider'd it, and are now met together to call in the unanimous Consent and Assistance of this great Country. This Country, as it exceeds every other for its Extent and Riches, so it very naturally takes the Lead of the inferior ones ; and it will be extremely to our Credit, give Courage to the Friends of the best Constitution in the World, damp the Spirit of its Enemies at home, (if any such can be conceived in Britain at this Dangerous Crisis) and be an Instruction to those Abroad, that there is still Spirit and Honesty enough among us, to stand up in Defence of our Common Country. This will be the Use of an unanimous and hearty Declaration of Fidelity to our Country, and Loyalty to our King. But the Times, Gentlemen, call for something more than this ; something must be done, as well as said ; and the Fund for our Defence, already begun, and now to be proposed to this great Assembly, will, it is hoped, from Reasons of publick Example and publick Safety, meet with the hearty Concurrence of every Individual that composes it ; and at the same Time that your Hearts go along with the Association, your Hands will be open to support the necessary Measures of Self-defence.

As to you, my Reverend Brethren, I have not long had the Honour to preside among you ; but from the Experience I have had, and what I have always heard of your honest Love to your Country, if you permit me to say so, I will be your Security to the Publick, that ye will decline no Pains to instruct and animate your People, nor Expence, according to your Circumstances, to stand up against Popery and arbitrary Power under a French or a Spanish Government. We scorn the Policies of the Court of Rome, have no Interests separate from the People, but on every Occasion, where our Country is concern'd, look upon ourselves as incorporated with the warmest Defenders of it ; or if we do desire to be distinguished, it will be by our Ardour and Zeal to preserve our happy Constitution.

Let us unite then, Gentlemen, as one Man, to stop this dangerous Mischief, from which Union no Man surely can withdraw or withhold his Assistance, who is not listed into the wicked Service of a French or Spanish Invasion, or wholly unconcern'd for the Fate of his bleeding Country.

May the Great God of Battles stretch out his all-powerful Hand to defend us ; inspire an

Union of Hearts and Hands among all Ranks of People, a clear Wisdom into the Counsels of his Majesty, and a steady Courage and Resolution into the Hearts of his Generals !
