

Castle is a free Possession, and that the said Convention made with the Duke of *Simmeren* the 11 Septem-  
ber, 1663; to the prejudice of the ancient Right of his  
House, had presently after it was made been declared null,  
the Dukes of *Newburgh* and *Duxonsis*, together  
with the chief of the Family, having then and since pro-  
tested against it. That the said Baillage was above 200  
years since gained by Arms, and hath ever since without  
interruption continued in the Electoral House, as its  
proper Right, without the least contradiction on the  
part of the Elector of *Meyence*; That at present all  
the Estates of the Duke of *Simmeren* devolve to him  
(no part of which could be made away by any agreement  
whatever) this Baillage is likewise his undoubted  
Right. However, if the said Elector of *Meyence* can  
pretend any thing farther, he will answer him in the  
Imperial Court at *Spire*. The young Prince of *Saxony*  
is advanced with 6500 Men as far as *Dach*, but in  
the mean time his friends are in pain, that he will not  
be able to find Quarters for them, without very much  
prejudicing his own Party.

*Liège*, Jan. 23. The Baron d' *Ijolte*, though he hath  
received a final answer from this Chapter, that they  
cannot consent to the violating the Neutrality, which  
they have professed, during this present War, yet con-  
tinues still here, in expectation of a Convoy for his  
late return to *Galgenc*. To which end, it was said some  
days since, that Monsieur *Sauvage* was coming this way  
with 2000 Horse, but we now hear nothing further of it.  
The Inhabitants of the Bishoprick of *Paderborne*,  
and other Countreys, where the Imperialists are quar-  
tered, complain very much of the ill Treatment they  
receive from the Soldiers.

*Paris*, Jan. 26. The Duke de *Chaulnes* is returned  
hither from *Vire*, after having happily concluded the  
Session of the States of *Brittany*, which were assembled  
there, they having granted the King eight Millions of  
Liures to enable him to maintain the War this ensuing  
year; it is said, that the said Duke will very suddenly  
part hence again for *Cologne*, and that he will carry  
with him Instructions, which may facilitate a Peace.  
The King has given the Command of Colonel General  
of the Swiss, in his service, to the Duke of *Meyence*.

On Sunday last the Duke of *Luxembourg* attended at  
Court, and was very kindly received by the King. At  
*Charleroy* we hear, the Count de *Monterey* is bringing  
together a Body of 7 or 8000 Men, designed to Con-  
voy Provisions, and other necessaries to *Maffra*.  
From the Frontiers of the Duchy of *Burgundy* we have  
advice, That the Companies of the Regiment of Guards  
and other Troops which are in that Country, were on  
their march towards the *Franche Comté*, by order of  
the Duke of *Navailles*, who Commands the Kings For-  
ces in that Duchy; and that it was generally thought,  
that the design was to besiege a place called *Gray*; but  
since we hear that the Spaniards upon notice hereof,  
have put a Garrison of 2000 Men into the place, which  
may render this enterprize very difficult, especially con-  
sidering the season; The Forces which the Duke of  
*Navailles* is said to have with him, are 18 Com-  
panies of Guards, 30 Companies of Foot more, besides  
the Regiment of *Lyon*, and 8 Regiments of Horse.  
Great preparations are making here against Spring, and  
we are told of a Fond of 80 Millions of Liures which  
will be provided for defraying the Charges of the  
War. The King has conferred on Monsieur *Schomberg*  
the Honor and Title of Duke of *France*.

*Brussels*, Jan. 26. The Count de *Monterey* has gi-  
ven leave to agree with the French for Contributions,  
so that we shall be now forced to pay them within half a

League of this City. Our Letters from *Liège* confirm  
what we told you in our last, concerning that Govern-  
ment having refused to accept the Propositions made  
to them on the part of the Emperor, by the Baron  
d' *Ijolte*, and that they had declared, that they would  
not part from the Neutrality, which we are much dis-  
satisfied at, because the French, as they have hitherto,  
so still continue, to draw the greatest advantage from  
thence.

*Huy*, Jan. 27. The States General upon infor-  
mation that the most Christian King had given permis-  
sion to all Vessels to come freely and Trade in any of  
his Ports, on certain condition, that his said Majestey  
had thereby already prohibited above 5000 Florins, and  
that several Ships belonging as well to the *Spanish Neth-  
erlands*, as their Countries, were on their Voyage to  
lade Salt, and other Commodities in *France*; the said  
States have taken the same into consideration, and have  
thought fit to direct the several Colleges of the Ad-  
miralty, that they consider speedily hereof, and report  
to them, the best means to prevent the prejudice which  
this State, and the advantage which the French may re-  
ceive by this Liberty. At the instance of the Province  
of *Zealand*, the States have exaltned the Placard late-  
ly published for the Commanding all Privateers to re-  
turn home before the middle of March next, vif. That  
thuse Capers which have passed the Lines, shall not be  
subject thereto. The Count de *Horn* is gone from  
*Utrecht* with 2000 Men, to make some attempt upon  
the Enemy. What was said in our last concerning a  
quarrel between the *Rhine*, *ave* and the *Sieur Faro*,  
and of their being gone into *Brabant* to fight in *Duel*,  
proves to have been a great mistake. The Prince of  
*Orange* will make a Step to *Utrecht* to settle things  
there, but has not as yet appointed the time.

*Dittrich*, The States being lately in debate con-  
cerning the terms, on which they would be willing  
to conclude a Peace with the Crown of *England* agreed,  
That they would yield to His Majesty the point of the  
Navigation of the British Seas. That they would give His  
Majestey satisfaction in the business of *Sardinia*, and the  
regulation of Trade in the *Tidars*, besides 80000  
Crown towards the Charges of the War, and the  
restoration of the *New Netherland*; But as for the  
point concerning the Fishing, they seem as yet resolved  
not to consent to it: of this Purport they have written  
a Letter to His Majestey, and we hope it will have a  
good effect.

*Whitehal*, Jan. 24. This morning His Majestey being  
come into the House of Lords, and being Seated in His  
Chair of State, clothed in His Royal Robes, and at-  
tended with the usual Solemnity, was pleased to send  
for the House of Commons, and they being come up,  
Communicated to both Houses a Letter, together with  
Propositions for Peace, which he had received from  
the States General of the *United Provinces*, by the  
hands of the Spanish Ambassador.
