

# The London Gazette.

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Rome, Jan. 13.

**T**he Pope having on Christmas Eve Consecrated a Sword and Helmet, sends, as is said, to send the same as a great Present to the Marschal *Sobieski* of Poland; though others suppose, it will be kept for the new King. The Pope continues very strong and vigorous to the great joy of this Court.

Strasbourg, Jan. 14.

Their Majesties are gone to pass some time at *Leipsack*, two Leagues from hence, and from thence intend to pass to *Upsal*, where is the most famous University of this Kingdom, and will not be back here till the middle of the next month; In the mean time the Senators are all gone to their Countrey Houses, so that there is at present a vacancy of all publick business. The Sieur *Bonde* is nominated to go Envoy to his most Christian Majesty, and the Sieur *Wangelin* is arrived from Berlin with the late defensive Treaty concluded with the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, the Ratifications of which are to be exchanged within two months after the date of it.

Venice, Jan. 19.

By a Vessel from *Palato* we have advice, That the Grand Signior being very much concerned for the late disgrace of his Arms, has resolved to redeem it by a vigorous prosecution of the War against the Crown of *Poland* this approaching Summer, and in order therunto has sent directions to the several Governours of Provinces, to raise what Men they can, and to provide proportionable stores of all kind of Provisions for them; But the affairs of that Empire seem at present very much perplexed, as home are many dissatisfactions against the Government, and the People greatly oppressed by heavy Taxations, and more by means of the Plague, which in a most deplorable manner has raged amongst them all this last year. From *Naples* we have advice that the Viceroy of that Kingdom raises several Troops there, which about the middle of *February* will be embarked in order to their passage to *Catalonia*, to form a Body of an Army, with which the Spaniards intend to act against the French. We have of late had very bad weather.

Vienna, Jan. 20.

Several Councils of War have been of late held here, concerning the preparations to be made against the next Campaign, when the Emperor resolves to have a very considerable Army in the Field; In the mean time the Moneys come from *Spain* and *Holland* are distributed for the advancing the Levies; and the Troops which were quartered in the Hereditary Countreys, are ordered to march towards *Bohemia*, and the Frontiers of *Bavaria*, with intention to oblige that Elector to give a Categorical answer to what has been proposed to him on the part of the Emperor, which his Electoral Highness has hitherto refused to do; declaring however at the same time, that he would maintain a Neutrality, but that it seems will not satisfy this Court. We are told that the Crown of *Spain* has offered to pay the Emperor 10000 Crowns per month, for these three months to come, and afterwards 50000 Crowns every month; and that the States General offer the like sum, the better to enable the Empe-

ror to prosecute the War. The Turkish Chians, who is on his way hither, comes, as is said, to renew the present Treaties between the two Empires for ten years longer; provided, the Emperor will not assist the Poles in the present War. For the better settlement of the affairs of *Hungary*, the Emperor has permitted the Protestants the free exercise of their Religion.

Frankfort, Jan. 22.

The difference between the Elector Palatine and the Elector of *Mayence*, concerning the *Battlage* and Castle of *Boeckelheim*, has hitherto been managed by the Pen only; either Party having by large Manifests endeavored to make appear their Right and Propriety, without shewing the least inclination to come to Arms, especially in the present Conjunction; and some add, that both Parties have referred the business to the determination of the Emperor. The Troops of *Saxony* begin to come very near us, and we were in pain least they should come to lodge in the Territories of this Republick; but they have taken their way towards the *Lower Rhiffe*, but that Countrey being in a very good posture, to excuse giving them Quarters, it is thought they will be forced to march on towards *Westphalia* to seek Quarters; our advices tell us, that these are extraordinary good Troops, but used to good Quarters, the want of which will very much incommode them.

Strasbourg, Jan. 22.

The Elector of *Mayence* and the Elector Palatine having referred to the Emperor, the decision of the difference between them concerning some part of the Estate of the late Duke of *Simmern*, has frustrated the hope of those who desired to see these two Places engaged in Arms, and new troubles in the Empire. In *Alsatia* the French are raising two Regiments of Horse, and we are told that the Levies advance apace. The Imperial Minister at the Court of *Bavaria* presses his Electoral Highness with great earnestness, to declare himself concerning the part he intends to take in the present Conjunction; till when the Imperial Troops will continue on the Frontiers of *Bavaria*, not without giving great jealousy to the Elector. It is confidently said that the Emperor will come in person to *Egra* and reside there for some short time in the Spring, to hasten the preparations for the Campaign; The Marquis *de Vaurban* is on his march in *Alsatia*, to hinder the passage, as is said, of some Imperial Troops who are designed for the *Franche Comte*. We have advice, that the Emperor is sending 2000 Men to reinforce the Garrisons of *Sickingen*, *Lausfenburg*, *Rhinfelder*, and *Waldsbul*, on the River *Rhine*.

Cologne, Jan. 30.

From *Liege* they write, that the Baron *d'Issala* is still there, though without being able to effect any thing; That in revenge thereof the Spaniards have prohibited all communication between *Liege* and *Namur* by waters; That the Chapter of *Liege* have desired the French to quit *Museyk* and *Tongres*, but had not as yet received any answer. Here is a report that the Sickness is amongst the Imperialists at *Bon*; and that for that reason the Marquis *de Grana* is come hither. Three days since arrived here the Landgrave.

grave of Hesse his two Sons *William* and *Charles*, with the Dutchesss their Wives being here before.

*Brussels, Feb. 2.* The season for action being past, our Governor with the rest of the Nobility and Persons of quality entertain themselves with Balls, Masquerades, and other Divertisements; though in the meantime no diligence is omitted, which may advance our preparations for the next Campaign. The Chapter of *Liege* have refused to accept of the offer made them on the part of the Emperor: our Governor has ordered that whole Countrey to be set under Contribution, and our Troops have already in great measure put those Orders in execution. We talk much of 4000 Spaniards, who are said to be on their way, as likewise 1500 Italians to recruit the Regiments of that Nation now in the service of this Countrey. Our new Levies are in all to make up 12000 Men, and according to calculation, we shall have in the Field 20000 Men, besides Auxiliaries: His Excellency had given directions for the raising the pay of the Soldiers, but at present apprehending it may have ill consequences, has contradicted them, and the pay is to be as formerly. The Duke de *Navailles*, Governor of the Duchy of *Burgundy* for the French, having brought a good Body of Men together, had marched with them with a resolution to attempt something in the *Franche Comte*, but was hindered by the badness of the weather, and other difficulties.

*Antwerp, Feb. 2.* Our Letters from *Holland* give us great hopes of a Peace, and at the same time we receive Letters from *Coëgne* which tell us, That the Ambassadors there are entered upon a new Negotiation. All this Countrey is set under Contribution by the French, almost to the Walls of this City. All the discourse here is, concerning the great preparations that are making against *Spain*.

*Aerthem, Jan. 24.* The Marschal de *Huybrege* continues his residence at *Nimwegen*, taking particular care to fortify that place, which before very strong, will by these new Works, that are now making, receive a great addition of strength. We are likewise here raising two new Half Moons, which will be quickly finished; and in all places great Provision is making of all things necessary for their defence.

*Hague, Feb. 2.* We are here in a general expectation of Letters from *England*, which among other things may give us an account of the success of the late Letter written by the States to his Majesty; we talk here very much of Peace, and we believe, because of the great likelihood there seems to be at present of it, that the Prince of *Orange* has hitherto deferred to give out his Commissions for the several Commanders of the Fleet; however, the Equipage in the meantime advances with all diligence, that so we may be able to make Peace with the sword in our hands, or else be in a better posture to pursue the War. To morrow the States of *Holland* will be again assembled, when it is expected they may come to some resolution upon the Propositions of the Deputies of *Haclem*, concerning the making the place of Stadtholder Hereditary to the Prince of *Orange* and his Heirs: The States have resolved that the resolution for the readmitting the Province of *Utrecht* into the Union, shall be applicable to the other two Provinces now possessed by the Enemy, when they shall be quitted by them; but the States of this Province as to the affair of *Utrecht*, continue resolved to retain the Sovereignty over such Forts which they have built during this War in the Province of *Utrecht*, as likewise to have free access to the Dikes and Sluces of that Province, and to drown the Countrey, when they shall see occasion, though in the Territory of the Province of

*Utrecht*, for the preservation of *Holland*; and that all disputes concerning the said Dikes shall be determined by the Court of *Holland*. It is said, that the Rhynegrave will be made General of the Infantry, and the Count of *Scherpenberg* Lieutenant General, though not without giving dissatisfaction to the Sieur *Fario*, late Governor of *Machricht*, who it is said, has declared to the Prince of *Orange*, that in case the Rhynegrave be preferred before him, he shall be obliged to quit the service of this State. The Tax Imposition of Shoes, &c. and on persons that drink in Taverns, does not answer expectation; so that we expect another new Tax.

*Paris, Jan. 30.* From *Liege* we have advice, That that Government demands the restitution of *Mastick*, and the other places possessed by our Troops, in that Bishoprick, to be recompensed for the great damages they have sustained by our Troops; and that his Majesty will Ratify the Treaty concluded between them, and the Duke of *Luxembourg*, now lately, on the terms they engage to observe punctually the Neutrality, and not to listen to any Propositions which may be made them to the prejudice of it. The Troops which composed the Duke of *Luxembourg*'s Army, are put into Winter Quarters all along the Frontiers of *Picardy*, to hinder the incursions of the Spaniards.

*Paris, Feb. 2.* In our last we told you, that we had advice that the Duke de *Navailles*, who Commands his Majesties Forces in the Duchy of *Burgundy*, was on his march with a Body of about 13000 Men, to make some attempt upon the Spaniards in the *Franche Comte*; but we are since informed, that his Majesty has sent Orders to the said Duke to defer this expedition, till the weather be more favorable than as present it is; the Rivers being every where in those parts so overflowed, that the Soldiers cannot march without very great difficulty. From *Sedan* our Letters of the 24 past tell us, That the Marquis de *Rasnel*, who Commands the Cavalry of the Elector of *Cologne*, was past through the Duchy of *Bouillon*, to go and joyn the Duke of *Navailles* in *Burgundy*. We have likewise advice that the Count of *Starembergh* was on his march with several Imperial Troops towards the *Franche Comte* to assist the Spaniards there; and that Colonel *Maffelle* was likewise advanced with a party of Spanish Cavalry on the side of *Altaisa*, to favor the passage of *Starembergh*, the said Marquis de *Haubrun* had likewise marched with the Forces he commands in that Countrey along the Rhine towards *Balle*, and had possessed himself of the passages, so that the Imperialists could not proceed.

*Hull, January 25.* The *Mudwich* Sloops brought in a small Dutch Cabin of three Guns, and thirty five Men.
