We cannot pretend fo much as to be able to make, on our Part, Returns to your Majesty suitable to so distinguished Favours; but we beg Leave to affure your Majesty, that wet ever shall, with the greatest Chearfulness, to the utmost of our Abilities, contribute to defender with our Lives and Fortunes, your Majefty's facred Person and Government, against all your Enemies foreign and domeftick.
