**W**HEREAS Monday the 28th of July instant is appointed by the House of Lords for the Tryals of William Earl of Kilmarnock, George Earl of Cromertie, and Arthur Lord Balmerino, upon the respective Bills of Indictment for High Treason found against them; It is order'd by the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, That all the Lords, who shall attend the said Tryals, do attend the House to take the Oaths, in order to their Sitting and Voting upon such Tryals, on the Thursday and Friday next preceding the Day appointed for the said Tryals.

*Fort Augustus, July 2.* Yesterday was brought hither Prisoner, Hugh Fraser, Chief Secretary to the Lord Lovat, by a Party of Kingstons Horse, which was sent in Search after him.

*Florence, June 20.* Advice is just received here from Capt. Hughes, of the Loss of his Britannick Majesty's Bomb Vessel the Lightning, which was overfet near the Gorgona by a sudden Gust of Wind, and sunk immediately; by which unfortunate Accident 45 of his Majesty's Subjects were drowned, Capt. Martin, the Master, Surgeon and Boatswain, with 23 Men, saved their Lives by swimming, and were taken up by the Nonsuch's Boats.

*Stockholm, June 27.* His Swedish Majesty is now almost quite recovered of his late severe Attack of the Gravel. The Prince and Princess Royal are returned to Ulricksthal from their Progress to Upsala, and some adjacent Provinces.

*Venice, July 6, N. S.* The Spaniards have at last abandoned their Retrenchments, and crossed the Po with 20000 Men, leaving M. Castellar in Placentia with 28 Battalions and one Regiment of Horse, which in their present Condition are supposed to make about 8000 Men, with Orders to defend the Place to the last Extremity. It is said that they have thrown great Part of their Artillery into the Po. The Left of their Army is towards Crema and the Adda, over which they have a Bridge, and their Right to the Lambro, over which they have another Bridge, and the great Road between Milan and Pavia. There is a Body of about 4000 French near Belgiojoso, who have frequent Skirmishes with the Piemontese Troops at Pavia, which they attempted to surprize, but according to a

Letter from the Spanish Quarters at Lodi of the 1st Instant, were disappointed by the King of Sardinia's having reinforced the Garrison with a large Detachment under the Prince of Baden. The same Letter says, that the Infant Don Philip was at Guardamiglio. Their various Motions in the Milaneze make it difficult to judge on which Side they will attempt their Retreat. It is reported that they have sent Commissions to buy Corn, and establish Magazines in the Ecclesiastical State.

*Hague, July 17, N. S.* M. Vanderheim, the Pensionary of Holland, after having passed two Days at the Allied Army, and reached Bois-le-Duc, on his Way to Spa, was Yesterday seized there, and instantly carried off, by a Return of his usual Complaint, an Oppression or Stagnation of Blood at his Heart. The Person most talked of to be his Successor is the Greffier Gilles. The great Seal of Holland falls by Rotation to the eldest Noble, M. S'Gravenaer. M. Halewyn, Pensionary of Dorpt, is likewise dead. The Allied Army is supposed to march To-day or To-morrow towards the Meuse. We hear nothing of the Motions of the French, but that they have invested Charleroy and St. Ghilain. It is said that the Prince of Conti is now ordered to detach 16 Battalions and 30 Squadrons from his Corps to the South of France. By Letters of the 5th Instant from Italy we learn, that the French had formed a Design of surprizing Pavia, which the King of Sardinia, by his Vigilance and Activity, had discovered and disappointed; and that M. de Mi-repoix, who had been charged with the Execution of it, had been driven back with Loss.

*Hague, July 19, N. S.* We have Advice from Paris of the 15th Instant, N. S. that every Thing was ready for the Departure of the French King for the Army under Marshal Saxe, the Moment the Dauphiness should be brought to Bed, which was hourly expected: And from Brabant, that upon the 8th Instant the Army under Marshal Saxe marched in seven Columns from the Camp of Ranst, in order to post themselves behind the Nethe, between Lier and Louvain: That upon 14th Instant 29 French Battalions passed by Brussels from Mons, and continued their March the next Day, in order to join the Grand Army near Lier: That a Detachment of 10,000 Men was encamped between Louvain and Tirlemont: That the Prince of Conti invested Charleroy upon the 12th, and the next Day the Blockade was begun: That the Corps under M. d'Etres was encamped between the Sambre and Mafy near Namur; and that a Body of 14,000 Men had passed by Genappe in order to join him.

*Camp of the Allied Army at Bavel and Ypelaer, July 18, N. S.* Yesterday the Army marched in seven Columns to this Camp, and the Junction with Count Palfy's Troops will, it is hoped, be effected the 21st. Charleroy was invested the 13th. And the French have besieged St. Ghilain with only five or six Battalions. We have a Report here, that last Night their Grand Army marched to Arschot.

*Whitehall July 12.*

The King has been pleased to grant unto his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, his Heirs and Assigns, the Office of Ranger and Keeper of Windsor Great Park, in the room of John Spencer, Esq; deceased, for and during his own Life, and the Lives of their Royal Highnesses the Princess Amelia and the Princess Caroline, and the Life of the longest Liver of them.

The King has been pleased to grant unto John Taylor, Doctor of Laws, the Place and Dignity of one of the Prebends of the Collegiate Church of St. Peter Westminster, void by the Resignation of Lawrence Brodrick, late Prebendary thereof.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Chester Mail from Fenny St. Jordan to Dunstable, was Yesterday, the 1st Instant, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, attacked on the Highway, near a Place called Hockliffe, otherwise Hockley, in the County of Bedford, by a single Highwayman, who carried off the following Bags, viz. Warrington, Ormskirk, Wigan, Chester, Wrexham, Coventry, Litchfield, Tamworth, Burton, Uttoxeter, Stafford, Stone, Holmes Chappel, Macclesfield, Stockport, Drayton, Ruthin, Northop, Conway, Shrewsbury, and Oswestry. The Person who committed this Robbery, is a middle-fix'd Man, and had on a light brown colour'd loose Horseman's Coat, his Face cover'd with the Cape of his Coat, and rode on a dark bay Mare, with a bald Face, and white Legs behind, and made off towards Woburne.
