All which we will l faithfully perform, according to the plain Senfe and Meaning of the above written Instrument, 'as we hope for the Fayour of Almighty God,' and the Effeem of good Men.

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace and Grand Jury, affembled at a General Quarter Seffions of the Peace for the County of Kent, holden at Maidstone the 8th of October, 1745.

At the General Quarter Seffions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lord King George the Second, held in, and for the County of Effex, the Eighth Day of October, in the Nineteenth Year of his Majesty's Reign.

## Most gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Juffices of the Peace, Gentlemen and Clergy of the County of Effex, affembled at our General Quarter Selfions, most humbly beg Leave to declare to your Majerty, our Abhorrence of the infolent and rebellious Defigns which are now carlying on in some Parts of your Dominions in Fayour of a Popifh Pretender, and in Opposition to the Happiness we enjoy by the Establishment of your Majesty upon the Throne of these Realms. When we confider that these Disturbances were first fomented here by our most inveterage Enemies abroad, as the most effectual Means of dividing the Allied Power, and aggrandizing their own, to the general Destruction of the common Liberties of Europe ; When we reflect on the yet more immediate Confequences to our felves, in these daring Attempts to overthrow our Religion, Laws and Liberties; and when we are convinced that the Emissary now fent over is only made use of to be subservient to these defructive and inglorious Ends, we cannot but be filled with the highest Detestation against such a Tool of France, such a Friend to Rome, and fuch an Invader of the British Constitution.
