Cornwall. **W**HEREAS the Son of a popish and abjur'd Pricander, having actually set up his Standard, audaciously carries on an horrid and unnatural Rebellion, in Conjunction with wicked, ill-designing and traitorous Persons, and supported by France, Spain and Rome, the implacable Enemies to our Religion and Country, daringly avows his Intentions to dethrone our most gracious and only lawful Sovereign King George, subvert our Religion and Liberties, and entail Slavery and Popery on us and our Posterity; We whose Names are hereunto subscribed, in Abhorrence of such detested Schemes and Attempts, do hereby voluntarily engage ourselves, in the Bond of one loyal Society, and do solemnly declare, that we will (when called upon) be ready to appear armed in the best Manner we can, under the Command of the Right Honourable Hugh Lord Viscount Falmouth (empowered by his Majesty to command and form into Troops or Companies such Persons as are willing to associate themselves) or under some other Officer or Officers commission'd by him, in order to defend his Majesty's sacred Person and Government, preserve the Peace of this our County,

our Religion, our Liberties, our Properties, and every Thing that is dear to us as Englishmen, and at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, oppose all Invaders, Rebels and Traytors whatsoever.

The above Association was signed by Six Thousand Three Hundred and Eighty-seven Persons.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Commonalty of the Corporation of Penzance, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with Hearts full of Loyalty and Fidelity to your sacred Person and Government, at a Time when a Rebellion is raised and carried on in the Northern Part of this Kingdom.

With the utmost Concern, Abhorrence and Indignation we behold this wicked and unnatural Enterprize, which, if we consider the Person for whom it is avowed, or the Persons by whom it is supported, must evidently be intended to deprive us of our Religion, Liberties and Laws, and utterly to destroy our most happy Constitution in Church and State: A Constitution founded on the natural Rights of Mankind,

Man kind, and the only just Ends of Government, rescued by our Ancestors from the oppressive Encroachments of Tyrants and Papists, maintain'd at a vast Expence of Blood and Treasure to this Nation, and enjoy'd by us in the full Vigour during the whole Course of your Majesty's mild and gracious Administration, and shall, we trust in the Divine Providence, be enjoy'd by our latest Posterity, under Princes of your illustrious House.

These are national Felicities, which the People of other Countries must envy us, and none but the most infatuated or abandon'd Wretches of our own would attempt to ravish from us.

We presume to assure your Majesty, from the Bottom of our Hearts, that with the most zealous of your Subjects, we are ready to hazard our Fortunes and our Lives in the Defence of those invaluable Blessings.

May that glorious Ardour of Loyalty and Affection for your Majesty, which now so universally animates your faithful People of all Orders and Degrees amongst us, constantly attend and adorn your Reign; and may the wicked Attempts of its Enemies ever end in the Stability of your Majesty's Government, and their own Confusion.

Florence, December 7. By Advices from Rome we hear, that the Pope has given the Pretender Fifty Thousand Crowns to carry on the Expedition in Favour of his Son in Scotland: And publick Prayers have been made in some of their Churches, and their Sacrament expos'd for his Success.

Venice, Dec. 17, N. S. We are in daily Expectation of hearing that the Spaniards have entered Milan. Don Philip, after having staid a few Days at Parma, went to Pavia, and some Detachments of his Army being advanced within a few Miles of Milan, he sent to demand the Keys of the City, and to notify that he would soon come and receive Homage for the Dutchy. The Government immediately held a Council, and sent a proper Deputation with the Keys to the Infant. The Great Chancellor, and other Officers of the Empress, after having provided in the best Manner for the Defence of the Citadel, in which there is a Garrison of 2400 Men, set out for the Mantuan. Prince Lichtenstein, with 13,000 Men, among whom were some Piemontese Battalions, was advanced to the Ticino, and had very near compleated his Bridge before the Spaniards were apprised of it: As he had a good Train of Artillery, and the Spaniards wanted Cannon, he will probably have effected the Passage.

Turin, Dec. 18. The Spaniards have for

this Week past kept hovering about the Lumelina, Vigevano, and the Borders of Tesin on both Sides that River, which has obliged the King of Sardinia to continue with the Army, and has kept Prince Lichtenstein between Vercelli and Novarre: But they seem now determined to march to Milan, where they already have some Troops; and his Sardinian Majesty is again expected at Turin in three or four Days. Marquis de Gorzegne is expected here To-night or To-morrow.

Annan, Dec. 21, Eleven at Night. The Rebels, to the Number of about 3000, came here last Night, and staid till Ten of the Clock this Forenoon, except about 4 or 500, who proceeded forward to Drumfries last Night. Amongst those who staid here were the young Pretender, the Persons styling themselves Duke of Perth, and the French Ambassador, as also Lochiel, Clanronald, Glogarrigie, and Keppoch. Lord Elcho went last Night with the 400 to Drumfries, as did the rest this Day, intending, as they gave out, to stay there till Monday next.

Another Body of the Rebels, of about 2000, marched Yesternight from the Esk to Ecclefechan, and staid there all Night. The Mac Phersons were of this Party, and Lord Ogilvy was with them.

It is thought that those of them who went to Drumfries, will march towards the Forth by Sancqhair, Douglas, &c. and those who were at Ecclefechan will march by Moffat, and join the others before they get to the Forth.

Annan, Dec. 23. The Rebels, to the Number of about 4000 (as is computed) went from hence to Drumfries on Saturday last the 21st Instant, and remained there till Seven of the Clock this Morning, at which Time they began to march, and had all left the Town before Eight. They demanded Two Thousand Pounds Contribution at Drumfries, One Thousand whereof was immediately paid, and, as a Security for the other, they have taken along with them Two Gentlemen as Prisoners. They also insisted on One Thousand Pair of Shoes, paid nothing for Quarters, and did a prodigious deal of Mischiefe every where. It is said they marched from Drumfries this Morning in great Precipitation, being alarm'd by a Report, that a Party of the Army under the Command of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland was at Annan. We hear, that the Rebels who went to Moffat, and were computed about 2000 in Number, had Orders not to march from that Place till this Day; and it is said the whole Rebel Army was to march North by

by Way of Douglas. The young Pretender, Duke of Perth, Lord Elcho, Lord Pittligo, Locheill and Keppoch, went by Drumfries; Lord Tullibardine, Lord George Murray, Lords Ogilvy and Nairn, went by Moffat.

Penrith, Dec. 23. The main Body of the Rebels was in this Town upon Wednesday the 18th Instant, when their Rear Guard, which consisted of about 1000 of their best Men, was driven out of the Village of Clifton, by about Three hundred dismounted Dragoons, twelve of whom were killed, and twenty-four wounded. As soon as the News arrived here, Orders were given by the Rebels to prepare for a March forthwith, and about Eight that Evening they set out from hence, and continued marching all Night towards Carlisle, where they arrived at Nine of the Clock the next Morning. The same Morning St. George's Dragoons came into this Town, and marched on without halting as far as Hesketh, eight Miles from Carlisle, where they continued all that Night, and on Friday the 20th. His Royal Highness the Duke halted here with the rest of the Army on Friday. At Four of the Clock on Saturday Morning our whole Army marched in three Columns towards Carlisle, his Royal Highness with the Infantry making the Center along the Post Road, and the Horse and Dragoons in two Columns, one on his Right by Armathwate, and the other on his Left by Hutton Hall. They joined on Carlton Moor, and took their Quarters in the Villages round Carlisle, which Place the Rebels left on Friday, having staid there but one Night to change the Garrison. Whilst the Highlanders were in this Town, they were guilty of great Excesses; they broke open several Houses and Shops, took away great Quantities of Goods, and threw into the Streets, and spoil'd or destroy'd what they could not carry off.

Blichall near Carlisle, Dec. 24. Only Four Pieces of Cannon, of those expected from Whitehaven, being as yet arrived, it has been necessary to defer erecting the Battery against the Walls of Carlisle, which was proposed to have been done this Morning, if the Artillery had come up in Time. In the mean while it is just now reported here, that the Garrison of the Rebels is retired into the Castle.

appointed as aforesaid, and his Deputy or Deputies, or Assigns, should presume to receive, take up, order, dispatch, convey, carry, recarry, or deliver any Letter or Letters, Packet or Packets of Letters (other than as in the said Act is excepted) or make any Collection of Letters, or set up or employ any Foot-Post, Horse Post, or Packet-Boat, or other Vessel or Boat, or other Person or Persons, Conveyance or Conveyances whatsoever, for the receiving, taking up, ordering, dispatching, conveying, carrying, recarrying, or delivering any Letter or Letters, Packet or Packets of Letters, by Sea or Land, or on any River within her Majesty's Dominions (other than as in the said Act is excepted) on Pain of forfeiting Five Pounds of British Money for every several Offence, and also the Sum of a Hundred Pounds of like Money, for every Week that any Offender shall continue to act against the Tenor of the said Statute.
