HEREAS for the more speedy Augmentation of His Majesty's Forces for suppressing the present Rebellion, His Majesty was pleafed, on the 5th Day of October last, to issue His Royal Proclamation, thereby promifing and declaring, That all such able-bodied Men, who should inlift themfelves as Soldiers in his Land Service on or before the 25th Day of December next, fhould, upon their Request, be discharged therefrom at the End of Six Months from the respective Times of their Inlisting, in Case the faid Rebellion should be exunguished within that Time, and if not, then as foon as the faid Rebellion should be extinguished. And whereas the Time thereby limited for such Inlisting is now near expiring, and that the Continuance of the Rebellion renders it still necessary to make such further Augmentation of his Majesty's Forces, as may most effectually ferve to put an End to the faid Rebellion : It is therefore his Majesty's Pleafure, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the faid Time of Inlifting be extended from the 25th of this Instant December, to the 25th of March next enfuing; and all fuch able bodied Men, who shall inlist themselves as Soldiers in his Majesty's Land Service, on or before the faid 25th Day of March next, shall, upon their Request, be discharged therefrom at the End of Six Months from the respective Times of their Inlifting, in cafe the faid Rebellion shall be extinguished within that Time, and if not, then as foon as the faid Rebellion shall be extinguished, according to the Terms of the aforefaid Proclamation.

Naples, Nov. 30. On the 24th Inflant, at Three in the Morning, her Sicilian Majefty was fafely deliver'd of a Princes, who was immediately baptized by the Name of Maria Louisa, and is the fifth Infanta born, of which Number the two first dyed.

Rome, Dec. 4. The Secretary of State has received by an Estafette from Ancona, an Account of the Decease of Cardinal Massei, Bishop of that City, on the 25th past.

Leghorn, Dec. 6. Captain Townschend failed from this Place the 3d Instant, with Part of the Squadron of his Britannick Majesty's Ships under his Command, for Corfica. The Day before his Departure he received Advice from thence, that the Corficans had taken the Town^a of San Fiorenzo, and it was expected they would foon make themfelves Mafters of the Caftle, being a Place of not much Strength, and but ill provided with Necessaries. A Body of 5000 Men was marched to blockade Calvi, and two other ftrong Detachments were gone with the fame Defign to Ajaccio and Bonifaccio. Captain Townshend has left behind him the Bomb-Veffels to be repaired, which is doing with the utmost Dispatch.

Prague, Dec. 9. It is faid that Prince Lobcowitz with his Column will arrive To-day at Pirna, as will Prince Charles with the reft of his Army at Leitmeritz; and Marshal Traum is on his March towards Saxony with a large Detachment; and that the Ruffians continue to advance towards the Pruffian Territories. Prague, Dec. 11, N. S. Prince Charles may be in Saxony this Day. His Army muft receive its Subfiftance from this Kingdom, which is likewife fettling the Manner of levying twelve or thirteen Thousand Recruits that the House of Austria is raising for next Year. It is faid his Pruffian Majesty demands 150,000 Rixdollars of each Circle in Saxony, and 238,000 a Month of Lusatia, besides Provisions. Here is certain Advice, that the Pruffian General Winterfeld, with a Corps of about 10,000 Men, has driven Field Marshal Hohenembs with that under his Command out of Silefia quite to Jaromirz. to Moravia. It is faid the Auftrians suffered, though not confiderably, in their Retreat, and lost Part of their Baggage. This Town is not without Apprehensions of another hostile Visit. Berlin, Dec. 11. By the freshest Advices his Pruffian-Majefty remains ftill-at Klofter Marienstern, and at Bautzen, with his whole Army. An Estafette arrived Yesterday Morning, and brought Advice, that a Corps under General Winterfeld has taken - Pirna, a Fortreis which lies between Drefden and Konigstein, and made the Saxon Garrison there, confisting of 300 Men, **Prifoners of War.** It is confirmed that the Ar_{+} my under the Command of the reigning Prince of Anhalt, has taken and plunder'd Eulenburg, which it is faid was done because the Inhabitants retain'd the Ferry upon the Elbe there. The same Fate had like to have befallen the Jown of Torgau, which would not immediately furrender when, summon'd, but the Barns without the Town being reduced to Ashes, they thereupon furrender'd to lave themselves from utter Ruin. On the 8th Count Podewils, M. Fockerott, and two Secretaries, let out for the King of Prussia's Camp . It is politively allur'd, that they are to feceive the Homage of the Inhabitants of Lufatia, the States of which Province are fummon'd to allemble upon the 18th Instant. A Bajtalion of Bredow, and three Squadrons of Huffars, in Garrison here, were detached on the 8th Instant to Lubben in Saxony, in order, as It is given out, to fearch for a Saxon Magazine, which, it is faid, is hidden there under Ground. Several Families are returned hither, and think themselves now in greater Security than ever. Great Preparations are making for the Recepion of his Pruffian Majefty. Yesterday Morning, after the Arrival of an Estafette from Cufrin, Orders were iffued to remove the Bridges that are upon the Spree, and to clear this River from Boats, Wood, and every. Thing that might ferve the Enemy to cross it. The Guards at the Gates are likewife doubled. Berlin, Dec. 14. By Letters from the Camp in Lusatia of the 10th Instant, there is Advice, that the main Body of his Pruffian Majefty's Army was then advanced towards Drefden; that a Corps' under General Lehwald's Command, was to join upon the 12th the Army of the reigning Prince of Anhalt at Torgau; and as all the Pruffian Forces march directly to Drefden, and as Prince Charles of Lorrain's Army draws near to the Saxon Frontiers, it was thought a Battle could not be avoided A Prullian Detachment of the Prince's Army attacked Meiffen, and fired fome Cannon at the Town, but the Garrison, though very small, having anfwered in the fame Way, and killed feveral Fruilians, they withdrew and threatned to return one Day or other; whereupon those who work at the China Manufacture there were fent away, and all the Moulds, the Ovens, and every thing belonging to it were broke and utterly destroy'd, the better to conceal the Secret whenever, the Prullians flould become Masters of the Town, The Prussian Army continues to taile very high Contributions, all over Saxony and it is politively allured, that the ready Money which the Inhabitants are obliged to pay every Ithan 60,000. It advances likewife in Jutland,

Day for the Maintenance of the faid Army, amounts to upwards of 60,000 Dollars.

Berlin, Dec. 18. On the 16th Instant, at Ten o'Clock at Night, the Chamberlain 'Marquis d'Escouville arrived here, preceeded by 36 Poffillions blowing their Horns, and brought Advice of a Victory gained over the Auftrians and Saxons near Drefden. The most authentick Account that is to be got here of the Engagement, is taken from what his Pruffian Majesty has written about it under his own Hand, the Substance of which is, That the Army under the King himself, marched from Konigsbruck to Meissen; the reigning Prince of Anhalt, reinforced by a Body of 15000 Men under General Lehwald, was ordered to amack the combined Army of Auftrians under General Grune, with the Van of Prince Charles's Army under Prince Lobkowitz, and of Saxons under the Duke of Weiffenfels's. Command, then encamping within a German Mile's Diftance from Drefden; that upon the 15th Instant, at Two o'Clock in the Afternoon, the Action began, and lasted till it was dark; that the Austrians and Saxons were defeated, and obliged to retire under the Cannon of Dresden or the Town itself; that the Number of the Enemies killed was not known then, but that the Prince of Anhalt had made 2000 Prisoners of War, and taken a Part of the Artillery and fome Baggage; that it was properly à Battle of the Infantry on both Sides, the Cavalry having been fcarcely at all engaged ; and that the faid Prince was going directly to Drefden, to bombard or to carry it by Affault. The King of Pruffia, who was, during the Action, with a Body confifting of 15000 Men, at Meissen, in order, as it was given out, to prevent the joining of Prince Charles's Army, was acquainted with the News of this Engagement by an Officer of the Corps of Hunters, fent by the Prince of Anhalt, and his Majesty dispatched the faid M, d'Escouville to this Eity. On the Pruffian Side, General Hertzberg is faid to be killed, and Prince Maurice of Anhalt to be loft. The Contributions which the Pruffians are raifing in Saxony, exclusive of the 60000 Dollars the Inhabitants pay for the daily Maintenance of the Army, will amount to feveral Millions. According to a Letter from Leipfig, that Town is to pay four Millions and a half; Count Bruhl's Estate, called Forst, is taxed to 200,000 Dolblars, and every Gentleman's Estate is to pay 20,000 Dollars. Besides, all the Furniture, Effects, and every Thing that has been found in Count Bruhl's House at Forst, valued at 100,000 Dollars, is carried off or broken, and entirely deftroy'd; and it is faid that Count Seckendorff's Effate has met with the fame Fate. Copenhagen, Dec. 11, N.S. The King of Denmark has been for fome Days indifposed with a violent Cold, and still keeps his Chamber upon that Account. Copenhagen, Dec. 14, N.S. The 14th of January next is appointed a Day of publick Fasting and Prayer to be observed all over Denmark, on Account of the Mortality which still rages and spreads amongst the Cattle. It is reckon'd that it has already carried off no lefs and

and the Apprehensions of it engages most People to kill their Cattle while they are yet found g to that probably there will be few or none left another Year in these Dominions. An Ordon-1 nance of the 2d Instant is just come out, recalling that of the 10th of September 1749, which prohibited the Exportation of Grain from Norway.

Vienna, Dec. 15, N.S. The Project which had been formed for General Keil's joining in Lower Silesia the Corps under Marshal Hohenembs from Bohemia, failed from a Mistake faid to have been made in transcribing of the Orders fent for that Purpose to Marshal Hohenembs, who, instead of marching to Langenberg, as it was intended he should, went according to the Mistake in his Instructions, to Landfhut, where he met with a superior Corps under the Command of General Nassau, and was obliged to retire, tho' with no great Lofs. He is now at Jaromirz, and is ordered, as is faid, to march with the utmost Diligence cross Bohemia after Prince Charles into Saxony. Hague, Dec. 21. The States General have ordered the Prince of Waldeck to increase the Corps of Huffars to 800 Men; to raife two more free Companies of 125 Men each; and authorized M. Aylva to contract for 8 or 10 Battalions, with fuch Princes or' Members of the Empire as have Regiments on Foot, and are willing to let them out to the Republick. The last Advices from Paris represent his Sardiniant Majesty as driven still nearer the Walls of his Capital; and mention the Spaniards having; notwithstanding the Season of the Year, detached a Corps to lay Siege to the Caffle of Milan. Hague, Dec. 22. Advices from Dresden of the 15th at Night, bring an Account of the Prince of Anhalt having that Day attacked and beat the Saxon Army, and that the Pruffians had made 4000 Prisoners, and had taken all the Saxon Artillery; but other Letters from Drefden represent the Loss in the Battle to have been, pretty near equal; and to amount to upwards of 5000 on each Side.
