Petersbourg, July 3.

N the 3d Instant her Imperial Majesty, accompanied by the Great Duke and Dutchess, with some of the principal Ladies and Officers of the Court, set out for Revel; this Journey was notified to the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers on the 2d Instant, but, as in all Probability the Empress will not be long absent, none of the Ambassadors nor Foreign Ministers were asked to accompany her Majesty.

Stockholm, July 22. The Day before Yesterday arrived here Baron Korff, the new Russian Minister to this Court; but as Count Gyllenborg is in the Country for the Recovery of his Health, and Count Tessin at Ulrichsthall, attending on the Prince Successor, as Grand Maitre of his Houshold, the said Minister has not yet had an Audience of his Swedish Majesty. Count Finkenstein, the Prussian Minister at this Court, is appointed to go to that of Petersbourg, where he is to relide in the room of M. Mardefeldt.

Vienna, August 7. This Day a Courier arrived with Letters of the 1st Instant from M. Botta and M. Richecourt, by which it appear'd, that upon General Brown's having been detach'd cross the Po to endeavour to drive the Enemy out of the Milanese, M. de Gages had held so good a Countenance, that the Austrian General had defired to know of the King of Satdinia, whether it was adviseable or not for him to attack the Enemy with a Force very near equal only; whereupon his Sardinian Majesty march'd in the Night, between the 31st past and 1st Instant, at the Head of his own Troops, and was join'd by 16 Austrian Battalions, three Regiments of Hussars, and about 1000 Irregulars, under the Command of General Brown, in order to altack General de Gages, so that the whole Piemontese Army, with the Austrian Troops abovementioned, is at present on this. Side of the Po, commanded by the King in Person, while M. de Botta, to reinforce the remaining Au-Arians in their old Post on the other Side of Placentia, has called over the best Part of the Troops that General Roth had left at Pizzighitone and Cremona, not doubting, as he writes, but to give fingly a good Account still of the Spaniards, if by being forced into Placentia, they either attack him, or attempt to escape by the Parmesan.

Camp at Viler, August 6, N.S. The French having formed a Design to carry off a Post which we have at St. André, and for that purpose made a Detachment the Day before

Yesterday from their Army, consisting of most of their Hussars and Grassins, supported by a Body of Foot and Dragoons with Cannon, the Whole amounting to 7000 Men; the Generals Baronai and Trips, who had Notice thereof, came up with them upon a little Plain near Perweis, and attacked them. The French Hussars and Irregulars in Front were immediately dispersed or cut to Pieces, and their Colonel, Senzé, the Lieutenant Colonel, Major, and several inferior Officers taken Prisoners. Dragoons kept their Ground for some Time; but were at last obliged to give way. The Infantry, which was drawn up behind the Dragoons, in a Square with Cannon, maintain'd their Post till our Men received a Reinforcement of some Pandours, and three free Companies, which entirely broke and routed them, Upon this Occasion we have taken 15 or 16 French Officers, and made 400 private Men Prisoners. Most of the Officers are wounded. Yesterday several Detachments from our Army took Possession of the Wood of Petit Lez, and routed a Body of 100 French Horse between that Wood and Gemblours. The Enemy have advanced three Brigades upon our Lest Flank near Bossiers, and are erecting Batteries there. Our Artillery Horses and Baggage are arrived.

Camp at Viler, August 7, N.S. Our Lest and the Right of the Enemy are not an English Mile distant, but there is a very bad and difficult Piece of Ground, impracticable for the most Part, between us. The Enemy have blown up the Bridge at le Masy, broke the Bridges above and below it, and raised Batteries at every fordable Pass. Their Army is said to be composed of 174 Battalions, and 265 Squadrons, besides heavy Artillery in Plenty. The Right of the Enemy's Camp Yesterday Asternoon was within Musket Shot of the River Orneau at Hound, and extends to Couroy, Grand Manil 7 and 160 to the Cinq Estoiles near Sart-a-Walheris The Left of our Camp, fince the seven Battalions joined us from Namur, is close to the Wood of Millemont, and extends to the Right of Sti Denis toward Dhuy, leaving the Castle of Ostin in our Rear.

Camp at Viler, August 8, N. S. Yesterday the Enemy removed 2000 Paces Backwards palled the Sambre with a confiderable Corps, and appear'd at St. Girard.

Paris, August 8. The King has conferred the Archbishoprick of Paris upon M. Beaumont, Archbishop of Vienne.

Copenhagen, August 9, N. 8. On the 6th Instant, about Five in the Morning, after a lingering confumptive Illness, his Davish Majesty Christian the VIth, departed this Life at Hirscholm, in the 47th Year of his Age, and in the Sixteenth of his Reign. The same Day his Successor Fre derick the Vth, was proclaimed in the usual Manner, and entred upon the Government. This young King has already shewn such evident Tokens of an extraordinary Capacity, and of a truly Royal Disposition, as justly raise the greatest Hopes and Expectations, and very much alleviate the Loss of our late King, who, for his Humanity, Generosity and extensive Goodness, certainly deserved to be ranked among the best of Princes.

Amsterdam, August 12. We have just received the News of the Death of the King of Denmark, which happen'd on the 6th Instant, N. S.

Hague, August 12, N. S On the 7th Inftant the Armics on the Orneau remained in their old Position; but the French were said to be hard at Work in improving their Situation, both by Arullery and Retrenchments. We hear from Brussels, that on Monday last 135 Carriages, full of wounded Men, were conducted thither from the French Army. The Prince of Waldeck has drawn a third Battalion out of Maestricht. It has, within this Day or two, been reported here, that the Duke of Modena and the Insant Don Philip were both retired to Venice.

Edinburgh, Aug. 2. By the latest Intelligence from Arisaig, dated the 23d of July, we are well assured that the Pretender's Son continues there, and is inclosed on all Sides, and it was believed that Lochiel, and fome of the Highland Chiefs were likewise within the Lines. General Campbell was then at Applecross Bay, and Colonel Campbell at Lochnahuach; Old Meinnen' and the Priest, Lochiel's Brother, are taken; as also Rhonald M'Donald, Brother to Kenloch Moidart. Commodore Smith was at Tobermorey, and was joined on the 22d by three Ships of War from the Northland; the Glasgow Man of War had, on the Western Coast, taken a Brigantine with 13 Officers on Board, who have fince the 1st of June been trying to carry off the Pretender's Son day Francis Anderson and John Trithic were convicted, before the Court of Justiciaty, of the Murder of John Catanach, near Glames, (whom they suspected to have given some Informations and condemned to be to the Government) hanged in Chains, the one between Leith and Edinburgh, and the other at Forfar, near to the Place where the Crime was committed. This Day Alexander M'Donald of Kingsborrow, who was taken up for having received and entertained the Pretender's Son at his House in Skye, was fent hither-a Prisoner by the Earl of Albemarle, under a Guard of the Duke of Kingston's Horse, and committed to the Castle of Edinburgh. And this Day all the Prisoners from Aberdeen were brought hither and lodg'd in the Goal of the Cannongate.
