And his Majesty doth therefore strictly require; charge and command all and fingular Apothecaries and others, whole Bulinels it is to compound Medicines, or diffil Oyls or Waters, 'of make other Extracts within any Part of his Majesty's Kingdom of Great Britain called England, Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick upon Tweed, that they, and every of them, immediately after the faid Pharmacopæia Gollegii Regalis Medicorum Londinenfis shall be printed and published, do not compound or make any Medicine or Medicinable Receipt or Prescription, or distil any Oyl or Waters, or make other Extracts that are or shall be in the said Pharmacopæia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londingn/is mentioned or named, in any other Manner or Form than is or fhall be directed, prefcribed, and fet down by the faid Book, and according to the Weights and Measures that are or shall be therein limited, except it shall be by the special Direction or Prescription of some learned Physician in that Behalf. And his Majefty doth hereby declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur his Majesty's just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for fuch their Contempt and Offences, according to the utmost Severity of Law. Board, the humble Memorial of Dr. Henry Plumptre, Prefident of the College of Commonalty of the Faculty of Physick in London, fetting forth, that the faid Prefident and College have, with great Care, Pains and Industry, revifed, corrected and reformed a Book by them formerly published, intituled, Pharmacopæia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londinenfis, prescribing and directing the Manner of preparing all Sorts of Medicines therein contained, together with the true. The Memorialist therefore most humbly prays, that his Majesty will be graciously pleased. to inforce the Observance thereof in such a Manner as to his Majesty shall seem meet : --- His Majesty this Day took the faid Memorial into his Royal Confideration, and being defirous to provide in all Cafes for the common Good of his Péople, and being perfuaded that the Estab-Filting the general Use of the faid Book may tend to the Prevention of fuch Deceits in the making and compounding Medicines, wherein the Lives and Health of his Majesty's Subjects are fo highly concerned, hath therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of his Privy-Council, Hereby to notify to all Apothecaries and others concerned, to the Intent they may not pretend Ignorance thereof, that the faid Book, called Pharmacopæia Collegii Regalis Medicorum Londinensis, is perfected and ready to be published:
