THE following Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Sterling, has been presented to his Majesty by the Hon. James Etskine, Esq; their Representative in Parliament; being introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl Cowper, one of the Lords of his Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Sterling.

YOUR Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates and Town Council, as representing the Community of your Royal Burgh of Sterling, beg Leave, with the greatest Joy and Satisfaction, to express their most sincere and hearty Congratulations to your sacred Majesty, on the happy Success that has attended your Arms, under the Command of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland; your Majesty's Son, in overthrowing, at the Battle of Culloden, the presumptuous Attempts of such of your rebellious and fatally deluded Subjects, as insolently and ungratefully presumed to rise in Arms against your Majesty's indulgent and mild Government, in Aid of the foreign Enemies of their native Country, under the dishonourable Conduct of the Son of a popish Pretender to an indefeasible Right from Heaven, of reducing your Majesty's free-born Subjects of Great Britain to the Condition of Slaves, subject to an unlimited Power over their Lives and Fortunes, and incapable of enjoying private Property safe from his arbitrary Demands; and at the same time professing, by the Principles of his Religion, to subvert the Crown of Great Britain to the Authority of a foreign Power, in the most sacred religious Concerns of the Nation, and joining with the French King, the natural and irreconcilable Enemy to the Liberty of these Kingdoms, in Measures and Councils directly tending to enslave this Island, and all Europe, to his insatiable Ambition.

We beg Leave likewise to express our most thankful Acknowledgements to your sacred Majesty, for the conspicuous Mark of Royal Favour shown to our Country, in sending his Royal Highness to be our Deliverer from the Calamities under which we were oppressed by the Rebels, until his Royal Highness, by his vigorous and prudent Conduct, overcame the Difficulties arising from the Rigours of the Winter Season, and a pillaged and wasted Country; and drove his rebellious Enemies, assisted by a foreign Force, to the remote Northern Parts of the Island, and there gave them a total Defeat in a pitched Battle, with a most inconsiderable Loss of your Majesty's Troops under his auspicious Command. We cannot however but regrave, that when we are again, by his Royal Highness's indefatigable Labours, restored to the Enjoyment of Peace, Quiet and Safety at Home, the incurable Obstinacy of our rebellious Countrymen should still oblige his Royal Highness to submit, on our Account, to the Fatigues and Toils of residing in the midst of a mountainous, barren, wasted Country. No Wonder that Language should fail in furnishing us with Words apt for expressing our Gratitude for Favours so uncommon and so rarely the Subject of Thought or Discourse.

We cannot pretend so much as to be able to make, on our Part, Returns to your Majesty suitable to so distinguished Favours; but we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we ever shall, with the greatest Cheerfulness, to the utmost of our Abilities, contribute to defend, with our Lives and Fortunes, your Majesty's sacred Person and Government, against all your Enemies foreign and domestick.

Constantinople, June 24. On the 22d past the Kissar Aqau, or Chief Black Eunuch, died in a very advanced Age. Since his Death many of the great Officers of the Court have been changed. It is reported that the new Capitane Bashaw died of an Apoplexy, in his Voyage to the Archipelago. On the 13th Instant Mr Carlson, the Swedish Envoy, departed from hence with his Family, to return to Sweden by Land. We have no News of any Moment from Persia.

Vienna,

Vienna, July 23, N. S. Count Brown having left the King of Sardinia with the Remainder of the Combined Army to guard the Trebia, was on the 21st or 22d, to pass the Po at Arena, and the Lambro, at or about St. Columbin, with a combined Body of 16 Austrian, and 14 Piedmontese Battalions, three Austrian and three Piedmontese Regiments of Cavalry, and 1000 Irregulars, while General Roth, with a Body of 12 Austrian Battalions, two Regiments of Horse, and some Hussars, was to operate about Soncino, Orzi Novi, and Orzi Vecchi, upon the Oglio, and from thence to the Adda, in order to join Count Brown, and to invest the Spaniards which are at Lodi, Codogno, Fombio, Guarda Meglio, &c. during which time General Nadasti was to be posted at or about Fiorenzuolo, upon the Emilian Way, with about 8000 Hussars and regular Cavalry.

Berlin, July 26. The King of Prussia set out this Morning for Silesia, attended only by Prince Ferdinand his Brother, Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, Major General Borck, Major General Winterfeld, his Aid de Camps, Buddenbrock and Lentulus, and Major Jassau. Count Stolberg proceeded last Night to the Principality of Javer, in order to see if it is worth while to work some Mines which were formerly discovered in those Parts. His Prussian Majesty intends to examine them himself, to visit all his Fortifications, and some Manufactures newly establish'd, and to inspect the Administration and Trade in general in that Dutchy, and to be back, tho' it is calculated the Tour will be of 158 German Miles, by the 12th of next Month. M. Woronzow intends to pursue his Journey to Petersbourg the 28th Instant. M. Podewils deliver'd him last Night a Present from his Prussian Majesty of a Gold hilted Sword set with Diamonds. Post Horses will be provided him gratis.

At the Camp at Borkloch, July 27, N. S.

Since my last of the 24th Instant, our Army has made two Marches, the first to Sandhoven, and the second to this Place; we halt To-morrow, and then proceed towards Namur, and hope to be in time for the saving of that Town. We have taken Possession of Arschott, and Lewe, whilst the French possessed themselves of Halen and Diest. Their Army remains behind Lovain, where they are assembling all the Force they can; whether with a Resolution to attack us, or in Expectation of being attacked, two Days will determine.

At the Camp of the Allied Army at Viler, August 3, N. S.

Count Daun has been detached ever since the 26th with 10,000 Men upon our Right Flank: General-Trips, with a Corps of Hussars and Pandours, is advanced a little March from him upon his Right Flank. And Baronai, with another Corps and our Free Companies, is half a March in the Rear of Count Daun, upon his Right Flank also; every Party of the Enemy that shews itself is attacked, and generally with Success. The 1st Instant we passed the Ma-

haigne in Six Columns, and marched in Order of Battle, the Cannon at the Head of each Battalion, and encamped our Right at Wasserge, our Left towards Longechamp and Ostin, Count Daune between Athe and St. Germain, General Trips at Athe, and the Pandours advanced to St. Denis; Count Lowendahl was then at Judoigne with 14000 Men; Count Clermont between that and Tirlemont with 10000, 1500 in Gemblours, the French Grand Army still behind Louvain, raising Redoubts, &c. They are called 80000, and the whole is believed to be 130000 Men. An Hour after our Arrival on this Side the Mehaigne, the Marshal had Advice that Count Lowendahl had marched to Gemblours and Sombref with all his Corps; that Marshal de Saxe, by very forced Marches, was come from Louvain to Conroy and the Seven Stars; and that the Prince of Conti had made a Detachment from Charleroy to reinforce him. Upon this, our Corps de Reserve was immediately ordered to march to support Count Daun; and Prince Charles, with the other Generals in Chief, went the next Morning with all the Grenadiers to St. Denis, about a Mile from Count Lowendahl's Body, to see if it was possible to attack him; but they found him cover'd by the River of Gemblours, Woods, and large Redoubts, at which they had worked all Night, and also supported by Count Saxe's whole Army, and therefore the Design was not practicable. Charleroy has surrendered in less than three Days from the opening of the Trenches before it. The Enemy are now within Sight of us at the strong Camp of Gemblours, and the Prince of Conti at Fleurus. A Battery is to be planted this Night to dislodge them from the Castle of Mazy. Namur is out of all Danger of being besieg'd. Yesterday Morning the Hussars took 60 Men and 5 Officers Prisoners, and kill'd 40. Another Party kill'd 300 French Pandours, Deserters from our Army; and brought into St. Denis also another Party of 40 Swifs, taken within Musket Shot of the French Camp.

Hague, Aug. 2, N. S. By our last Accounts, Prince Charles's Head Quarters were on the 29th past at Warem, near Liege. We hear that the French have sent off all their heavy Baggage to Brussels. This Step, and the Position of the two Armies, raise the greatest Expectations of the next News from that Quarter; tho' the Return of the French King is fix'd at but the 10th Instant. Letters of the 19th past from the Austrian Army upon the Po, confirm the Junction and joint Command having taken Place on the 16th; and add, that every thing was prepared for entering upon Action; two Bridges having been thrown by his Sardinian Majesty over the Po below, and two above Placentia. Our Advices from Paris say positively, that the Brest Fleet and Transports are sail'd for America.

Hague, August 5, N. S. The Letters of the 23d past from the Combined Army upon the Trebia, speak of the Preparations still continuing for its passing the Po; and fix the 25th ditto for the Execution of it.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the Chester Mail from Fenny Stratford to Dunstable, was Yesterday, the 1st Instant, about Eleven of the Clock at Night, attacked on the Highway, near a Place called Hockliffe, otherwise Hackley, in the County of Bedford, by a single Highwayman, who carried off the following Bags, viz. Warrington, Ormskirk, Wigan, Chester, Wrexham, Coventry, Litchfield, Tamworth, Burton, Uttoxeter, Stafford, Stone, Holmes Chappel, Macclesfield, Stockport, Drayton, Ruthin, Northsp, Conway, Shrewsbury, and Oswestry. The Person who committed this Robbery, is a middle-sized Man, and had on a light brown colour'd loose Horseman's Coat, his Face cover'd with the Cape of his Coat, and rode on a dark bay Mare, with a bald Face, and white Legs behind, and made off towards Woburne.
