

every one sought to distinguish himself wherever the Occasion presented itself.

The Artillery deserves also its Praise, and Equity especially demands it here for the great Loss occasioned to the Enemy thereby; which good Effect is wholly to be attributed to the Commanders, Lieutenant Colonel Schrems and Captain Telscher, who both continually encouraged their Men, and caused an incessant Fire to be made, by which they, as well as the others, have acquired a well deserved Reputation.

The Loss of the Enemy, according to their own Confession, amounts to between 14 and 15000 Men, every thing included; the Number of the found Prisoners, French and Spanish, exclusive of the Officers, amounts to 2494, and wounded to 2040, in all 4534. Officers Prisoners 271, amongst which are 177 French, and 94 Spanish; and besides the abovesaid, Lieutenant General Don Joseph d'Aramburo, a Marshal de Camp M. de Wurtz, and many Officers of the Etat Major. We have also taken 29 Pair of Colours, one Standard, and 10 Pieces of Cannon. On our Side the Loss in German Infantry and Cavalry, Waradiners and Slavonians in killed, wounded, and lost, or Prisoners, according to the Tabelles, amounts in all to 3375 Men, and 783 Horses.

*Vienna, July 6, N. S.* By our last Advices from Italy, the Enemy had thrown two Bridges over the Po, one on each Side of their Bridge at Placentia, and had not only passed over the uppermost a considerable Detachment, compos'd chiefly of the French, to be posted at Beljoioso, but were in such other Motions, as made it to be believed, that they intended to pass into the Milanese; but whether with a Design to remain there for Subsistence, keeping at the same Time a sufficient Head in Placentia, or, after leaving a certain Garrison there, to retreat over the Adida into the Venetian State, and from thence into the Ecclesiastical State, is unknown here.

*Hague, July 12, N. S.* The four British Regiments were to march as To-day from Willemstadt, and Expedients have been found out for sending them 300 Horses from the Army, for the Use of their Artillery, till their own Undertakers can furnish others. Marshal Saxe is reported to have made a Motion towards Lier, and to have repass'd the Neete. Several French Reinforcements arrive daily from the Upper Meuse, and the three Bishopricks. By our freshest Advices from Italy, the Junction between the Piedmontese and Austrians was not quite effected; and the Enemy maintained himself upon the Po, under Cover of the Artillery of Placentia.

*Hague, July 15, N. S.* The Allied Army had made no Motion Yesterday. Marshal Saxe having left eight Battalions in the Town and

Cittadel of Antwerp, and in the Forts upon the Scheld, is said to have repass'd the Dyle, and to have been met on that Side by several considerable Reinforcements. The Town of Mons surrendered on the 11th Instant, the Garrison Prisoners of War: Count Nava, the Prince of Hesse Philipsthal, and Major General Lindtman, are left at Liberty. The Fort of St. Ghilain it is said is not comprehended in the Capitulation, and has obliged the French to attack it in Forti. The freshest Advices from the Side of Lombardy are of the 1st Instant, N. S. when the Junction between the Austrians and Piedmontese was so far effectuated, that his Sardinian Majesty had taken upon him, the supreme Command of both Armies. The Allies had found Means to transport themselves to the Milanese Side of the Po without any Loss, after having provided, as well as its Situation would admit of, for the Defence of Placentia.

*Camp of Terhyde, July 12, N. S.* This Morning the four British Battalions came into Camp in very good Order.

*Camp of Terhyde, July 15, N. S.* Mons surrendered the 11th Instant, the Garrison Prisoners of War. The Enemy talk now of investing Charleroy and St. Ghilain at once. We just now hear, that Yesterday the Left of the Enemy's second Line passed the Demer, and that they are going to take the Camp of Louvain or Park, one of the strongest in the Low Countries; and some Advices say, that they design to extend between Louvain and Tirlemont, and are every Day join'd by Troops from the Moselle.

*Whereas the Post-Boy, bringing the Chester Mail from Fenny Stratford to Dunstable, was Yesterday, the 1st Instant, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, attacked on the Highway, near a Place called Hockliffa, otherwise Hockley, in the County of Bedford, by a single Highwayman, who carried off the following Bogs, viz. Warrington, Ormskirk, Wigan, Chester, Wrexham, Coventry, Litchfield, Tamworth, Burton, Uttoxeter, Stafford, Stone, Holmes Chappel, Marclesfield, Stockport, Drayton, Ruthin, Northop, Conway, Shrewsbury, and Oswestry. The Person who committed this Robbery, is a middle-six'd Man, and had on a light brown colour'd loose Horseman's Coat, his Face cover'd with the Cape of his Coat, and rode on a dark bay Mare, with a bald Face, and white Legs behind, and made off towards Woburne.*
