To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Leeward Islands, the Lieutenant General of the Leeward Islands, and the Council and Assembly of St. Christophers.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

THE last Occasion which we, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Leeward Islands, the Lieutenant General of the Leeward Islands, and the Council and Assembly of your Majesty's Island of St. Christopher, had, to approach in this Manner your Royal Presence, was to implore your Protection against the Dangers we were then threatned with, by the Arrival of a powerful Squadron of French Ships in these Seas.

In the Midst of those our Distresses, we had no Resource but to Heaven and your Majesty; and the tender and fatherly Concern your Majesty was pleased to shew for our Preservation and Safety, by sending to our Relief a sufficient Naval Force, under the Command of Admiral Townshend, now calls for all the Returns of Affection, Duty and Gratitude, which we can owe or pay to the best of Kings.

When we reflect on the Difficulties which your Majesty has undertaken, the Labours you have sustained, and the Hazards you have exposed your Royal Person to, for the general Good of all your Dominions, in rescuing our Liberties from foreign and arbitrary Attempts; and whilst we see your Majesty intent on the Welfare of your People, and employed in the glorious Task of procuring Peace and Quiet for all Christendom, what an Abhorrence must it raise in the Breast of every Well-wisher to his Country, to find your Majesty's Attention to such Pursuits diverted by a most unnatural Rebellion?

On so interesting an Occasion, we cannot suppress our Detestation of so black a Treason; Sure none but a few of the most flagitious, or the weak, (of which every Soil produces some) could have been engaged or deluded into an Attempt so desperate, as that of involving their Country in Blood and Confusion.

The present Rebellion therefore may justly be the Object of your Majesty's Contempt, but in your loyal Subjects it must excite the highest Indignation and Resentment against the Abettors of it; for it is the greatest Insult to our Understandings and common Sense, to suppose us capable of changing the Protestant Religion for Bigottry and Superstition, and our Liberties and Properties for Slavery and arbitrary Power, and to give up the best of Sovereigns for a popish Pretender.

But as Providence frequently not only disappoints the Designs of evil Men, but by its unsearchable Workings makes them subservient to the best of Purposes; so we hope and firmly believe, that this wicked Attempt, calculated by our Enemies for overthrowing the Protestant Religion, and subverting your Majesty's Government, will prove an effectual Means for strengthening both.

The Distance we are at from your Royal Person, prevents our joining your faithful Subjects of Great Britain, in a Tender of our Lives and Fortunes for your Majesty's immediate Defence;

fence; but we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we have as high a Sense of the invaluable Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's Government, as those who are shedding their Blood for the Preservation of them.

That our Posterity, to the End of Time, may boast of the like Happiness under your Royal Descendants, in the Enjoyment of their Religion, Liberties and Properties, which we now rejoice in; may the watchful Eye of Providence ever guard your sacred Person and Royal Family, and establish the Throne in the most illustrious House of Hanover.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Magistrats and Town Council of the Burgh of Paisley, in Common Council assembled.

WE the Magistrats and Town Council of Paisley, for ourselves, and in Name of our Incorporation, beg Leave, in the humblest Manner, to approach your Royal Person, with the deepest Sense of Thankfulness and Zeal, to acknowledge your Majesty's fatherly and tender Care of our Country, in sending down his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, and to congratulate the Success of your Majesty's Arms, under his Command, and upon his Appearance against the Pretender's Son, and his Rebellious Adherents.

We regret this unnatural Rebellion, begun and chiefly carried on by such as should be our Countrymen; we detest such as would exchange your Majesty's mild and lawful Government for a merciless despotick Tyranny, under a Popish Pretender.

This Corporation, tho' very small, has on all Occasions been most early and most remarkable for their firm Attachment to the happy Revolution, and the Protestant Succession in your Royal House; and it gives due Satisfaction to us, to reflect, that in our Zeal for your Majesty's happy Government we have follow'd the Example of our Ancestors.

This our Zeal and Loyal Behaviour, in marching our Battalion to Stirling, exposed us to the Fury and Resentment of the Pretender and

and his lawless Followers; who, on account thereof, impos'd on us a heavy Fine, and carried off two Hostages; for whose Redemption, we borrow'd and paid Five hundred Pounds Sterling, which is but a small Part of the Loss and Damage this Incorporation has sustained by this unnatural Rebellion.

However, we most humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that no Force, nor Art of any Kind, shall ever have the least Influence to deter or divert us from our Duty or Allegiance to our rightful lawful Sovereign, and your illustrious and august Family.

May your Majesty's invaluable Life long be preserv'd; may your Subjects be sensible of their Felicity under your mild and auspicious Government; may all the Attempts of your Foreign and Domestick Enemies be defeated and disappointed; may your Royal Progeny sway the Scepter of these Kingdoms, and, after your glorious Example, maintain the Liberties of Europe, and Constitution of Britain, to the End of Time.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to appoint, Lancelot Allgood, of Hexam, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Northumberland.

Venice, March 18, N. S. From Mantua we have an Account, that most of the Troops detached from the Rhine were arrived, and that both Cavalry and Infantry are very compleat, and in every respect in good Order, notwithstanding the terrible Fatigues they have undergone. General Brown has under his Command, including the Hussars, and the Corps late commanded by General Pallavicini, at least 18000 Men, besides the Garrisons in Cremona and Pizzighitone, &c. The Remainder of the Troops which are to come from the Rhine will join him by the 23d of this Month, but it will be some Time before the 16 Battalions that are to come from Bohemia can be here. Ten thousand Men are posted behind the Secchia. The Remainder, under the Command of General Bernclau, form a Cordon along the Po, and reach as far as Cremona. The Enemy have still large Detachments in Guastalla and Reggio. They are

sending away from Milan their Train of Artillery, consisting of One hundred and two Pieces of Cannon, and Twenty-four Mortars. The heavy Pieces go to Pavia, and some smaller Pieces towards Lodi. It was given out, they intended to attack Pizzighitone, but their Disposition seems to prove the contrary. An Account came Yesterday from Verona, that a Body of Nadasti's Hussars had passed the Po at Castel Maggiore, and attacked some advanced Posts in the Parmesan, and made some Prisoners.

Aberdeen, March 21. Nothing has happened since the 19th, except that a Detachment of Kingston's Horse had pursued a Party of the Rebels, who had ventured to advance to Keith, but they fled with such Precipitation, that there was no coming up with them.

The St. Michael, a Privateer of 18 Guns, and 160 Men, taken by Vice-Admiral Martin's Squadron, is sent into Plymouth, and brings Advice, that the Falcon Sloop, which was some Time ago taken by the French, and converted into a Privateer, is retaken; and that when they left the Vice-Admiral of the 24th Instant, he was in Chase of a French Man of War.
