WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subject, having with that Unanimity and Zeal which became us, all along testified the utmost Detestation of that horrid and unnatural Rebellion, raised in North Britain by perfidious Men, Enemies to their King, their Country, and their own Happiness, do now with equal Warmth of Affection, beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the glorious Victory with which it hath pleased Almighty God to bless your Arms, under the auspicious Conduct of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, whose Wisdom and Bravery, worthy of his high Birth, have eminently appear'd on this Occasion; by which Victory the delusive Triumphs and vain Confidence of the Rebels are turned into lasting Shame, your loyal Subjects delivered from the Dangers of these complicated Evils, Popery and Slavery, and your Majesty's Throne more firmly established by that by which your Enemies designed to subvert it.

No Discouragement nor Dangers, in the worst of Times, have hinder'd us from discovering our inviolable Attachment to your illustrious House, since the happy Settlement of the Protestant Succession in it; and we now beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that it is our firm

Resolution to persevere in our Duty and Loyalty to your Majesty, on whom, under God, depend all our Religious and Civil Liberties.

We bless God for the great Tranquillity this Kingdom hath enjoy'd in these Times of publick Disturbance, under the wise and vigilant Administration of his Excellency the Earl of Chesterfield.

That Almighty God would unite the Hearts of all your Subjects in Principles of Loyalty to your Majesty; that he may crown your Arms with Triumph in the present just and necessary War; restore Peace and Prosperity to all your Dominions; that he, by whom Kings reign, would preserve your Royal Life, and continue your Government a Support to the Protestant Interest, and perpetuate the Succession in your August Family, is the fervent Prayer of,
