The Majefty bath been pleased to sflue his Regal Proclamation as follows.

CHARLES R. Hereas Out most Dutiful and Loyal Subjetts, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in this prefent Parliament: Attembled, have befought. Us, That we would be gracioully pleased to Ifue out Our Royal Proclamation, thereby Requiring all Papifts, or reputed Papifts, who now are, or remain within five miles of Our Cities of London and weft-

Requiring all Papifts, or reputed Papifts, who now 'are, 'or remain within five miles of Our Citics of London and weftders, nor attending any Peer of this Realm as a Menial Servant, to repair to 'their respective dwellings, or to depart Ten miles from the Cities and Burrough aforelaid, and not: to return during this Seffion of Pathament. Provided, That it may be permitted for any Papift, or reputed Papift, to return during this Seffion of Pathament. Provided, That it may be permitted for any Papift, or reputed Papift, to return during the Cities on Burrough aforelaid, who fhall firft obtain a Licence therefore under the Hands of any fix of the Lords of Our Privy Gouncil, and that We would be pleafed to give onler to the Quarter Seffions, That they give in unto Us an account of what Houtholders now are within the Ciries or Burrough aforefaid, and five miles thereof, who are of that Profeffion ; and that the Quarter Seffions do Adjourn themeleves from time to time for that purpole. Which Addrefs of theirs Wahave: ferioufly confidered, and do with much contherment and faitsfaction accept; And as We have always manifelt for a this Kingdom, and to hinder thagrowth and encreafe of the Popifh Religion, fo We are now 'teady upon this occafioat to prive at all fears and D ingers that may arite by the concourse of perfors of that Profeffion, in or near Our Cities of London or Weffmilter. Lisbonne, Dec. 10. Here are arrived four Portuguele Ships from Brazile, and fix are put into O Porto, and there are fix more yet at Sea, the Fleet having been feparated by bud weather. Last week was held an Auto da Fac, where was condemned three Jews to be burnt alive, and fix others in Efficies, which Sentence has been fince executed. The 8 infant put in here by bad weather a Spanish Vessel from the Hausna, which is faid to be an Advice-Boat; the Master being gone Post for Madrid.

Vienna, Jin 19. The third infant arrived here an Ambaffador from the Cham of Tartary, with a Frain of about no perfons; though as yes we are ignorant of the occaling this coming of the Emperor flaving refolved to vaile feveral thousand Men against Spring, the Commissions are daily giving out; and in the mean time 400000 . Crowns have been remitted hicker from Splinfor the carrying on the Levies that are to be made here for the fervice of that Crown. The Troops that were quartered on the Frontiers of Hungary are now on their march towards Bavaria, but as yet the Emperor hathnot appointed a perion to Command them in chief, though the Count de Sonches, General Cobs, and the Count of Herberstein are in nomination. It is reported that the Count de Sirowitz has undertaken to raile 3000 Croats for the fervice of his Imperial Majefty. In fome days we expect here Prince Charles of Lorrain, for whole Promotion to the Crown of Polund this Court labors with much earnefinefs, having obliged the faid Prince, in cafe he fucceed in his prerenees, to marry the Queen Dowager.

Nurenberg, Jan. 9. The fith inftant artived here Prince Charles of Lorrain, and without making any flay here, continued his journey towards *Vienna*, whethen he she more haftens, for that the election in Poland innear at hand.

Flampforty Fan. 9. The young Prince of Saxony advances with flow marches towards these parts with the Troops, defigned Auxiliaries to the Emperor, being counted about 4000 Men ; they intend to quarter for feveral weeks in the Countrey of Fulda, and afterwards to joyn the Imperial Army, according as the Emperor shall appoint; The death of the Duke of Simmeren, who dyed the 24 of the last month at Greutfnach, without iffue, is like to beget fome difference between the Elector Palatine, Heir and Coulin German to the Duke deceased, and the Elector of Menta, who pretends to the Baillage of Bockelheim, upon some agreement formerly. made with the Duke of Simmeren ; but fearing a dispute would arise concerning it, his Electoral Highness ordered some Troops to lye ready, and to foon as they heard that the Duke of simmeren was dead, to take pofferfion of it, which they accordingly did ; but the Elector Palatine alledging, that his right is more antient, and that no conceffion could be made without his confent to his prejudice, he hath caufed his Forces to beficge the faid place of Bocketh eim, and hath brought four pieces of Cannon before it, to batter it, of which we expect the iffue ; though it is faid, the Befieged are already in want of Powder.

Cologne, Jan. 16, Our Letters from Liege tell us, that the Count de Schomberg, and Monfieur de Montal having the 8 inftant joyned the Duke of Luxemburgh with 8000 Horfe, the day following the faid Duke caufed his Troops to pass the Meuse at Maestricht and is fince marched towards Charleroy, having eill their continued in the Countrey of Liege, to fruititate the Negotiation of the Baron d'Isola at Liege, which was to induce that people to put themselves under the protection of the Emperor; but the faid Baron not having been able

Wefels Fano 12. General Major Sphen is arrived here on the part of the Elector of Brandenburgh, to confer with our Governor concerning feveral matters. We are told that his faid Electoral Highnessis fending feveral Troops into the Countrey of Rutonsberg, to hinder the Imperialists from commissing any diforders there. The Duke of Newbulgcontinius to fortify Dufeldorp, and the Imperialiks Sybourg. The Mamichal d' Humieres has given Orders for thouadding two Half-Moons more to the Fortifications of Acrabera.

Bruffels, Fin. 20. The French had intended to have brought an Army of above 30000 Men together at Sharlengy, to be Commanded by the Prince of Conde, who to that end was already parted from Panis, but upon knowledge that Monsieur de Luxemburg, after having been seinforced with a Body of Horse, under the Command of Monfieur de Scombergs was arrived at Charleroy, that he intended to make fome flow hay there, and then to difperfe his Troops into their Winter Quarters, the Pringe is returned towards Paris. The Baron d' Mala hath not fuegeeded at Liege as he promifed himfelf; that Government continuing abfolutely refelved not to depart from the Neutrality.
