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Whitehall, May 6.

Yesterday a Messenger arrived from his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, with the following Advices.

Inverness, April 30. Lieutenant Colonel Leighton, of Major General Blakeney's Regiment, is ordered to take the Command of the Castle of Stirling; and Major General Blakeney is to come hither, to take that of the Troops which will be left here.

Lord Ancram is marched To-Day, with Lord Mark Kerr's Regiment, for the Eastern Coast.

His Royal Highness the Duke has issued a Proclamation for seizing all Rebels and their Arms.

The greatest Diligence is using to get a sufficient Number of Boats upon Loch Ness, and as soon as that is done, his Royal Highness proposes to march with Fifteen Battalions, and Kingston's Horse, to Fort Augustus, in two Marches; and Lord Loudoun, with the Argyllshire Militia and the Independent Companies, will march through the Hills on the Right and Left, in Pursuit of the Rebels.

Lord Rea's People are sent back to their own Country, and Lord Sutherland's return Home To-day.

The Pretender's Son, Lord Perth, and the Person calling himself Lord John Drummond, are moving about in the Cameron's Country, with young Lochiel, who was wounded again in the last Battle, and have not above 20 or 30 Men with them.

Whitehall, May 4.

This Day an Express arrived from Edinburgh with the following Advices.

Edinburgh, April 30. By Letters from

Inverness of the 25th, his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland continued there, and the Lord President of the Session arrived that Day. The Number of Prisoners increases at Inverness. The Prisons at Aberdeen, Montrose and Stirling are filled, and Prisoners are continually brought into Perth, Dumferling, Dundee, Irwine and Dumfries. By Express from Dumbarton we have an Account, that the Marquis of Tullibardine, and an Italian who calls himself Mitchell, and says he has been thirty Years in the Service of the Pretender, having surrendered themselves to Mr. Buchannan of Drumakill, a Justice of the Peace, were by him committed to the Castle of Dumbarton. Detachments of the Edinburgh Regiment were sent some Days ago along the South Side of the Firth, in order to intercept Rebels; and Yesterday at the Queen's Ferry they seized one Robert Murray, a Writer in Edinburgh, a Life-Guard Man in the late Rebel Army, and sent him hither. Last Night one James Hay, a Scotch Man, who calls himself a Captain and Pay-master of Lord John Drummond's Regiment, surrendered himself to the Lord Justice Clerk, and was by his Lordship committed to our Castle. This Man says, that the French, viz. Drummond's Regiment, the Irish Picquets, and Fitz James's Horse, at the Time of the late Battle, amounted to between 6 and 700 Men; that of the First 50 were killed in the Battle, and of the Second about 100. He farther says, that he parted from the Person called Lord John Drummond at Ruthven, who took the Money belonging to the Regiment from him, and divided it amongst his Officers, desiring every one to shift for himself, as he intended to do; that the Rebels had not received any Pay for some Weeks before

the Battle; that their Magazine of Provisions being very low, they were forced to try a Battle; that the Night before they were extremely harrassed by marching and countermarching, and before they could get any Refreshment, they were surpris'd by the Duke's quick March. General Campbell is march'd towards Locharbar, in order to clear that Country of the Rebels, who are at present disperst all over it, and are beginning to rob and plunder. On Wednesday last Glengyle, with about 120 Men well armed, in their Retreat from Sutherland, pass'd the Tay near Finlayrig on their Way home to Balwulder. We have Advices here, that Lord Pitligo, with many of the Foot that followed him, are lurking about the Coast of Buchan, in hopes of finding an Opportunity to make their Escape to France.

The following Address of the Sheriff, Nobility and Gentry of the County of Perth, has been presented to his Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord John Murray, their Representative in Parliament, being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl Waldegrave, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address his Majesty was pleas'd to receive very graciously.

Unto the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Sheriff, Nobility and Gentry of the County of Perth, met in a Head Court of the Shire the 15th of April 1746.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, the Sheriff, Nobility, and Gentry of the County of Perth, upon our first Meeting since the Commencement of this Rebellion, joyfully embrace this Opportunity of testifying our unfeign'd Zeal for your Majesty, and our Gratitude for your fatherly Care, in speedily delivering this Country from the Tyranny of a Popish Invader, and relieving us from the Oppression of a lawless Rabble, by sending his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland at the Head of an Army; to whose wife Conduct and Prudence we, under God, owe the Blessings we now enjoy.

We heartily lament and detest this unnatural Rebellion, chiefly begun and carried on by our Countrymen, endeavouring to subvert your Majesty's mild and lawful Government, under which we have always had the full Enjoyment of our Religion, Liberties and Laws. Permit us, Great Sir, to assure your Majesty, that our Lives and Fortunes shall now and ever be most cheerfully employ'd in Supporting your Majesty and Royal Family.

Our steady Adherence for the Protestant Succession, and the open Demonstration of our Zeal for your Majesty's Service, did indeed draw upon us the Resentment and Fury of the Rebels, by exacting exorbitant Fines, and other op-

pressive Acts: But nothing we can suffer shall ever be able to shake us from our Duty and Allegiance.

May your Majesty's invaluable Life long be preserved: May your Majesty's Arms, and your Endeavours to restore the Peace and Liberty of Europe, be crowned with Success; and may your Majesty's Royal Progeny sway the Scepter of these Kingdoms to the latest Posterity.

Constantinople, March 29. 'Tis now assur'd that Achmet Bashaw of Bagdat, has had the Dignity of Seraskier conferr'd on him for the Parts where he commands. The Persian Minister has been some Time departed hence. Some Days ago the Mufti was changed, which is said to be chiefly owing to the irregular and dissolute Life of him and his two Sons.

Stockholm, April 18. Yesterday, being the King of Sweden's Birth-Day, when he enter'd into the Seventy-First Year of his Age, the Prince and Princess Royal gave a Ball, and a great Entertainment on that Occasion. Count Gyllenborg, the President of the Chancery, continues still in a very bad way, and past hopes of Recovery.

Venice, April 27, N. S. There is Advice that M. de Castellar has deceiv'd the Vigilance of the Austrians, having march'd out of Parma unobserv'd with his whole Garrison, and retreated towards the Mountains, which is said to have been effected in the following Manner: On the 18th M. de Gages made several Motions upon the Taro, which oblig'd the Austrians to recall several Corps from the Blockade of Parma, it being necessary to make two Fronts with their Army. On the 19th M. de Castellar order'd a Thousand armed Peasants to make a Sally out of the Guastalla Gate, to draw the Attention of the Austrians to that Side, and weaken the Posts where he design'd to attempt his Passage; accordingly the same Night, about Ten o'Clock, he march'd out of the Porte de Secours with his whole Garrison, consisting of 4000 regular Foot, 3000 Peasants, and 2000 Horse, Part of which he order'd to march towards Monte Chiarugolo, and Part between the River Trema and the Hills on the Right of Parma; in his Way he surpris'd and defeated some Picquets, and advanced Posts of the Austrians, who were easily put to flight by the superior Numbers that attack'd them. Between Eleven and Twelve the same Night, M. Pallavicini, who had the Command of the Blockade, was inform'd of it, and having acquainted Prince Lichtenstein and General Brown, it was immediately resolv'd to detach 8000 Men with General Nadafti in Pursuit of them, who began his March early the next Morning, the 20th Instant.

Instant: It is supposed that M. de Castellar directed his March towards Borgo di Taro. On the 20th about Noon, a firing was heard among the Hills, from whence it was imagin'd that General Nadasti had come up with some Party, that M. de Castellar had left behind to cover his Retreat. The same Day the Austrians enter'd Parma, where they found some Provisions, and all the Cannon nail'd. On the 22d: they rais'd two Batteries against the Castle, one of two Mortars, and another of four Haubitizers, the heavy Artillery not being yet come.

Vienna, April 30. Prince Lobcowitz's Baggage is set out for the Empire, and it is thought he will follow in a few Days. Our Accounts from Italy affirm, that upwards of 1200 Men have been found and made Prisoners in the Town and Cittadel of Parma, and that the Artillery is more considerable than was believed at first. It is likewise said, that M. de Castellar's Corps was still wandering in the Mountains in the Snow, and in the utmost Want, without having been able to reach any beaten, known, or certain Route.

Copenhagen, May 3. After having settled and directed the Method of treating the King of Denmark's Indisposition, M. Werlhof left this Place Yesterday on his Return to Hanover; and this Afternoon his Danish Majesty is removing to Herschholm, accompanied by the Queen, the Margrave and Margravine, his ordinary Physician, and necessary Servants. Her Royal Highness the Princess Louisa is esteem'd to be out of all Danger, and upon the mending Hand.

Leipsick, May 5, N. S. The Trade of this Place flourishes as usual; the Swiss, the Town of Francfort on the Mayne, and other Commercial States interested in the Support of the Credit of this Country, having offer'd considerable Loans for its Relief. On the first Instant their Polish Majesties, and their Royal Highnesses the Electoral Prince, and Prince Xavier, arrived here, and will honour this City with their Residence during the Fair, which is likely to be a very good one. Some Days after the Return of the Court to Dresden, his Polish Majesty intends to set out for Fraustadt, on the Frontiers of Poland, in order to sign the Universal, for assembling the General Dyet, which is to be held at Warsaw in October next.

Rosendale Camp, April 27, O. S. Marshal Bathian having detached two Battalions to reinforce the Garrison of Namur, and sent a strong Detachment of Hussars to attend them thither; and then return, removed his Quarters to the Convent of Rosendale, near Wallem Bridge, and the Army incamped that Day, the Right near the Causey that goes from Mechlin to Antwerp, and about a Mile from the former; the Center is near Boenheyde, and the Left Wing near Schriek, towards Drameureck. Our Pan-

dours and some Hussars, commanded by General Baronay, were left in Louvain, and were Yesterday in Possession of it. Our Flying Camp is upon the Rupeel, near Boom, and the nine British Squadrons are in their Cantonment. The French are said to be incamped, their Right near the Mill of Terveuren, and their Left upon the Plains of Dighem, towards the Canal of Vilyorden. By our latest Advices, the Enemy sent 18 Companies of Grenadiers to Louvain, but our Pandours and Hussars repelled them with some Loss, and without losing one Man on our Side. However, General Baronay has quitted the Town, lest he should be overpowered, or cut off from us, and is at present between Louvain and Aerschot. There is a Body of the Enemy, at Great Willebroeck.

Brussels, May 9, N. S. On Tuesday last the French Army began to encamp in the Plain of Fernault. Our whole Garrison marched thither this Day. Four score Battalions are already advanced beyond Cortenberg. On Wednesday last the French King arrived here. One hundred and twenty Pieces of Cannon of different Bores, Eighty Pontons, and a great Quantity of Powder and warlike Stores, passed thro' this City lately in their Way to the Army. On Friday Night last M. Lowendahl set out from hence with a Corps of 5000 Men. It is given out, that his Intention was to surprize Louvain, and that there has been a Skirmish near that Town between the French and the Austrians, to the Advantage of the latter. The French King left this City this Morning, and went out at the Louvain Gate. Late this Evening all the Troops that were incamped, received Orders to march without carrying any Baggage with them.

Hague, May 10. By Prince Waldeck's Letters of Yesterday, the Allied Army was all ranged behind the Dyle, with its Left extending to Nynde, and its Right to beyond Mechlin. The Hussars and Irregulars kept moving up and down between Aerschot and Louvain; near which latter Place a smart Skirmish had just happened between a Party of them and a Detachment of the French Hussars, to the Disadvantage of the latter, who are said to have left 60 Men behind them on the Spot. Marshal Bathian has taken up his Head Quarters at the Abby of Rosendale. The French are likewise formed, and reach from the Castle of Terveure to Vilyorden; and when the Letters came away, they were said to be beginning to make some Motion. Prince Eichtenstein's Letters of the 27th past, represent M. Castellar's Corps, though considerably weakened by Loss, Want, and Desertion, as still obstinately pushing its Retreat towards Tuscany; and M. Nadasti as obstinately pursuing it. The Prince adds, he was then laying Bridges over the Taro, to pass and present Battle to M. Gages. The Trenches before Valentia were opened in the Night of the 19th.
