A PROCLAMATION.

John Armagh, Newport, C. HEREAS his Majefty bath fignified unto us his Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the First Day of July next, be further prorogued to Tuesday the Third Day of March following; We do therefore publish and declare, that the faid Parliament be, and accordingly the faid Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Tuesday the Third Day of March next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this prefent Parliament are to take Notice accordingly. Given at his Majesty's Castle of Dublin, the isth Day of June, 1746. By their Excellencies Command,

By the Lords Juffices General and General [Perfon and Government, and fecured to them] the Continuance of the Happiness they enjoy under your Majesty's mild and equal Government, has been, under God, and your Majesty, owing to the Valour and Conduct of that illustrious Hero.

> Your Majesty will therefore permit us to exprefs our most fincere and lively Sense of that universal Joy, which every loyal Subject to your Majesty, and Friend to Religion and Liberty, must feel, upon exchanging the Apprehenfions of being exposed to tyrannical and arbitrary Power, for the Prospect of enjoying, in their utmost Extent, all the innumerable Benefits of our most excellent Constitution The inviolable Regard your Majesty has, for the Time past, shewn to the religious and civil Rights of your People, gives the strongest Asiurance of your continuing the fame gracious Protection to them, for the future. In Confidence of which, we beg Leave to teltify our most ardent Desires; that your Majesty's Reign may be long and prosperous. Given under our common Seal, at the Guildhall of the faid City, the Eleventh Day of June, in the Twentieth Year of your Majesty's Reign.
