Berlin, January 4, N. S.

**T**HE Prussian Troops file off towards their former Quarters. The Regiment of Foot of the Duke of Wirtemberg enter'd here Yesterday; those of General Polentz formerly Truchses, of Sydow, and of Kleift, are expected To-day; that of Margrave Charles comes in To-morrow, and the Gendarmes after To-morrow. All those Officers, as well as common Soldiers, who desire Leave to go to their respective Homes, obtain it, but are ordered to return to their Regiments on the 1st of May, and from that Date till the Month of June they are daily to be exercised, after which a second Leave of Absence will be granted. There will be no General Review this Year, and his Prussian Majesty purposes, as it is said, to drink the Mineral Waters at Pyrmont, and then to make a Journey into Prussia. The Day before Yesterday Count Podewils and M. Fockerott returned from Dresden.

Berlin, Jan. 8. The King of Prussia, with the Duke, the Dutchess, and Princess Carolina of Wolfenbuttel, arrived in Town from Potsdam on the 6th Instant. The Trophies taken in the Engagement near Dresden, were escorted hither on the same Day by a Detachment of the King's Guards, and the Grenadiers of Kleift: The Regiments of Foot, Margrave Charles, Count Hacke, General Polentz, Count Dohna formerly Blackensee, entered likewise, in order to garrison this Town, as did also the Regiment of the Hussars of Zeithen, and a Battalion of the Cannoniers, with all the Artillery and the Pontons. The Regiments of Bredow and Roeder are gone to their former Quarters. The Peace is to be published on the 12th Instant. M. d'Arget, the Secretary of Marquis Valory the French Minister, has left his Master, and enters into his Prussian Majesty's Service with the Title of a Privy Counsellor, and a Pension of 1500 Dollars a Year.
