Munich, August 1.

WE hear that the Day of Election to the Bishoprick of Wurtzburg is settled for the 29th of this Month, and that of Bamberg for the 3d of October. Yesterday it was reported in Town, that the Abbot Prince of Fulde was dead.

Liege, August 5, N. S. We have Advices here from the Armies in Brabant, that upon the 2d Instant there happened a small Skirmish near Gemblours, to the Disadvantage of the French; that the Prince of Conti's Head Quarters were at Sombref, and Marshal Saxe's at Wallin near Gemblours; and that the two Armies were in Sight of each other upon the Orneau.

Hague, August 9, N. S. By our Advices of the 4th Instant from the Allied Army, it was encamped along the Eastern Side of the Orneau, with its Right near Oftein and its Left at Mafy, with a Corps behind it at Suarle, near Namur, whilst the French under Marshal Saxe, and the Prince de Conti's Corps lay extended on the other Side of that little River with their Head Quarters at Sombref. The last Letters from Lombardy bring Advice, that General Brown, with a Detachment of 25000 Men, had past the Po on the 24th of last Month without Opposition at Parpanese, above Placentia; and add, that whilst the Rest of the Combined Army was passing the Po,

he was making Dispositions for forcing the Passage of the Lambro, which the Enemy appeared resolved to dispute.

Whereas the Post Boy, bringing the West Mail from Hartford Bridge to Stains, was this Morning, between the Hours of Twelve and One, attacked on the Highway, near a Place called the Hither Black Water, in the County of Surry, by a single Highwayman, who carried off the following Bags, viz. Plymouth, Truro, St. Collumb, Bodmin, Camelford, Oakhampton, Barnstable, Ashburton, Totness, Dartmouth, Launceston, Crewkerne, Ilminster, Axminster, Lyme, Chard, Bridport, Taunton, Wellington, Minehead, Shaftsbury, Weymouth, Dorchester, Blandford, Salisbury, Wimborne, Christchurch, Pool, Cranbourn, Fordingbridge, and Ringwood: The Person, who committed this Robbery, is a lusty Man, and had on a brown-colour'd loose Horseman's Coat, and rode on a Bay Horse, with a bald Face, and his off Legs white, and appears to have made his Way towards Weybridge, or Cobham;

This is therefore to give Notice, that whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen: Or if any Person, or Persons, whether Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer, or Discoverers will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of Two Hundred Pounds, and also have his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
