Petersbourg, Nov. 30. On Monday last the 25th Instant, which was the Day of her Imperial Majesty's Accession to the Throne, her Majesty received the Compliments of all the Foreign Ministers in the Forenoon, and in the Evening the three Ambassadors only were invited to see the Ceremony of the Company of Life-Guards, who were drawn up four deep in the Gallery, and ranking off one by one, had the Honour to kiss the Empress's Hand. Her Majesty was dressed in the Uniform of the Company, with Boots, a Sash, and Cap with white Plumes; her Majesty marched at the Head of the Company into the Great Hall, where the whole Company, consisting of upwards of 400 Men, had the Honour to sup with her, and the Ambassadors were invited to sup in the next Room with the Great Duke and Dutchess. This Day being St. Andrew's Day, the Knights of that Order were at Court in their Robes and Collars, and had the Honour to dine with her Majesty; and at Night there will be a Ball.

Stockholm, Dec. 3, O. S. M. Breddal arrived here a few Days ago from Petersbourg, to notify to this Court the Conclusion of the Marriage between the Great Duke and the Princess of Anhalt Zerbst.

Copenhagen, Dec. 21, N. S. The King of Denmark does not yet appear in Publick, tho' his Majesty, it is said, is now so far recovered as to keep his Chamber rather by Way of Precaution, (the Weather being grown very cold) than by Reason of any actual Illness.

Berlin, Dec. 21, N. S. The News of the Surrender of the City of Dresden was brought here the 19th Instant, at 10 in the Morning, by

by one of the King of Prussia's Aid de Camps, the Marquis de-la Varenne, who was preceded by 24 Postilions blowing their Horns. The Day before the Action happened, two Prussian Regiments of Dragoons, viz. those of Roel and Bonin, were surpris'd by the Oulans, and almost entirely cut to Pieces, both Generals being killed, and several Colours taken. In the Engagement of the Day following the Saxons are said to have behaved extremely well, especially Rutowski's Regiment of Horse-Grenadiers, which routed the Prussian Grenadiers, and briskly attacked the Regiment of Anhalt, but was entirely broken after the Prince of Anhalt put himself at the Head of his own Regiment. It is positively affir'd, that this Regiment, consisting of three Battalions, has but 700 Men left; likewise that the Regiments of Polentz, Prince of Prussia, Hertzberg, and some more, have extremely suffered. General Hertzberg is killed, and General Polentz is wounded by a Shot through the Body; but Prince Maurice of Anhalt, who was thought lost, has been found again. What Prisoners we have made is not yet certain. The combined Army of Austrians and Saxons is retired into Bohemia. Great Preparations are making here for the Reception of his Prussian Majesty, who is expected in Town To-morrow.

Dresden, Dec. 25, N. S. M. Vaugrenant, the French Minister at this Court, only waits for the Return of his Polish Majesty hither, to present his Letters of Revocation. The King of Prussia sets out the 27th early in the Morning for Berlin.

Hambourg, Dec. 21, N. S. Large Sums are negociating upon the Exchange here towards putting the Magistrates of Leipfick in a Condition of furnishing their Contribution to the Prussians. The Duke Administrator of Mecklenburgh has been here some few Days. The Marriage of the Duke's eldest Son with a Princess of Wirtemberg, the most considerable Fortune in all Germany, is agreed on.

Hambourg, Dec. 24, N. S. Our Accounts received from Leipfick cause the greatest Consternation here, as the Trading Inhabitants of this City will be greatly affected by the Distress and Ruin in which their Correspondents there are most unhappily involved. The immediate Payment of the Contributions which the Prussians Demand is insisted upon. All Trade is stagnated, and all the Shops shut up. In the late Action of the 15th, Count Rutowski commanded the Saxons, and not the Duke of Weisfels, but his Highness was present in the Engagement as a Volunteer, had a Horse killed under him, and several Persons fell by his Side.

Antwerp, Dec. 27. The remaining 18 Squadrons of the British Troops are marched towards

Willemstadt. The Prince of Waldeck has ordered Four Battalions into Brussels and Two into Mechlin, and Three Battalions of Price's Regiment are marched from Brussels, and One Battalion from the Regiment at Mons are marched towards Luxembourg. By the last Accounts from Ghent, 2000 Men were to have marched the 21st from thence to Dunkirk. We have just received Advice from Count Chanclos at Brussels, that the Enemy are making great Preparations at Ghent, and design to make some Attempt, having brought in there several empty Waggon, and some Horses to draw the Artillery; and according to Intelligence from Ghent Three Days ago, they had sent from the Dominicans at Ghent, 250 Waggon loaded with Biscuit to Dunkirk, where by all Accounts they are preparing for a considerable Embarkation.

Hague, Dec. 30. By an Express arriv'd here To-day from Mons, every Thing in those Parts continued alert, but no Blow had been struck, nor could it yet be guess'd with any Certainty where it would fall.

Penrith, Dec. 20. The Rebels having carried off their Killed and Wounded, when they were driven out of the Village of Clifton by the King's Forces, it has not been possible to ascertain their Loss; but since that Affair about Seventy of their People have been taken Prisoners.

Of the King's Forces, the Regiment that suffer'd the most, was his Majesty's own Regiment of Dragoons, some Officers of which being wounded, the Rebels cried, *no Quarter, — Murder them.* — And they received several Wounds after they were down.

About Ten o'Clock on Wednesday Night, that Corps of the Rebels which was at Penrith, and had order'd their Cannon and Baggage to advance during the Skirmish, retired with the utmost Precipitation to Carlisle, where they arriv'd Yesterday Morning about Ten. It was so dark, and the Country so cover'd, that it was not possible to pursue them that Night, and the Troops being fatigued with the forc'd Marches they had made through very bad Roads, they halted at Penrith Yesterday, and were join'd last Night by the greatest Part of the Foot, and by the Remainder this Morning.

By the best Accounts the Rebels are still at Carlisle, but it is thought their Intention is to go off To-morrow, if the Rivers and Floods will permit them. If they continue there, his Royal Highness proposes to invest the Town To-morrow with the Troops now here, and the Detachment from Marshal Wade's Army, and a Train of Battering Cannon from Whitehaven, which is to be To-day at Cocker-mouth,

mouth, and has Orders to move with the whole Possé Comitatus, which will be assembled To-morrow at Wigtoun.

Dublin, December 17.

A French West-India Ship, worth 15000 l. was brought into Cork Yesterday.

Newcastle, December 21.

Marshal Wade arrived here Yesterday, and gave Orders for the immediate March of One Thousand Foot, and Fifty Horse, to join his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland in the Neighbourhood of Carlisle. Those Troops marched accordingly from hence this Morning, and will be To-morrow Night at Haltwefel.

Whitehall, December 22.

This Day arrived a Courier from Dresden, with Letters from the Honourable Thomas Villiers, Esq; his Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Saxony, giving an Account, that on the 25th Instant, N. S. Two Treaties of Peace were sign'd there, under his Majesty's Mediation, by the respective Plenipotentiaries, viz. One between the Empress Queen of Hungary, and the King of Prussia; and the other between his Prussian Majesty, and the King of Poland Elector of Saxony.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint, his Grace Charles Duke of Bolton, to be Lieutenant General of His Majesty's Forces.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the Ninth Year of the Reign of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intitled, An Act for establishing a General Post-Office for all her Majesty's Dominions, and for settling a Weekly Sum out of the Revenues thereof for the Service of the War, and other her Majesty's Occasions, It is (amongst other Things) enacted to the Purport and Effect following: That there shall be one General Post-Office established within the City of London, and one Master of the said General Post-Office shall from time to time be appointed by her Majesty, her Heirs and Successors, by Letters Patents under the Great Seal of Great Britain, by the Style of her Majesty's Postmaster General; which said Master, and his Deputies, and their Servants and Agents, and no other, should have the Receiving, Carrying, and Delivering of Letters and Packets, to and from all Places in Great Britain and Ireland, North America, the West-Indies, and other her Majesty's Dominions, (except as in the said Act is excepted;) And that no Person or Persons whatsoever, or Body Politick or Corporate, in any Part of the said Kingdoms, Plantations and Colonies in the West-Indies and America, other than such Postmaster-General appointed as aforesaid, and his Deputy or Deputies, or Assigns, should presume to receive, take up, order, dispatch, convey, carry, recarry, or deliver any Letter or Letters, Packet or Packets of Letters (other than as in the said Act is excepted) or make any Collection of Letters, or set up or employ any Foot-Post, Horse-Post, or Packet-Boat, or other Vessel or Boat, or other Person or Persons, Conveyance or Conveyances whatsoever, for the receiving, taking up, ordering, dispatching, conveying, carrying, recarrying, or delivering any Letter or Letters, Packet or Packets of Letters, by Sea or Land, or on any River within her Majesty's Dominions (other than as in the said Act is excepted) on Pain of forfeiting Five Pounds of British Money for every several Offence, and also the Sum of a Hundred Pounds of like Money, for every Week that any Offender shall continue to act against the Tenor of the said Statute.

And whereas, his Majesty's Postmaster General have settled and established Packet-Boats, to carry, recarry, and convey, Letters and Packets to and from England, to and from the Islands of Jamaica, Barbadoes, Antegoa, Monserrat, Nevis, and St. Christopher's, in America;
