

Newcastle, Jan. 14. Aptain Wetwang in the Newcastle has sent in hither a Dutch Caper of eight Gunsand fixty Men, which he lately took upon this Coaft.

Madrid, Fan. 3. The Conde de Humanes, late Am-baffador from this Court in Portugal is arrived here, the Abbe Maffarati being to refide there in quality of Envoye.

The 20 past the Count de Harach, Ordinary Ambasfador from his Imperial Mijesty, made his publick Enery here with a fplendid Train, and has fince received the vifits of all the Foreign Ministers. The Count de Pesting who has relided here almost these twelve years, with the fame quality, is disposing for his departure. The 22 being her Majesties Birth-day this Court appeared in great Gallantry, and all the Foreign Miniflers went to the Palace to perform the ufual Compliments on fo folemn an occasion. From Cadiq we have advice, that the Marquis de Melagon, Vice-King of Peru, had been feveral days embarked, but was hindred from proceeding on his voyage by foul weather; That the Dutch Privateers formerly mentioned, remained on thole coalt cruifing about the South Cape, and the Streight month with English Colours; and that befides sheles Ever los was come into that Sea with eight Men of War from the West Indies.

Rome, Fin. 6. His Holinefs appears daily more and more concerned for the affairs of Poland, and hath a gain written to the Senate of that Kingdomy to prefs them to come to a speedy Election. From Florence we have advice, that the Cardinal de Medicis, Unkle to the present Great Duke, is very ill , infomuch char his receivery is despaired of. Cologue, Fan. 23. The Imperial Troops which have their Wister Quarters in the Bidupprick of Paderborn, and the neighboring Gountreys, begin arprefent to live better, with the Inhabitants, having the of their good Offices to look after their fick, and bury their diad, of which there is no finall number; the reason of this fickness amongst them is faid to be, that they went too late into their Winter Quarters, after having been haraffed with feveral marches backward and forward, which incommoded them much. Of all the Imperial and Lorrain Troops, there remains at prefent onely on this fide the Rhyne, two thousand Horse of the Duke of Lorrains, one rhousand Horse commanded by Monfieur Rattata, and Five hundred more of another Regiment ; /befides thefe, the Marquis de Pio, commands a Body of one thousand Horic and one thousand Foot,

and the Marquis de Grana another of the fame number. From Firnna they write, that eight thousand Croats are defigned to march towards the *Rhyne*, though as yet we do not hear that they are on their way. The Bifhop of *Munfter* has appointed an Affembly of the States of his Diocels, and intends to be prefent at it, in cafe he be in any manner eafed of the Gout, which hath of late very much afflicted him ; Hitherto the Imperialifis have forborn taking any Quarters in his Countreys; though we know not what a lvantage they will receive by it.

Oftend, Jan. 25. Yefterday came into this Road two Zealand Capers with a French Prize, laden with Sugars from Libbon; the Prize they have fent for Zealand, but the Capers are victualing anew, to make another voyage before their time is out. Our Spanish Fleet is failed for Zealand, where they are to lye on the Wlachee till a fair wind, this Road norbeing thought fafe for them, From Zealand we have advice, that they are pretty forward in their preparations, and in general, the Dutch talk of a very great Fleet that they will have at Sea, and that in April next. Hague Fan. 22. The bulinels concerning the re-admitting the Province of Wirichs into the Union, ha-

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wing been long in debate, it hath been at last refolved, at the inflance 'of the Prince of Orange in their favor; however, the States of this Province will ne-ver confene to part with the Polls which they have fortified in the Tersitory of the Province of Wirespr, nor will they of Amfterdam be brought to quit the great Sluyce built by them near Hinderham; for the supplying themselves with Water, though formerly Utrecht always opposed it. The Moneys to be paid by the Inhabitants of that place to the French, are now ready, and accordiligly the Magnificates have fent to the Intendant Roberts to know in what place he expects to have the Moneys paid. In Amersfort the States have put two thouland Men into Gatrilon, one Regiment into Wyskie Duerstede, which place our Superiors re-folve to fortify: belides which, Fifteen Regiments of Horfe, and two of Dragoons are quartered at Wireshi, and in the neighborhood. The places which the French keep ftill in their Conquelts, are very full of Men ; at Nimmegen they have Six thousand, at Grave Two thousand, at Aernhem Four thousand, and not many leis at Zutphen. From Flanders we have advice, that the King of Spain has given the Bishoprick of Ghent to the Elector of Treves, in confideration of the damages he hath fultained by the French.
