**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

**A**T the opening of this Session of Parliament, I did not think it proper to lay any Thing before you for your Consideration, but what immediately related to the present unnatural Rebellion, and our Security at home. The daring Attempt, which the Rebels have since made upon this Part of my Kingdom, has been happily disappointed; and, as their precipitate Flight before a small Number of my Troops, must greatly dispirit their Followers; so, that inviolable Duty and Loyalty, which have been so universally and steadily shewn by my faithful Subjects, and shall never be forgotten by me, must convince them, how vain and ill-grounded their Hopes are, of any Addition of Strength from such an Enterprize. I have not only sent a considerable Body of our national Forces into Scotland, and order'd the Hessian Troops in my Pay to be landed there; but have also made such a Disposition of the rest of my Forces, by Land, as well as by Sea, that, I hope, by the Blessing of God, this Rebellion will, in a short Time, be extinguished, and our Enemies, who have so long menaced us with an Invasion, be deterr'd by the reasonable Preparations made for our Defence.

The Election of the Emperor, which I very zealously promoted, was an Event of great Importance, not only to the Support of the House of

Austria, but to the Liberties of Europe in general. I did also, during the Course of the last Year, exert my earnest Endeavours to bring about an Accommodation between the Empress, the King of Poland, and the King of Prussia, and laid a proper Foundation for it, by the Convention made between me, and the King of Prussia. This great Work being at length perfected, under my Mediation, by the Treaty lately concluded at Dresden, the interior Tranquillity of Germany amongst the Princes of the Empire is now restor'd. My next Care has been, and shall continue to be applied to improve this Accommodation to the best Advantage, by procuring an immediate Succour to be sent to Italy, and such a Strength for the Defence and Security of the United Provinces, as may preserve that Republick, the ancient and natural Ally of this Kingdom, and one main Support of the Protestant Cause, from the Destruction with which it is threatned, as well as to attain a safe and honourable Peace. The States General have made the most pressing Instances to me to assist them in this difficult Conjunction. The imminent Dangers to which they are, at present, exposed, which do so nearly affect the Safety of Great Britain, as well as the very Being of Holland, call for our most serious Attention; for the Interests of the two Nations are so united, that whatsoever brings Ruin upon the one, must, in Consequence, be attended with the most fatal Mischiefs to the other. These Reasons have induced me to assure the States, that I will, to the utmost of my Power, according to the Circumstances of my own Dominions, cooperate with them towards opposing the further Progress of our Enemies in the Netherlands, and procuring a proper Security for the Republick against the ambitious and destructive Designs of France. In order to this necessary End, Measures are now actually concerting between me, and the States, for furnishing this Assistance on my Part, as early and effectually as possible, and for their making such an Augmentation

of

of their present Forces, as their own immediate Preservation, and the Necessity of Affairs, absolutely require.

The great Advantages, which we have received from our naval Strength, in protecting the Commerce of my Subjects, and intercepting and distressing that of our Enemies, have been happily experienced by the former, and severely felt by the latter. I am therefore determined to be particularly attentive to this important Service, and to have such a Fleet at Sea early in the Spring, as may be sufficient to defend ourselves, and effectually to annoy our Enemies.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

It is with much Regret, that I find myself obliged to ask any farther Aids of my People. I am so sensible of the Burthens they endure, that nothing could give me so sincere a Pleasure as to lighten them. But the Considerations, I have laid before you, are so necessary to our own Preservation, that I doubt not, you will grant me such a Supply, as shall be sufficient for these Purposes. The proper Estimates shall soon be laid before you, and I earnestly recommend it to you, to take the most effectual Methods to maintain the Publick Credit in this Conjunction.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

I have fully opened to you my Views and Intentions, which are so essential to the Honour of my Crown, and the true Interest and Well-being of my Kingdoms, that I depend on your vigorous Support, and the utmost Unanimity and Dispatch in your Proceedings.

The following Address of his Majesty's Loyal Independent Volunteers, has been presented to his Majesty by Thomas Dicey, Esq; and others, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl Cowper, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-chamber in Waiting: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, first incorporated by your Royal Permission, under the Character of your Majesty's Loyal Independent Volunteers, lately review'd by your Majesty's Secretary at War, humbly beg Leave to approach your sacred Person, with our unfeigned Thanks for the Honour and good Opinion your Majesty hath been graciously pleased to entertain of our Sincerity and

Attachment, in the Distribution of your Majesty's Arms, which have been committed to our Custody and Care.

And as a solemn Pledge of our Zeal and most grateful Sense of your Majesty's Goodness, we entreat, Great Sir, to lay before you our Desire and inflexible Resolutions to preserve, with your Royal Leave, your Majesty's Arms, and other Implements of War so entrusted to our Hands, in the perpetual Defence, while Breath remains, of your sacred Person and Government, and to secure the Protestant Succession to the Crown of these Kingdoms in the illustrious Line of Hanover.

And herein, most Royal Sir, we are determined every Hour we live, never to be found wanting, on all Occasions, whenever called upon, to convince the perfidious House of Bourbon, ever treacherous in all their Policies and Designs, and the insolent Invaders they presume to send among us, in order to disturb your Majesty's Peace of Mind, and the Repose of these Realms, that your Majesty hath Volunteers, ever obedient to your Royal Commands, who, in Conjunction with your other Troops, are ever ready and resolv'd to chastise their Insults, and to defeat the ungrateful and unnatural Attempts of all those who dare exert themselves as Enemies to your Royal Person and Government; and who must, in such Light, consequently appear Enemies also to our happy Constitution, and the British Nation in general.

These, most gracious Sir, are the solid, the unshaken Principles we will ardently adhere to and pursue; and to maintain which, we will ever make it a Point of Duty, and constant Study, to inculcate the same to the utmost of our Power; that Posterity, to the most distant Ages, may never swerve, nor be any ways deluded, either by the Perfidy of the French Court, or the Jesuitical Arts of Romish Priestcraft, from the like Zeal, and religious Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Offspring, and the true Protestant Cause: A Cause! in which your Majesty hath most eminently distinguished yourself, and in which also (from our very Souls, Great Sir, we really speak and believe it) your Majesty, shielded by Divine Protection, now sits adorn'd on the Throne of Great Britain, as the One Saviour, under God, of as magnanimous a Race of People, and as glorious a Nation, as the whole World can truly boast.

In a Word, Illustrious Sir, we pray the Almighty Ruler and Disposer of all great Events, by Land and Sea, in Peace and in War, ever to guide and direct the Wisdom of your Royal Councils; that they may perpetually roll on in one continued and very long Series of Prosperity to your Royal Person, and your People in general; that the baneful Troubles now unhappily subsisting both at Home and Abroad, may soon subside,

subside, and the Harmony of Peace smile and diffuse itself over the Face of the whole Land ; and that your Majesty's open and secret Enemies may, for the future, remain convinc'd of a certain Truth, That Heaven will, at all Times, sooner or later, take just Vengeance on all those who traiterously and presumptuously break in upon the Tranquillity of your Royal House ; with a View likewise to undermine and subvert the noble Fabrick of the British Constitution both in Church and State : A Constitution ! Great Sir, so extreme sacred, and invaluable dear to all true Britons, for the manifold Blessings they enjoy, of Religion, Liberty, and Commerce, peculiar to themselves ; far, very far exceeding those of any other Nation throughout the whole Globe.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**WE** your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Governor, Justices, Clergy and Gentlemen of the County of Monaghan, in your Kingdom of Ireland, with the most unfeigned Joy, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on your safe Arrival into your British Dominions.

The unwearied Endeavours of your Majesty to maintain the Balance of Power in Europe, and the Success they have been now crowned with by the Election of an Emperor, must render your Name glorious to the present and succeeding Ages. But whilst others can only at a Distance admire and esteem you as the great Asserter of Liberty, we your Majesty's Subjects must be sensibly affected with our Happiness in particular, who are ever sure of enjoying, in the greatest Perfection, under your sacred and immediate Influence, those Blessings which you so ardently seek to procure for Europe in general.

The present rash and malicious Schemes of your Enemies to disturb the Quiet of your Reign, and interrupt our Happiness, can't then but fill our Hearts (so justly attach'd to your

Royal Person) with the highest Indignation. And whether we look back on the past Deliverances we of this Nation have had from Popery and Arbitrary Power, or forward on the Blessings we may promise ourselves under your Majesty, and the Descendants of your illustrious House, we find in both sufficient Reason to detest the Authors and Instruments of the unnatural Rebellion now raised in North Britain.

With Hearts thus affected, permit us to assure your Majesty, that we are ready, upon this and every other Occasion, cheerfully to sacrifice our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of your Majesty's Person and Government, and our happy Constitution in Church and State.

*Vienna, Jan. 8, N. S.* Prince Charles is returned hither from the Army in Bohemia. A Detachment is made from his Army to supply what has been drawn from that of Marshal Traun's. The rest of the Bohemian Army is to be quartered in Bohemia, Moravia, and in Hungary.

*Copenhagen, Jan. 8, N. S.* The Mortality which rages amongst the Cattle of this Country, being likely to occasion a very great Scarcity and Dearth of Provisions, an Ordonnance, dated the 28th of December, 1745, is issued out, to prohibit the Exportation of Sheep and Lambs, Sheep or Lambs Flesh and Tallow ; as also of Hogs, Hogs Flesh (whether smoked or salted) and Lard, from the Kingdom of Denmark. There is no Ice as yet in the Sound or the Categat, so that two of the Danish India Ships sailed from hence lately, and a third was to go off last Night or this Morning.

*Copenhagen, Jan. 11.* By the last Post from Stockholm there is Advice, that a Body of Swedish Officers, engaged in the French Service, who together with their Servants amount to between four and five hundred Men, were all set out for Gottenbourg ; where it was thought a Ship would be ready to sail away with them by the first of this Month. The King of Denmark rested much better these two Nights than he had done for some Time before ; and his Cough, it is said, is almost gone : However, his Majesty keeps his Chamber, dining only with the Queen. There was no Council held Yesterday, but the Affairs of the War Office were dispatched by his Majesty, as usual.

*Berlin, Jan. 11, N. S.* His Prussian Majesty continues here. Yesterday the Regiment of the Gens d'Arms marched into this Town, so that all the Regiments, except that of Kleist, which is on its March from Upper Silesia, and that of Kalckstein, have taken up their old Quarters hereabouts. The Officers of the Regiments of Horse are selling their Horses, which the Quarter-master General Massow reviews and

and buys up, and after marking those which he thinks proper for the Artillery, sends them to the Farmers and principal Inhabitants of the Villages in this Neighbourhood, who have the Liberty to use them, on Condition of holding them in Readiness to be assembled on the first Notice.

*Willemstadt, Jan. 19.* The Thaw came on here early this Morning, and as soon as the Harbour is open, no Time will be lost in beginning and going on with the Embarkation of the Troops for England; Capt. Powlet is arrived with the Squadron design'd for their Convoy.

# SUPPLEMENT

To the *Gazette* of the 14th of *January*. 1745.

*Inverness, December 30.*

**O**UR Force at present is about 1700 Highlanders, and three Companies more of 100 each are expected. Of the Troops assembled, seven Companies are between this and Spay, the rest are at Inverness.

*Dumbarton, Jan. 8.* Lieut. Colonel John Campbell arrived here last Night, to take the Command of 700 Men who are quartered here, consisting of three Companies of Lord Loudoun's Regiment, one of Lord John Murray's, and eight of Argyleshire Militia.

*Edinburgh, Jan. 9.* This Day at Noon we had an Account, that the Rebels got into the Town of Stirling Yesterday at Four, the Inhabitants opening the Gates, as the Town was not defensible. The Militia Officers, with all the Arms, went into the Castle. Their Men by small Parcels all made their Escape. We are assured that Major General Blakeney is very well provided with Men and Provisions. The Rebels have but two Cannon of Twelve Pounders, which with great Labour they brought round by the Frew; one Eighteen Pounder, which they have been unsuccessfully trying to pass over at Allowa on Floats, is still there. Yesterday General Hawley sent up some Boats armed, and a small Vessel with Cannon, manned with 300 Men, under the Command of Colonel Leighton, to destroy all their Machines: There is as yet no Report from him.

*Edinburgh, Jan. 10.* Barrell's and Poulteney's Regiments came in here this Day, so that we have now twelve Battalions. Sempill's and Campbell's are upon the Road; and Cobham's Dragoons are to be this Day at Dunse. Dispositions are making to march the Day after

To-morrow towards the Rebels with 3 or 4000 Men, which are to take Post at Linlithgow, Barrowstoun, and Queen's Ferry, and will be able, as it is hoped, to drive away Lord Kilmarnock from Falkirk. As soon as the Train of Artillery is ready, it is proposed to march to Stirling.

*Edinburgh, Jan. 10.* By Express from Stirling there is Advice, that immediately after the Rebels enter'd the Town, they sent off three Pieces of Cannon, Four-Pounders, to the Hill of Airth, to prevent his Majesty's Ships getting further up the River, and to cover the Passage of their heavy Cannon now lying near Allowa. All Yesterday two Men of War continued firing upon them whilst they were mounting their Cannon, and beat them off from that Place, so that last Night the Rebels were obliged to remove their Cannon about a Mile further up this Side the River, and proposed to mount them this Day. Yesterday the Pretender's Son reviewed the Troops at Falkirk, which amounted to the Number of 1685 Men, and returned immediately afterwards to Stirling.

Since the above Account, we have received the following Advices, viz. That two Skiffs, that lay a-ground at Airth, had been burnt by the Vessels sent from hence, notwithstanding a Battery of Cannon which the Rebels had erected there: Some of their Men were killed and wounded before they marched off with their Cannon, which they fired frequently, but did no Damage. On Thursday they were erecting a Battery with those Cannon at Elphinstone, which our Vessels designed to attack, and to proceed if possible to Allowa. It is apprehended that they have got six Cannon there, and above 300 Men, and about 200 at Elphinstone.
